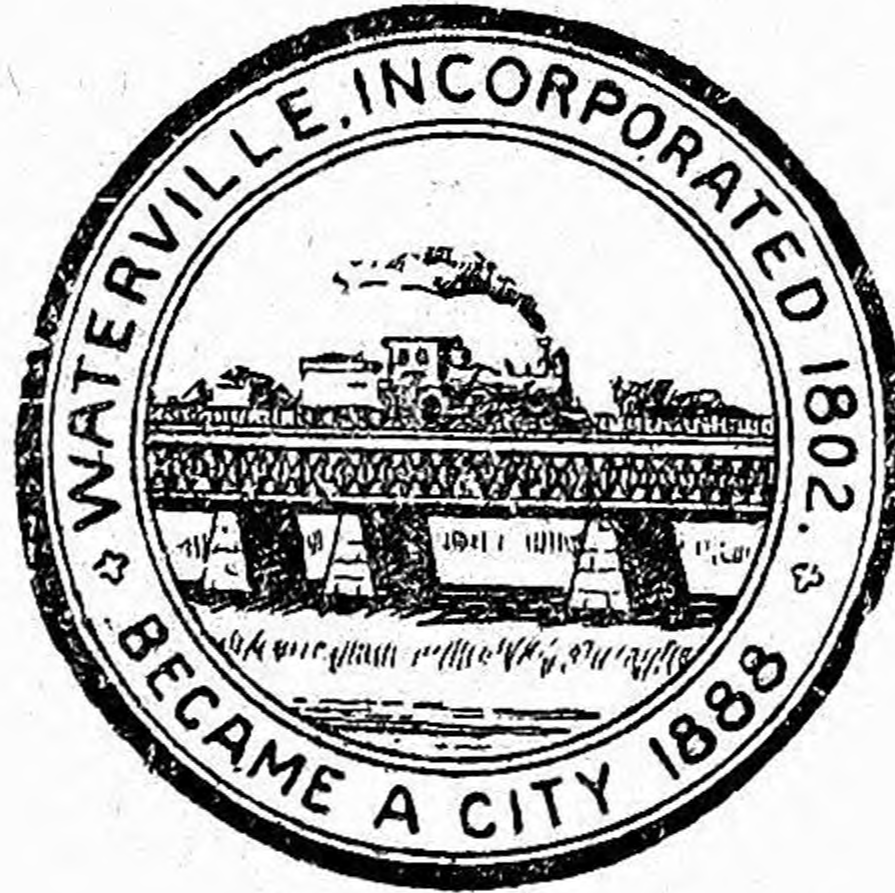

MAYOR'S REPORT.

To the Members of the City Council:

I have the honor to present at this time a brief summary of the work accomplished by the City Government and the present condition of the City.

During the past year there have been many improvements, and I will review briefly the work of some of the different departments which seem to call for comment.

Early in the year the Gilman Street Bridge was found unsafe for travel, and as a matter of safety, it had to be closed and a new bridge built. This necessitated an expenditure of more than three thousand dollars, and a new permanent bridge, much better than the old one, has been built, and as shown by the report of the Street Commissioner, should be a permanent structure for many years to come. In the building of this bridge, it was so planned as to reduce the grade of the street at both ends.

The accomplishments of the Street Department of the City have been very marked. The Department has been exceptionally well managed under the direction of the Street Commissioner, Mr. A. D. Estey, who is emphatically the right man in the right place, and has given this department of the City his most earnest attention.

The Street Commissioner's report and that of the City Engineer show in detail the improvements made, and I will only call to your special attention the new Hassam pavement which has been put onto a part of Silver Street, lower Main Street and City Hall Square. This is a modern permanent construction, and should be extended to other parts of the City as fast as possible by future administrations. Also from funds of this Department a new gravel pit has been purchased. This cost \$1,000, and the gravel alone is now worth at least \$3,000 to the City.

The rental due January 1st, 1915, under the Water Contract was not paid but put by until the March roll. Accordingly, it has been necessary for this City Government to make payment of the bills for a year and a half on this contract, which accounts for its overdraft.

It was felt imperative that Hayden Brook Sewer should be extended as far as possible. It was accordingly extended nearly six hundred feet, as stated in the City Engineer's report. At the beginning of the year, the first contract contemplated extending it to above Dunbar Court, but it was found that the Wentworth Court culvert would have to be rebuilt,

and in order to save expense of rebuilding, and a consequent tearing up next year, it was considered expedient to extend it by that Court, about two hundred feet, in addition to the amount first planned. This will be a considerable saving to the City in the end. Arrangements were made with the contractor whereby this work could be done, and payment made on the same in March.

This is a very much needed improvement for the northern part of the City, and should be extended by each coming City Government as fast as can be done.

At the first meeting a Committee was appointed in conjunction with the Board of Education to arrange for putting the High School Building in condition, and for making all necessary repairs caused by the fire. Contract had already been let to E. P. Witham for this work, it being left, however, with the Committee to determine what should be done, and in what way.

The Committee had specifications made, and the work was completed at a total expense of \$20,700.10, a saving to the City of \$6,587.34. Some changes were also made at this time, of which the use of the building had shown the necessity. The building is now in better condition than when first constructed.

The demands upon the Poor Department have been large during the year and particularly as during the earlier part of the year many were out of employment.

The Clerk to the Overseers, Mr. Joseph P. Giroux, has been painstaking in his work and as far as possible has collected for the City such amounts as were due from other towns, cities and the State, with a result that this department of the City shows a considerable reduction from the expense for a number of years past.

There have also been additions of equipment at the Almshouse, which have been paid for out of the funds of the department.

There has also been a considerable reduction in amount spent for current expenses, and interest account has been reduced.

We have purchased from the Ticonic Aqueduct Company a small plot of land in the City Hall Lot, thus clearing the title to that lot.

We have also passed and put into effect an ordinance regulating street traffic, which was much needed in view of the congestion of the streets of our City.

We have also revised the rules and regulations relative to public carriages and the fares to be charged by them.

It has been the policy in all departments of the City to keep the property in the best of condition, believing this to be good business principles, for all property, whether owned by individual or city. I believe that all property of the City is in much better condition than it was at the beginning of the year.

The City Government early met the problem of keeping the tax rate at former figures. Owing to the additional cost for the Gilman Street Bridge, the cost of Fire Truck and an increase in State and County Taxes of \$8,573.79, a total additional amount exceeding \$16,000 had to be provided for. (An equivalent of two mills in tax rate). Many of the cities of the State were obliged to increase their tax rate on account of this increase in State Tax alone, but owing to the condition of business, it was felt that an additional burden of this nature should be avoided if possible, and we have succeeded in making the improvements, paying all bills, and this has been done on the former tax rate of twenty-three mills, and without increasing the actual debt of the City as shown below. This, notwithstanding we found a large amount of unpaid bills of the City which had been contracted by the previous administration, and which have now been paid by the present administration. The amount of these bills was not included in the last City Report. It should have been, in order to obtain the actual financial standing of the City, as they were as much a part of the liabilities of the City as were the notes and bonds. Your Auditor has tabulated the amount of these outstanding obligations, and has also, as near as could be obtained, tabulated the outstanding obligations of a similar nature at the present time, and in order to make a comparison of the standing at the beginning and end of the municipal year, I have made a summary of the figures, including all these items. I have also included in this summary the reduction made by abatement in old taxes of the City which were reckoned as an asset of the City last year, and which have proven to be no asset, but have had to be marked off by the Board of Assessors. This shows an absolute gain by the City in our financial statement during the year of \$2,318.04, after taking into consideration the contract for the work on the Hayden Brook Sewer, which by agreement with the Contractor is not to be paid until March, and without interest. This is an absolute statement of the conditions as they exist, as far as I can ascertain.

The Common and High School accounts have not been included in this unpaid bill tabulation, there having been no appreciable difference between the conditions at the beginning and at the end of the year.

There is a considerable amount of overdue back taxes which should be either collected or eliminated from the assets of the City. This City Government has made a start by the elimination of nearly \$3,000. The present Tax Collector has been particularly efficient and a much smaller amount of uncollected taxes has been carried over from this year than last.

I would recommend that the next City Government make arrangements for a collection of outstanding old taxes of the City, and also arrange that the books of the former Collectors be kept at the Collector's Office at all times.

The City has been drawn into an unfortunate controversy with the local Board of Health, a majority of which have refused to co-operate with us in the matter of meat inspection, and the City has been forced to defend a suit brought against it by Dr. J. W. Stewart. A decision of this case will be made speedily, and it is hoped that co-operation may exist in the future, so that these matters may be straightened out. As the matter stands at present, it is a most unfortunate thing for the City.

In conclusion, I wish to thank all the members of the City Government and also the heads of the various departments of the City for the great help and assistance and courtesy they have extended to me at all times during the past year.

I am very glad to report that all departments of the City are in excellent condition.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council, Waterville, Maine:

Following is the report of the Health Department for the year ending January 31st, 1916:

Tuberculosis cases are not reported, as under the present regulations, the health department receives no notice of them.

Health conditions in the city have been somewhat above the average for the past two years. The chief item of interest as it concerns the public health is the Regulation known as the Meat Code, a brief report of which is appended covering the thirteen months since the regulation went into effect. For a complete report we refer you to the City Treasurer, where an account of all fees received may be obtained. No fees have been collected for the examination of carcasses which have failed to pass inspection. Number of carcasses of domestic meat inspected and accepted 3,000. This includes veal, beef, pork and lamb.

In order that you may know of the number of animals rejected and the reason for their rejection, we are including a report covering that phase of the work by months.

City Engineer's Report

Waterville, Maine, February 5, 1916.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

Gentlemen:—I hereby submit the following report as a summary of the work done in my Department for the current year.

SEWERS.

The amount of work done on sewer construction (outside of Hayden Brook Sewer) has been less than for several years past.

College Avenue.

The longest single piece constructed was near the Keyes Fibre Company's Plant. This consisted of six hundred eighty-nine feet of eight inch clay pipe, three manholes and one catch basin.

This sewer was built from the bank of the Kennebec River to a point near the southwest corner of the Keyes Fibre Company's Plant, and is designed as an outlet for that part of College Avenue from Preble Street to the Fairfield line.

Grove Court.

Two hundred and eight feet of four-inch pipe sewer was taken up on this Court, and relayed with six-inch pipe.

Head of Falls.

The overflow from the Front Street sewer, crossing under the Maine Central Railroad track to Kennebec River had become washed away at the bank of the river. This overflow has been tapped for house con-

nections by several of the residents near, thus making it necessary to relay this overflow to low water mark of the river. The total distance laid was about fifty-two feet, of twelve-inch pipe.

Edgemont Avenue.

This eight-inch sewer was extended 53.6 feet and lantern hole moved to present terminus.

Gray Avenue.

There was laid on this street seventy-three feet of eight-inch pipe, connecting with the Abram Brook sewer. One catch-basin was also built.

All of the above sewers have been constructed by the Street Department.

Hayden Brook Sewer.

This necessary adjunct to our sewerage system has been extended six hundred feet this year.

Construction was extended from the end of last year's work, viz., the northerly end of the Maine Central Railroad culverts, across Sanger Avenue, Dunbar Court and Wentworth Court to within about thirty-five feet of the west line of Main Street.

Bids were advertised for June 12th, and the contract awarded to E. P. Witham June 22nd. This contract was for four hundred feet of sewer construction, if such was deemed advisable. Actual work was begun June 30th. Four hundred feet of actual construction was done under this contract and the work was completed September 30th. During the progress of this work the rainfall was the heaviest that has been known for years, being 9.16 inches for July.

This retarded the progress of the work, as well as making it more expensive, and the writer is of the opinion that it would have been practically impossible to have used any other type of construction than the vitrified segment block, and had a satisfactory piece of sewer.

Included in this section were two catch-basins, and five house connections, also Sanger Avenue Sewer connection

The cost of this section was \$3,980.28. This does not include the material for grading which was furnished and hauled by the Street Department.

Before this section was finished, it was decided to extend this year's work two hundred feet further, and your Contractor was instructed to continue the work the above distance.

Work of laying blocks on this erection was finished November 4th, and grading and pointing November 27th.

The cost of this section was \$1,909.25, exclusive of grading material.

GILMAN STREET BRIDGE:

Early in the season an inspection of Gilman Street Bridge, across the Messalonskee, showed it to be in a very rotten and unsafe condition.

Bids were asked, for furnishing and driving new oak piling. June 2nd this contract was let to E. P. Witham at eighty cents per foot, based on the actual amount used in the completed structure. The length of this piling varied from thirty-eight feet to forty-six feet.

The remaining construction was done by the Street Department. The caps and stringers are of southern pine treated with Carbolineum. The planking is of hemlock, and a pipe railing with cast iron posts was built. New oak wharfing at each end was built, and the completed structure is about two and one-half feet higher than the old one.

The old bridge had been in service about forty-two years, and the new one should last fully as long.

NEW STREETS.

The following new streets have been accepted the past year:

Cottage Street, from College Avenue to Eastern Avenue. Only one hundred and fifty feet of the westerly end was opened to public travel.

Terry Street, from College Avenue to Eastern Avenue. This street was not opened to public use until necessity demanded.

Clark Street. This street was accepted by the City in 1898, but was not graded and opened to public use until this year.

Graylock Street. All of this street lying northerly of a line connecting the northeast corner of lot of William F. Drury, and northwest corner of lot of Prof. H. P. Little was discontinued.

CURBING RESET.

Curbing has been reset on Silver Street, Main Street and Water Street.

HASSAM PAVING.

On August 19th, a contract was made with the Hassam Paving Company of Worcester, Mass., for compressed concrete paving on Main Street from Silver to Lockwood Streets; Silver Street from Main to Spring Streets, and City Hall Square. The contract price was \$1.50 per square yard.

Under this contract the City furnished the crushed rock at \$1.25 per ton, and the sand at \$1.00 per cubic yard.

This work was completed November 8th, 3699.6 square yards being laid. This paving is guaranteed and maintained by the Hassam Company for a period of five years.

RESERVOIR.

In connection with the Hassam paving, it was found that the cover of the reservoir, near the drinking fountain in City Hall Square, was badly decayed and was not suitable to support paving.

This reservoir is a relic of the old days of fire fighting, and is thirty-five feet in diameter and twelve feet deep, being lined with cement, and is self-filling.

A new reinforced concrete cover was built over it, being supported by the old steel beams removed from the High School Building.

The total cost of this cover, not including paving, was \$351.97.

STATE AID ROAD.

By a special permit from the State Highway Commission, the section of State Aid Highway improved this year was on the River Road, so called, from the Emerson Bridge to opposite the "Hitchings' Place."

Work was begun September 14th, and finished November 30th. Plans, grades and profiles of this work were furnished by this office, and the supervision of construction was also from this office, subject of course to the inspection of the Highway Department. The actual work of construction was under Mr. Estey of the Street Department.

This piece of highway has always been a bad piece for travel, especially in the Spring, or during rainy seasons.

The alignment was straightened by flattening the curves, and grades were flattened. Three new culverts were added.

About one hundred and fifty-feet of stone base was placed, and the entire length of 3,080 feet gravelled and rolled.

In addition, 2,232 feet of standard wood railing was built. Owing to the lateness of the season it was deemed inadvisable to paint this until the coming Spring.

To provide for this, the Highway Department has withheld Fifty Dollars of the appropriation which will be paid upon the painting being completed.

The section of State Aid Road to be improved next season will be from the south end of the 1914 section to the Ridge Road.

STREET LINES AND GRADES.

Street lines have been run on Cottage Street, Terry Street, Pleasant Place, Gilman Street, College Avenue, Union Street, Front Street, Boutelle Avenue, Silver Street, River Road, Morrill Avenue, Western Avenue and Burleigh Street.

Grades have been given on Silver Street, Gilman Street, Burleigh Street and Main Street.

Grades have been established on Clark Street.

Stone bounds have been set on Western Avenue, Russell Street, Frances Street, Silver Street, River Road, and at City Gravel Pit.

Surveys have been made at City Gravel Pit, City Hall lot, Western Avenue at Crummett Bridge, Private Way near Ellery Vose's, and Ticonic Aqueduct Lot.

In May the Kennebec County Commission established the lines and bounds of Silver Street from Elm to and across the Emerson Bridge, and also of the River Road as far as the Hitchings' Place. These lines have long been a matter of controversy and it is hoped that the matter is at last definitely settled.

While there has not been as much sewer work the past year as in some other years, the amount of work done by this office has been fully as great as in any former season.

A large amount of this has been caused from the unusual amount of streets improved by gravelling, for which lines and grades have been given in each case, as well as the rebuilding of the Gilman Street Bridge, and the survey and office work in connection with the State Aid Highway.

Upwards of twenty-five plans have been made and added to the City files of this office, besides sketches furnished to contractors, etc., as working plans.

I wish particularly to call your attention to the Hassam Paving work laid on Main and Silver Streets. The writer visited cities where this method of paving had been in use, some of it for nine years, and it appeared as good after use this length of time as when laid.

We certainly have had no street improvements that will compare with this, in low first cost, and apparent durability.

The Hassam Paving Company will remove all granite block paving, recut the blocks, and relay them in concrete grout for \$1.00 per square yard. The compressed concrete as laid here this season costs \$1.50 per square yard, including excavation.

As something should be done towards improving Front Street, from Lockwood Street to Temple Street, would suggest that the cheapest way to get a good permanent pavement on two streets, would be to remove a section of the present granite pavement on Main Street, replacing this with the Compressed Concrete, and relaying the granite blocks in grout on Front Street. In this way both streets could be repaved at a combined cost of \$2.50 per square yard.

Our present granite block paving cost nearly \$2.00 per square yard and is not a satisfactory piece of work. Another feature of this type of paving is that the City can furnish the crushed rock and sand at a slight profit, thus reducing the cost, and giving employment to local labor.

In making other suggestions, would recommend that the Hayden Brook Sewer be extended the coming season to at least Brook Street.

This would make a section about nine hundred feet in length. By building this amount two years more should finish the entire sewer. Our present sewer system is becoming overloaded, and by extending this, (Hayden Brook Sewer), other sewers in this section can be connected in, thus relieving the other system.

All of our iron bridges should be painted the coming season, as they are all in bad shape in this respect.

Many of our streets do not coincide with the recorded locations, and new surveys should be made and the necessary adjustments made to have these properly located.

Stone bounds should be placed at angles and intersections of all streets, where such are not already done.

All manholes should be located on proper plans, and the covers raised to grade.

As mentioned in my report last year, a complete survey of the City should be made as soon as possible. I wish to thank you gentlemen, and all connected with the present City Administration, for your courteous treatment and hearty support the past year.

City Electrician's Report.

Waterville, Maine, February 8, 1916.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

I hereby submit the following report of this Department for the current year.

During the present year the circuit supplying the street lamps has been divided into three separate ones, operated by "Tub" transformers at the Bangs Sub-station.

They were formerly operated on a single circuit from Oakland. The present arrangement makes the system more reliable, as well as lowering the voltage, thus reducing the liability of trouble, and also the danger.

There has been installed during the year past the following street lamps, in new locations:

- Burleigh Street, near Keene's garage.
- Pleasant Place, near Center Street.
- Prospect Street, near residence of C. D. Sayward.
- Water Street, below Grove Street.
- North Street, near Sanger Avenue.
- Autumn Street.
- Front Street, rear Atherton Store.
- Carey Lane at West End.
- King Street.
- Canibas Avenue, near Seavey Street.

These are all 250 candle power gas filled lamps.

The following changes have been made:

- Edwards Street, old 32 c.p. changed to 250 c.p.
- Winter Street, old 32 c.p. changed to 250 c.p.
- Grove Street, opposite Pine Street, 32 c.p. replaced by 250 c.p.
and old lamp moved to opposite Schoolhouse.
- May and High Streets, old 32 c.p. changed to 250 c.p.

Carey Lane, old 32 c.p. removed.

Sanger Avenue, old 32 c.p. moved one pole east and changed to 60 c.p., new 60 c.p. installed near residence of T. D. O'Donnell.

Morrill Avenue and Burleigh Streets, old 32 c.p. changed to 600 c.p. This lamp replaces one of the old arcs, at no additional expense to the City.

A new five-light ornamental cluster has also been installed in City Hall square, near the drinking fountain. This was installed free, and is operated at no expense to the City by the Central Maine Power Company, in accordance with their contract.

NEW GAMEWELL FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

The new Gamewell Fire Alarm System has given good service during the year just passed. There have been several short interruptions on the different circuits, but these have been from causes beyond our control, such as thunder storms, and trees blowing down.

In this connection, would call your attention to the large number of trees along our streets that are either wholly or partly dead, and that are liable to cause property damage or personal injury at every storm. There are also many dead limbs that should be removed.

OLD AUXILIARY FIRE ALARM SYSTEM AND POLICE SIGNAL SYSTEM.

The old Auxiliary Fire Alarm System, and the Police Signal System, both of which were unfavorably mentioned in my last report, have not been in working order for several months. The expense of maintenance was so large as to be prohibitive.

I am pleased to say that at the present time a new Police Signal System has been ordered, and will be installed within three or four weeks, and also that work is now in progress, rebuilding the Auxiliary System.

The money to pay for these is derived from the sale of the old arc lighting wire, which was loaned to the Lighting Company several years ago. They have recently paid for this, and the proceeds should nearly, or wholly, pay for the above mentioned new systems.

Gas lights have been installed in all the corridors and stairways in City Hall, and also in the auditorium and exits of the Opera House. These are installed as a safety precaution in case the electric supply should fail.

We have been very free the past year from that old trouble known as building moving.

Moving buildings is a relic of days when there were no electric wires or poles.

At the present time, when nearly all our manufacturing industries depend upon electric power, it is a great public inconvenience and expense to have buildings moved through and across our public streets.

It is the writer's opinion that no permits to move buildings should be granted until a thorough investigation of the conditions are made, and only then after all parties to whom expense will be incurred, have been guaranteed payment for such expense.

Also that a City Ordinance along these lines should be enacted.

There has been a gradual thinning out of the poles along our streets the past year, and there is a chance for further improvement.

The wires and poles around City Hall have been rearranged so that conditions are far better towards placing ladders, etc., in case of fire.

A fire escape is also under consideration for City Hall.

The wiring in several of our older schoolhouses as well as the Armory is in bad shape, and should be attended to.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

The fire alarm system this year has worked to perfection on all occasions, and has not failed on any alarm. The Auxiliary or Tapper circuit is entirely out of commission, and should be repaired and placed in commission as soon as possible, as it is of great assistance on an alarm of fire.

The success of the alarm system, which has been in charge of the city electrician, who has given it his personal attention, has largely been due to his efficient work, and I would heartily recommend that this arrangement be continued.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

In closing this report, I am pleased to state that the department has responded to 140 calls this year: 57 box alarms, and 83 still alarms, or telephone calls, and the losses sustained have been the smallest this year of any since my connection with the department.

In making this statement, I do not take into account the fire of June 4th, of the Maine Central Railroad coal shed, which was a costly fire, but in the handicap which our department had to contend with, it could not be otherwise than costly.

I attribute the small loss this year to several things: chiefly, to the effect due on account of inspections being made in the business section, and the compelling of owners and tenants keeping their premises and buildings clear of rubbish, etc. Also, to the fact that the public are co-operating and showing more interest in safe-guarding their property from fire hazards.

The most of our calls are for chimney fires, or fires that start from the causes due to defective chimneys, and I feel confident that we have in this city, to-day, many chimneys that would not pass an inspection, and there seems to be the most ignorance shown by the public in this particular instance, and the only recommendation that I can offer to property holders is, that they keep the chimneys in their houses as clear and clean from deposits known as soot, and creosote, and that they personally inspect them, and see that safe and tight covers are placed over all unused thimble holes, and that all stove pipes or furnace pipes entering chimneys, are safely protected from all wood or other inflammable matter.

A FEW THINGS TO REMEMBER.

Don't leave everything to the landlord; inspect your own house from cellar to garret for fire hazards.

Don't use matches or candles in dark closets or cellars.

Don't keep matches except in tin boxes with cover attached.

Don't toss away a match unless completely extinguished. And then toss it into a metal or porcelain receptacle.

Don't fill lamps or oil stoves while lighted.

Don't use kerosene oil in lighting fires.

Don't use naphtha or gasoline for cleaning purposes where there are open lights or fires.

Don't accumulate old beds and bedding or other trash in cellars.

Don't neglect to have the chimney flue cleaned once a year. You are responsible, not your landlord.

Don't put hot ashes in anything but a metal receptacle.

Above all, *don't* allow any place that you consider a fire hazard to remain. If on other property than your own, notify the chief engineer of the fire department at once, so that the same may be remedied before causing a fire or a loss.

Bear in mind that when any fire occurs, that you and I, with others, have to pay our proportionate part of the loss.

The property loss in the United States, for 24 hours, is nearly \$1,000,000, part of which is due to pure ignorance and carelessness.

In conclusion, I personally wish to extend thanks to His Honor, the Mayor, and the members of City Council, for their support the past year; also, the public for their co-operation, and on behalf of the department to say that it stands ready at any and all times to give careful inspection to any and all places which may be reported, and its members are always alert to prevent fires from starting, and if they have started, to subdue them as soon as possible, and they cheerfully solicit the co-operation of the public that the above need may be accomplished.

Free Public Library.

To the Honorable, the Mayor and the City Council:

The Trustees having attended to their duties have the honor to present the report of the work of the Waterville Public Library for the year ending January 31, 1916.

An unusual number of changes in the membership of the Board has occurred during the past year. The lamented death of Mrs. Martha Baker Dunn, removed one of the most faithful members of the Board who gave to the selection of books for the Library her fine literary appreciation and judgment, while she enlivened many a meeting with her flashes of wit and humor.

Dr. E. L. Jones had been for many years a wholly dependable member of this board. He had the interests of the library at heart, and attended faithfully to the work of his committee.

It has been said of successful Maine clergymen that "they either die or go to Massachusetts." Your Board is glad to report that Canon Nicholson took the latter alternative, but would express its appreciation of the work done by him as a member of the Board and of the Book Committee.

Mrs. L. G. Bunker, who was continuing the good work done in connection with another library, because of other duties, has resigned.

The public library has been called the "College of the People." In the effort to fulfill the functions of such an institution, your Board has provided the best of the current fiction in large quantities for the amusement and recreation of its patrons. It has provided a reading room with a remarkably comprehensive list of periodicals of the highest class. It has furnished the Reference Room with books that are studied by a very large number of the students in the schools as well as by older persons seeking special information. The Children's Room with its constant introduction of something new and interesting, and the sympathetic oversight and suggestions of the Librarian and assistant, are giving the children the library habit, and are making them the enthusiastic supporters of the library.

The number of books added to the library during the year is 1,204, the largest number added in any year of regular work, and 25 per cent. more than were added last year. This has been possible because of good fortune in securing a large number of books at only a small fraction of their usual cost. In every department of the work and patronage of the library there has been a large increase during the year. One out-station has been successfully maintained without additional cost to the library.

ADMINISTRATION.

Your Trustees, feeling that the results in this "best year" of the library's history have been largely due to the tactful, courteous and faithful labors of the Librarian, Miss Jennie Smith, and the Assistant, Miss Adams, at their annual meeting spread upon the record their high appreciation of these services. Mr. Noble also has given to the library service of a very unusual order, that has contributed much to its efficiency.

The Book Committee has held twelve monthly meetings during the year and has given much time to the work assigned to it. A special reference may well be made to the constant attendance of the President of the Board, Dr. F. C. Thayer, during all the years of his presidency and membership of the Book Committee, at all the meetings of the Board and of the Committee. To him a meeting has been an engagement. The other committees have held meetings as their duties have required.

The enlarged work, patronage and success of the library during the year indicate much as to its possibilities for the future. The library is in close co-operation with the schools of the city; it is serving some of every class and condition of the people. Its stimulus and instruction are carried directly to the homes that need them most. Larger resources will provide for the enlargement and greater efficiency of this aid. Recognizing the generosity in the past of your Honorable Council in all that has pertained to the interests of the library this Board petitions that, in accord with the special reports of the Committees, efforts may be made to increase the funds available for library work.

The reports of the Librarian, the Treasurer and the Committees are appended.

REPORT OF LIBRARIAN.

To the Board of Trustees of the Waterville Public Library:—

I have the honor to submit the nineteenth annual report of the Waterville Public Library for the year ending January 31, 1916:

The past year has been a busy one at the library. A large number of books have been added, the circulation has materially increased and the readers have been numerous. The library staff have worked together in the utmost harmony, and only regret that lack of time and the great amount of necessary routine work have prevented their accomplishing all that they could wish.

The year has been saddened by the death of two honored members of the Board of Trustees, Mrs. R. W. Dunn and Dr. E. L. Jones. As a member of the consulting committee of the trustees for the librarians Mrs. Dunn has been very much missed. Her wise and sympathetic counsel has always been of the greatest value, and we have sustained an irreparable loss in her removal from us.

Sunday afternoon, May 30, Decoration Day, the library was thrown open to the public on the occasion of the presentation to the library by the Silence Howard Hayden chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution a bronze tablet in commemoration of the Revolutionary soldiers "buried in the old town of Waterville, Maine."

The library was represented at the annual meeting of the Maine Library Association at Bangor in October by the librarian and assistant and an interesting and profitable session was held. The inspiration imparted at these meetings as well as the helpful suggestions thrown out justify, it is hoped, the generosity of the trustees in furthering the attendance of both members of the staff, and for this we wish to express our sincerest appreciation.

REGISTRATIONS.

The number of new borrowers to register during the year is 604. Thirteen from adjacent towns have subscribed the requisite amount at the rate of one dollar a year and become patrons of the library.

ACCESSIONS.

The number of books added to the library during the year is 1,209, 352 more than last year. These are divided according to classes as follows:

The suggestion made last year of placing books on deposit in some of the more remote localities has been tried successfully on Marston Avenue. The books have been kept at one of the houses, cared for by the members of the household, and circulated in the neighborhood. The number of borrowers here were twelve, the number of books loaned eighty-seven.

Other locations were considered for deposit stations, but it did not seem feasible for different reasons to locate stations at these points at present.

READING ROOM.

An attempt has been made as far as practicable to furnish magazine reading on special subjects for those engaged in the allied pursuits. With this in view the Painters Magazine, School and Home Education, and the American Journal of Nursing have been added this year.

The Osteopathic Magazine and the Christian Science Journal are received as gifts.

The magazines which we are binding regularly have been bound to date.

CHILDREN'S ROOM.

The number of readers recorded in the children's room is 5,511.

A goodly number of books have been added in this department this year, but still more numerous constant additions are needed, as the call is insistent and the children are readers and look forward to and enjoy new books. Moreover they are not so disposed to look disparagingly on non-fiction as are many of the older readers, but are eager for all kinds of good reading.

It is very desirable that most of the books for children be kept in their room, and in order to do this more shelving is very much needed here. There is space for considerable more, and it is hoped that some at least may be added before long.

The last week of November was observed at the library as "Safety First Juvenile Book Week," according to the recommendation of the Chief Scout Librarian of the Boy Scouts of America. His object being to improve the class of reading among young people. The necessity here is not so apparent, but it was thought that the exhibition of books recommended by Mr. Mathiews, the Scout Librarian, would be suggestive to parents, and also of interest to the boys, as it proved. The books were placed in the reference room and different members of the Boy Scouts presided over and took charge of the display during the week. Also on one evening President Roberts gave a talk to the boys in the lecture hall on the subject of reading, which was evidently appreciated.

REFERENCE ROOM.

REPORT OF BOOK COMMITTEE.

To the President and Members of the Board of Trustees Waterville Public Library:

The losses by death and removal that have made the year a sad one to your Board have fallen with special weight upon the Book Committee. From the date of her first election to this Board Mrs. Martha Baker Dunn served on this committee, giving to its work a large amount of time and her very best of appreciation and judgment, which was best indeed. Canon Nicholson was a faithful member of the Committee, whose place it will not be easy to fill.

Your Committee are pleased to report that the number of books added this year is over 1,200, being twenty-five per cent more than last year.

These have furnished additional resources to every department of the library; their classification will be found in the Report of the Librarian. The large increase in the number of books loaned shows that the books have been appreciated.

While it is the aim of your Committee to provide all the best of the new fiction for the entertainment of the patrons of the library, it calls your attention to the fact that there has been a decided increase in the demand for books of science, history, agriculture and gardening, travel, biography, and current events. The books of technology and the mechanic arts have been used and the new books with which the Reference Room has been supplied have been appreciated. The French Department has been increased by a large number of volumes, including many works of history and biography. This department is increasingly patronized and should be liberally supported.

During the year your Committee have purchased many sets of standard authors, either to replace books that had been worn out or to supply vacancies. It has been specially fortunate in securing many of these at only a very small fraction of their usual cost.

Gifts. The Waterville Woman's Club has continued its praiseworthy habit of giving to the library a large number of the best new books every year. For this the Book Committee is thankful as only a book committee can be. Dr. F. C. Thayer, President of the Board of Trustees, as usual heads the list of private givers. The list is longer than usual and each giver receives the thanks of the Committee. The Committee would be glad to enter a large number more of new names on this honor list.

In consideration of the increasing use of the library and the growing demands upon it, and also the very large number of new books coming from the press for which there is immediate demand, your Committee suggest action on the part of the Board of Trustees to secure larger resources for the purchase of books.

A large number of books have been rebound, substantially and at low rates, a number of the leading magazines that are in constant demand for purposes of study have been bound. The Committee has fortunately secured the first twenty-six volumes of the *Atlantic Monthly*. It needs in order to complete its file, the volumes between 1870 and 1890. Possibly some friend of the library may be able to supply the whole or a part of these volumes.

REPORT OF FINANCE COMMITTEE.

Waterville, Maine, February 1, 1916.

To the Trustees of the Free Public Library of the City of Waterville:

The finance committee begs leave to report that it has examined the accounts, books and vouchers in the hands of the treasurer and finds that at the end of the fiscal year January 31st, 1916, the total receipts from all sources to be \$3,714.41. The total expenditure for the year has been \$3,795.09.

Vouchers and return checks are present to account for all items of expense. The books are in perfect balance and all funds fully and properly accounted for. The trust fund of five hundred dollars is represented by a book of deposit on the Waterville Savings Bank and is in the custody of the president.

It will be observed that the books show a deficit of \$80.68 which comes as a result of the unlooked for and unprecedented action of the city government in compelling the Library to pay for the insurance amounting to \$156.00 which has hitherto not been taken out of the Library appropriation, but has otherwise been provided for by the city.

To one who gives even a cursory thought to the development of our Library work it is perfectly evident that its needs can hardly be met with the small amount of money at its disposal.

The very best effort has been given by all concerned to get the most possible out of the little at our command. The committee feel that the time has come when the trustees must insist upon a larger appropriation from the city government if the increasing requirements of this valuable adjunct to our civic life are to be fulfilled.

We strongly advise that every effort be made to increase our yearly stipend to \$4,000.00.

City Solicitor's Report.

Waterville, Maine, February 10, 1916.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

During the past year the City has been involved in only one action at law, that of Dr. J. W. Stewart against the City, for wages as meat inspector and for the use of his team in the carrying on of the above business. The City Council have taken the ground that the office of meat inspector should be filled by some person other than a member of the Board of Health, as the work is done under the direction of the Board of Health and the inspector chosen by them.

Dr. Stewart made a charge for services and team hire at the rate of \$5.00 per day. The case was tried at the January term of the Superior Court and a verdict returned for Dr. Stewart at the rate of \$4.50 per day. Fees turned into the City from inspection of meat have averaged a little more than a dollar a day. An appeal was taken and the case is now pending in the Law Court.

There have been several controversies with other towns and cities over pauper support, but these have all been adjusted without the necessity of a suit.

Report of Street Commissioner.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of the City of Waterville:

In submitting my report to you for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1916, on streets, sewers, sidewalks, State Aid Highway, brown-tail moths, trimming trees, and bridges, for your consideration, I wish to call your attention to the receipts and expenditures of the different departments. There have been many necessary improvements, also a number of permanent improvements. Among the permanent improvements was the building of a new bridge over the Messalonskee Stream, at Gilman street, 3,080 ft. of State Aid Highway, 1,567 ft. of new sewer, 3,699 6-10 sq. yards of Hassam pavement, putting in a new concrete wall under watering trough on Elm street, 172 ft. guard rail on Summer street around C. H. Barton's gravel pit, 2,000 sq. yards macadam on Main street, from North to Elm street, and 2,500 sq. yds. of macadam on Silver street.

The City bought in June a gravel pit, paying \$1,000.00 for it, it being paid for out of the Street Appropriation. There has been used out of the pit \$1,000.00 worth of rock and gravel, and the pit is worth now \$3,000.00.

The work has been done this year under the inspection of City Engineer E. W. Crawford. The strictest economy has been used consistent to good work, and I have given my entire time and personal attention to this work, and also have endeavored to have the work done at as small a cost as possible and in a permanent manner.

The summaries of the work are shown in the following report:

STREETS.

The newly graveled streets were, Silver street from Silver place to Gold street, graveled and graded Western Ave. from Elm street to Cloutier's store, graveled from there to Burleigh street, Gilman street graded and graveled, Charles street graded and graveled, graveled Kennebec street hill, graveled Middle street, North street and Pleasant street, graveled College avenue, from Highwood street towards Fairfield line, using 50 loads of gravel; graded and graveled part of Boutelle avenue, Spring

street graded and graveled; graveled from Cool street, from Western avenue to Oakland street; graveled part of Oakland from the 1st Rangeway this way; Graylock Road graveled; Winter street graveled from Burleigh street to West street; graded and graveled Main street and High street; graded and graveled Getchell street; graded and graveled Pleasant Place entire length. There were 7,487 loads of gravel used this year.

Streets repaired with gravel and road machine were: Water street, Front street, Appleton street, Union street, College avenue, Vigue avenue, Center street, Drummond avenue, 86 loads of gravel; Collins street, Cannabas avenue, Upper Main street, County road, Western avenue, 2nd Rangeway, High street, Spruce street, Marston road, 1st Rangeway turnpiked from Western avenue to Oakland road, Cool street, Oakland road, from Emerson bridge to Oakland line, Mitchell road, Webb road, turnpiked from River road to Eight-rod road, and from Eight-rod road to Oakland line, smoothed with road machine. Eight-rod road and Trafton road repaired with gravel and road machine, also the River road. Elm street and a number of the other streets have been gone over after the heavy rains during the summer. Also there were a number of slight repairs on some of the other streets with gravel.

NEW SIDEWALKS.

New sidewalks and crosswalks for the year were built of concrete, tar brick, and gravel. There were 620.25 sq. yards of concrete walks, 1222 1-2 sq. yards of tar walks. The repairs were made of tar and gravel. There were 364.2 sq. yards of walks resurfaced with tar. Among the new sidewalks and crosswalks were Elm to Center, across Center street (west side of Elm); across Elm street at Temple street; across Charles street at Temple street; at Lockwood Alley; Kennebec street at Water street; Gold street at Water street; Pleasant street at School street; Water at Gray street; Main street to College Ave.; Kelsey street (north side) Common street, Getchell street to R. R. crossing on College avenue; brick crosswalk at Temple and Main streets, corner of Bridge and Water streets, crosswalk; Summer and Gray street, crosswalk; Pleasant street and Winter street, crosswalk; Main street from Brook to Chaplin street, sidewalk; Boutelle avenue (south side) sidewalk.

The walks graveled were College avenue, from Highwood street to Greenwood street, part way on both sides of Maple street, on south side of Brook street; graveled Pearl street sidewalk; built new sidewalk on Nash street; repaired part of sidewalk on Morrill avenue; repaired part of sidewalk on West street; graveled Gilman street sidewalk to Burleigh street; Burleigh street sidewalk graded and graveled from A. L. Tripp's to W. L. Keene's garage; built new gravel sidewalk on (north side) of Oak street; new gravel sidewalk on (south side) of Kelsey street in front of H.

Pomerleau's new house; re-graveled sidewalk on Main street, from Merrick's upper line to Winters' house; graded and graveled sidewalk on College Ave. in front of Mr. Ramsdell's.

SPRINKLING.

The sprinkling was started earlier this year than usual, it being March 22. There were 43,284 gals. of oil used on the following streets: College avenue to Highwood street, Getchell street, North street, Center street, Gilman street, Burleigh street, Elm street, Main street from R. R. crossing to Bartlett's residence; on Lockwood street in front of Bay View Hotel; Bridge street, Water street, from Main street to foot of Lockwood hill; Silver street, Spring street, and Pleasant street from Western avenue to Gilman street; and the other streets which were sprinkled were sprinkled with water.

CATCH BASINS AND MANHOLES.

New catch basins for the year were: one on Pine street, one on Carrean Lane, one on Gray avenue, two on Burleigh street, two on Gilman street, two on Cannabas Avenue, one on Charles street, one on Keyes sewer, one on Temple street near Craig's store. There were three new manholes built on Keyes sewer. Catch basins repaired were: one on Redington street, one on King street, three raised and repaired on Pleasant street, and two manholes raised on Silver street.

DRIVEWAYS.

There were thirty new wooden boxes made for driveways, two on Middle street, two on Hazlewood avenue, one on Main street, two on Oak street, two on Webb Road, three on Boutelle avenue, four on Gilman street, three on Burleigh street, one on Water street, three on Prospect street, two on High street, and five plank driveways on Silver street; also there were two concrete driveways, one at Morrisette's on Water street, and one at Hebert's.

There were 13 corrugated culverts built, four on River road, one on Silver street, one on Burleigh street, one on Center street, one on Cannabas avenue, one on Main street, one on Sanger avenue, one on Western avenue, one on Gilman street, and one on Collins street.

BRIDGES.

There was one new bridge built this year on the Messalonskee Stream at Gilman street. Emerson bridge (at the end of Silver street) was replanked and the railing repaired with iron posts. The bridge at the pumping station, on Western Ave., replanked.

BROWN-TAIL MOTHS.

When the brown-tail moth work was turned over to me in the spring I found it necessary to go over some of the ground the second time. There are not many brown-tail moth nests this spring, but it will be necessary to go over all the ground to get what there are.

The shade trees on a number of streets were in a dangerous condition, and I have removed a number of trees that were not safe, and also removed all decayed branches on others. The work should be given more attention and a lot of trimming done this spring.

STATE AID HIGHWAY.

There were 3,080 ft. of State Aid Highway built this year, on the River Road, beginning at the Emerson Bridge, and extending to the Hitchings' Farm. There were 1,690 loads of gravel used. By grading the bank and building 2,232 ft. of guard rail making more of a cost. The guard rail wasn't painted as it was so late in the season, but it is to be painted in the spring.
