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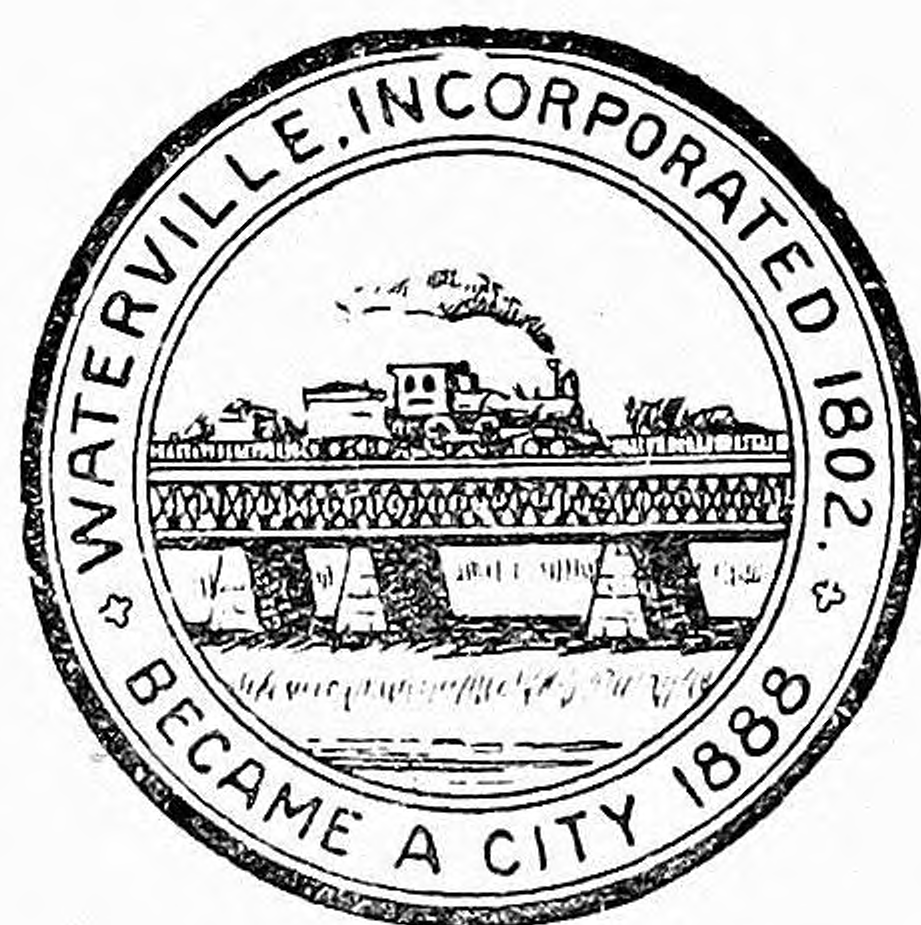

## Mayor's Report.

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To the Members of the City Council:

I have the honor at this time to submit a very brief report on the administration of the city's affairs during the last year and to make one or two recommendations for the future.

At the beginning of this administration we found ourselves facing a very serious and difficult financial problem. Our bonded indebtedness was \$406,000.00, \$20,000.00 of which matured July 1, 1917. We found outstanding notes to the amount of \$140,000.00; \$70,000.00 of which was due Nov. 21st, 1916; \$50,000.00 due January 31st, 1917, all of which were being carried by the First National Bank of Boston as overdrafts; and \$20,000 at the People's National Bank due in April of 1917. At your suggestion the Mayor and City Solicitor went to Boston to see what arrangements could be made with the First National Bank until the 1917 taxes became due. After a long conference the First National Bank agreed to finance us on the condition that we would reduce our note indebtedness at least \$30,000.

The whole matter was then gone over by your Committees on Finance and Appropriations and it was found that, to make the reduction of \$30,000-agreed to, to pay the increase in State and County taxes, the increased running expenses and the annual appropriations, a tax rate of 30 mills was necessary.

Fully realizing what this meant to the taxpayers of Waterville we at once started in on the policy, which I recommended at the beginning of our administration, of making no permanent improvements but simply to endeavor as best we could, under the circumstances, to make all necessary repairs and keep up what work had been done in the past. This policy we have carried out and I wish at this time to congratulate you on the result. We have reduced the note indebtedness, as we agreed, \$30,000.00, and will close this administration with overdrafts amounting to only a little over \$11,000. Until the city can be placed on a firmer financial foundation I recommend that the same policy which we adopted be continued.

Early in the administration we made some necessary repairs on the interior of the City Hall, and I believe have reason to be proud of the appearance of the home of our city officials. Early in the year it



was found necessary to replace one of the boilers in the City Hall. A new one was installed and we now have an up-to-date heating plant.

The matter was brought to our attention of the heavy expense in the police department for public auto and carriage hire. After fully considering the matter it was decided to purchase a police patrol auto and I am sure that everyone at all familiar with this department is satisfied that a saving has been made and the efficiency of the department increased. A slight overdraft appears in this department owing to the fact that the wages of all our policemen have been increased.

The past year has been a record breaker for additional burdens in the case of two of our departments. An overdraft appears in the Poor Department. This is accounted for by the greatly increased cost of food, fuel, clothing, and the fact that in the case of many of our poor families the principal wage earner has enlisted in the army or navy.

The Street Department is the other I have in mind. You all remember the very late spring, the amount of rainfall, and the difficulty our Commissioner had to find an opportunity to lay his Tarvia on account of the repeated rains. This, together with the unprecedented winter, accounts for the overdraft in this department.

We have recently revised our City Ordinances and Building Code in compliance with recommendations of the New England Insurance Exchange and we are advised that when they are in force our insurance rates will be reduced. The high efficiency of our fire department is clearly shown by the very small property loss by fire during the last year.

I wish to thank the members of the City Government and the heads of the various departments for their assistance and courtesy to me at all times during the year.

## Board of Health Report.

Waterville, Maine, February 1, 1918.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of Waterville:

Gentlemen:—The Board of Health submit the following report for the year ending Jan. 31, 1918.

Our city has been very free from contagious diseases for the past year. While there have been a few cases of Diphtheria, Scarlet fever, Typhoid fever, Measles, Whooping cough and Chicken pox, nothing that approached an epidemic has occurred. Early in the spring we had two cases of Smallpox, one a resident of the city and the other a transient. Both were under quarantine and those who had come in direct contact with them were vaccinated, and no other cases occurred. We have been very fortunate during the recent outbreak of Smallpox in surrounding cities and towns that we have not had a case.

It was with regret that we were obliged to suspend enforcing our most excellent meat code because of your failure to make an appropriation sufficient to carry it on, even in a modified form. However, we have done what we could under the circumstances.

All nuisances that have come to the attention of the Board have been attended to promptly.

We recommend that our sewerage system in the newer section of the city be extended, and that all stagnant pools of water be oiled during the coming spring and summer.

During the last year an order was passed by your board authorizing the purchase of a set of wagon scales. Upon investigation of the conditions, it was found that the future outlook would not warrant the purchase of anything less than a set of twenty-tons capacity.

While this may seem excessive, the increased use of motor trucks will demand this capacity soon. A set of this size has been installed at Augusta this season; also one at Lewiston.

The cost of such a set was found to be approximately \$1,000.00. It was decided that the condition of the City finances would not warrant this expense.

However, it is almost imperative that such an outfit be installed as there is absolutely no way of checking heavy loads of various materials. Also the source of revenue from such an equipment would be a big interest on the investment, as well as a great convenience to a large number of our citizens.

## City Engineer's Report.

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Waterville, Maine, Feb. 1, 1918.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

Gentlemen:—I herewith submit the following report as a general summary of this department for the current year.

### SEWERS.

**RUSSELL ST.** 351 feet of 8 inch tile sewer, connecting with the existing manhole on Western Ave., has been built. A manhole was also built at the Frances St. end.

**FRANCES ST.** 250 feet of 8 inch tile sewer was laid westerly on this street, connecting with the Russell St. manhole. All of the existing houses except one along the above two streets have been connected.

**KIMBALL ST.** About 100 feet of this 12 inch sewer was broken and had to be relaid early in the season. A manhole was also built at the same time on the land of Jas. Parent.

This sewer was also extended westerly from its terminus at the west side of Kimball St. 234.6 feet to a manhole built in the center of a proposed street westerly of Kennebec St.

**MESSALONSKEE AVE.** Owing to a portion of the present Western Avenue sewer being on private land, and its capacity being limited, it was deemed advisable to change the outlet by building down Messalonskee Avenue about 250 feet, thence across the land of Elbridge Foster to the Messalonskee Stream. This work was not begun until late in the season and was not completed. The earth excavation was about all completed, and the drilling started but no blasting was attempted. When completed this sewer will consist of 400 feet of 12 inch tile sewer and three manholes. This should be completed just as soon as the weather will permit this spring.

### HAYDEN BROOK SEWER.

During the year just passed the largest amount of construction of any year has been accomplished on this project.

Early in the season two heavy rains caused the inundation of a large



portion of the residential section along both branches of Hayden Brook.

Owing to these conditions, and to the fact that the price of materials entering into this construction advancing rapidly, it was deemed economy to build as much as possible at once. Bids were called for on this work and the contract was awarded to Edmond Cyr & Co., May 4th.

This contract included the construction of the main sewer to the approximate north line of Oak St., and of about 500 feet of 48 inch sewer easterly along Oak St. to intersect the Libby Brook branch.

Actual work was begun June 13th, and the contract was completed Oct. 12th.

Owing to the large expense which would be involved in making connection to the Brook and also the fact that several hundred dollars would have to be expended to repair the culvert at Drummond Avenue and High St., it was deemed advisable to extend the main sewer across High St. A contract was made with Edmond Cyr & Co. to build 385 feet additional of 54 inch sewer. This contract was completed Nov. 12th.

In connection with this work the 12 inch sewer on Oak St. from Ticonic to May Streets was removed, the May St. sewer now emptying directly into the 48 inch branch. Nine catchbasins were built as needed in connection with this work, and three manholes were constructed. One unlooked for result of this work was the drainage of the reservoir on Oak St. opposite Ticonic. This was a self-filling one but the building of the sewer cut the water supply which now makes the reservoir useless.

### NEW SIDEWALKS.

New sidewalks have been built on the following streets: Water St., Silver St., Spring St., Park St., and Temple St.

### CROSSWALKS.

New concrete crosswalks have been built on Summer St., on Redington St. at Water St., on Main St. at Pleasant St., and on Pleasant St. at Dalton St.

### NEW STREETS.

Frances Street has been accepted, and Gold Street relocated. This relocation was necessitated by the widening of this street opposite King Street, by the purchase of a strip of land from Philip Proulx.

### CONCRETE PAVING.

At the junction of Water and Bridge Streets, the conditions for travel have been bad owing to the impossibility of keeping the streets properly graded, because of the junction of the two street railway



tracks. Between and adjoining these tracks has been surfaced with concrete paving, the railroads paying their proportionate share.

### STATE AID ROAD.

The State Aid Highway improvement for the season of 1917 was a continuation of the work of 1916; from a point near the residence of George E. Hallowell southerly to a point between the "Webb Road," so called, and the residence of Thomas Reynolds. A large culvert has also been built in connection with this work a short distance beyond the Reynolds residence. This was built of segment blocks rejected from the Hayden Brook sewer work. It is 60 inches diameter with concrete ends. By using this material a good culvert was secured at a small cost.

The 1918 State Aid work will be a continuation of the work of the last preceding three years.

### GRAVEL PIT.

Owing to the excessive cost of hauling gravel from the City pit, or from the Pooler pit, it was deemed necessary to obtain gravel nearer the work, if the State Aid Road improvements were to continue. Very good gravel was found in several places near the present work, and a deed was obtained from Mr. W. W. Payne for the gravel on one-fourth acre of his farm, the City to have four years in which to remove it. For this reason the work on this road should be continued with all possible speed, in order to complete the improvement to the Sidney line before the expiration of the deed.

### BRIDGES.

The Ticonic Bridge, Emerson Bridge, and Crommett Bridge have been painted the past season.

As mentioned in my last report, this work was very much needed, and we trust they will not be allowed to get in such bad shape again.

### HASSAM PAVING.

As anticipated in my report for 1916, the Bicomac top on the Hassam paving of the 1916 work did not prove satisfactory. This was renewed early in the season by the Hassam Paving Co. at no expense to the City, and is proving highly satisfactory.

The same company also made quite extensive repairs to the work on Center and Winter Streets. This was not their original work, but their "Bicomac" material seems well suited for such repairs and will doubtless prove as good at least as the original.

### LINES AND SURVEYS.

Street lines have been run in connection with the foregoing work,



on Oak St., May St., High St., Spruce St., Drummond Ave., Gold St., King St., Summer St., Water St., Spring St., Silver St., Temple St., and River Road.

Plans have been made of all the above work as necessary. Another sewer plan has also been made for the use of this office. A plan has also been made showing the location of all street lights. A new index of the streets has been made this season and a loose leaf description of all of the streets and roads made. This has involved a large amount of work and should prove valuable.

### SEWER PERMITS.

There have been issued 15 sewer connection permits.

### SUGGESTIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS.

During the past year an order was passed to extend the Boutelle Ave. Sewer from its present terminus near North St. Owing to the scarcity of labor it was found impossible to perform the work. This should be done at the earliest date possible and the Edgemont Ave. sewer connected.

The Hayden Brook Sewer is now in a condition where work can be suspended for a year or two if deemed advisable. It must not be left indefinitely, however, but should be completed by extending the westerly branch about 400 feet, and the easterly branch to above Abbott St.

It will be only a few years when the outlet will have to be carried down the Messalonskee to a point sufficient to overcome the present objections.

New sections of retaining wall on Water Street should be built the coming season as portions of the old crib are unsafe.

During the coming year, Ticonic Bridge will need planking again. This is an expense that amounts to about \$800 every two years. It would seem that either hardwood planking should be tried or that wood lug block paving laid in asphalt should be used. In this connection I wish to call your attention to strength of several of our bridges. Under the State Laws at the present time a load of nine tons is allowed to be carried over our highways and bridges. This is a pretty stiff load for the floor construction of Ticonic Bridge, and the builders of Emerson Bridge inform me that the deck of this bridge is designed to carry about 2½ tons.

The use of Tarvia for sprinkling should be continued to preserve our improved streets, although the present price is about 200% greater than in 1916.

Owing to the scarcity of labor and teams during the past season the State was unable to provide a constant patrol of our highways.



In consequence, some of our improved highways rapidly deteriorated during the summer.

I would suggest that early in the coming season the City purchase a combined road machine and scarifier, to be used in connection with the tractor. In fact all our highway work should be done as largely mechanically as possible.

## City Electrician's Report.

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Waterville, Maine Feb. 12, 1918.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

I hereby submit the following report of this department for the current year.

No large additions to or changes have been made in the street lighting system the past season.

New lights have been installed as follows:

- 1 250 c. p. on Edwards St.
  - 1 250 c. p. on Ash St.
  - 1 250 c. p. at end of Dalton St.
  - 1 250 c. p. on High St., between Main St. and Drummond Ave.
  - 1 250 c. p. on Main St., near J. Baxter's.
  - 1 250 c. p. on Water St.
  - 1 200 c. p. at junction of Main St. and College Ave.
- The 32 c. p. light on Hillside Ave. replaced by one of 250 c. p.

At City Hall a new lighting system in the corridors was installed, in connection with the repairs made early in the year, "Brasscolite" fixtures and gas filled lamps being substituted for the antiquated fixtures.

A signal arrangement has been installed at Main and Common Streets, operated from Police headquarters. This is used to call patrolmen if wanted, and has proved efficient.

The Gamewell Fire Alarm System has worked perfectly the past year. There have been several short interruptions on two or three of the circuits, caused by lightning or sleet storms. These, however, have never interfered with operation when necessary. The bell striker at St. Francis de Sales Church has been moved down from its former location, to a more accessible one.

The wiring in the Opera House is in extremely bad shape and should be put in a more up-to-date and safer condition. The lighting fixtures should also be rebuilt to give a more modern system.

The wiring at the Myrtle Street School is still in bad shape, and should be remedied.



It must be remembered that under the new schedule rating of insurance, the City is penalized for all defects, and the amount of these would soon pay for the repairs.

HOSE.

There has been none purchased this year, and there should be at least 3,000 ft. purchased the coming season.

HOUSES.

There have been only minor repairs on houses No. 3 and No. 4 this season. At the Central Station the roof has been changed so as to conduct the water down through the inside and it seems that this improvement will work out satisfactorily. We also changed the heating boiler by installing a larger one which was taken out from City Hall. The one taken out of the Fire Station is now loaned to Colby College.

FIRE ALARM SYSTEM.

The fire alarm system this year has worked to perfection, with very small cost.

IMPROVEMENTS.

Improvements this year have been limited to the purchase of one pair of horses, the changing of the roof at the Central Fire Station, and the installation of a new heater.

APPARATUS.

The apparatus consists of one steam fire engine, one two-horse hook and ladder truck, one auto combination and chemical, one two-horse hose and chemical wagon, one two-horse wagon, three one-horse hose wagons, one hand reel, one 50 foot extension ladder not carried on truck, one deluge set, and other small equipment.

## RECOMMENDATIONS.

In closing this report, I am pleased to state that the department has responded to 112 calls this year; 33 box alarms and 79 still alarms and telephone calls and the loss sustained has been one of the smallest since my connection with the department. I attribute the small loss this year chiefly to the effect due on account of inspections being made in the business section of the city and the compelling of owners and tenants to keep their premises and buildings clear of rubbish, etc., and it is the earnest desire of the Chief and Members of this Department to interest the inhabitants of this city to the necessity for their own good as well as that of their neighbors to keep their buildings and yards and stables and garages, and in fact all buildings, as well as heating apparatus, chimneys, flues and anything and everything that could cause or be the cause of starting a fire of any kind or any nature so cleaned that the chances will be reduced to a minimum, and it seems to this department that the ignorance which has been shown in the past in regard to the above, is fast disappearing and the public at large will soon be interested to the extent that there will not be any unsightly piles of rubbish or any hazards allowed to collect in or about any of the premises or property which they own.



Through the labor of the City Engineer, E. W. Crawford, and your humble servant, there has been drawn a new fire district and ordinances, on buildings, explosives, etc., which were passed by the City Government Meeting of Feb. 5th, 1918, and the same is in compliance with the recommendations of the New England Board of Underwriters, and we know that by the adoption of this new fire district and ordinances we have rendered to this City services which will go down in history as the best foundation ever laid in this City. But the same must be put into full force and followed to the letter for the City to receive the benefit which is intended to be derived by the passage of the same, and would recommend that the offices of Building Inspector and Wire Chief, by act of Legislature, be made permanent.

And with the new schedule rating which has just been put in effect, I trust every citizen will co-operate with this Department to the extent of cheerfully submitting to any recommendations that may be offered by any officers whose duty it is to carry out the above ordinances and rules pertaining to the fire district.

At the Annual Meeting of the Firemen, held on Jan. 28th, 1918, the following resolution was unanimously adopted: That the necessary steps be taken to secure a City Fire Commission of five members, to be elected at large, from the City, one member to be elected each year, after creation of commission, thereby giving us a commission free to act without fear or favor, and from knowledge gained by years of experience. And we trust that this Commission may be had at the next session of the Legislature.

I could write numerous pages of recommendations, but it is not worth while. If each citizen of this City will use his best endeavor to reduce to the best of his knowledge any fire hazard that he knows of, he will be co-operating with this Department to the best of his ability, and I wish to assure you, that any complaint properly presented to this Department will receive careful attention.

Thanking all who have contributed to the success of the Department in the past and soliciting their cordial support in the future, I remain,

The Trustees of the Public Library have the honor to submit their report covering the year Feb. 1, 1917, to Feb. 1, 1918.

Hon. Cyrus W. Davis, vice-president of the board of trustees for many years, and a loyal friend of the Library died last November. Hon. Charles F. Johnson has removed to another state but Judge Johnson continues his interest in his home town and his helpfulness to the Library. Ralph J. Patterson has resigned, called by business interests to another state.

The Trustees are able to report the most significant year in the history of the Library. As shown by the report of the Librarian, the circulation of books is much larger than that of most libraries in cities of like population with Waterville. The Reading Room receives the patronage which its extensive and varied list of current publications deserves and the Reference Room is proving of great value to those engaged in special study or investigation.

The number of books in the Library has been greatly increased during the year by the receipt of the General Isaac Sparrow Bangs Library, bequeathed to the city by his widow, Hadassah J. Bangs. The Trustees would make public record of their appreciation of this bequest. By it the names of General and Mrs. Bangs will be held in honored memory and their beneficence to the city of their long residence be long continued. The growth of the Library has now made more shelving for its books an absolute necessity and the Trustees have instructed their president, Dr. F. C. Thayer, and a representative committee to appear before your Board and ask for an appropriation to cover this need. It would seem reasonable that the books coming into the possession of the Library should be properly cared for and made available. For detailed information of the work of the departments you are referred to the reports which are appended. Special attention is called to the report of the Finance Committee. A member of the city government on a recent visit to the Library said, "The work actually done here needs and deserves larger appropriation." Such larger appropriations are necessary in order to meet the needs of this growing city. Books for information, books for study, books



for amusement and intellectual delight, books for inspiration and for patriotism, all these must be provided. And the wear is great. Few of the more popular books ever last a year.

The Library has co-operated with the schools, has bought books on individual request, and has sought to be the school and college and companionable friend of all the citizens. Its privileges are open, free to all and a constantly increasing number are taking advantage of them.

The Library is also well served. The librarian, Miss Jennie M. Smith, and the associate librarian, Miss Adams, are always ready to bring the full resources of the collection to the service of those who ask, even giving expert advice not to serious students only but even to the jaded fiction fiend. Not a little of the popularity of the Library is due to Mr. Frank W. Noble who always seems to regard an opportunity to do anything for the Library or its patrons as a delightful privilege.

In this year of doubt, stress, anxiety, and world-changing events, we believe that the Library has done its full share in informing the citizens, in deepening their patriotism and inspiring their courage. In addition to this home service, it has had honorable part in providing libraries for our soldiers in the camps and in sending literature that should be assuring of the remembrance of those at home, encourage those who have gone out in our defence. The Library has gracefully accepted war conditions in order to do its part toward bringing them to an end.

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To the Board of Trustees of the Waterville Public Library:

I have the honor to submit the 21st annual report of the Waterville Public Library for the year ending January 31, 1918.

The effects of the war on library activities have been noticeable during the year. The prices of books, magazines and supplies of all kinds have increased, also the work of the Red Cross entered into so strenuously by women generally has, we believe, affected the circulation of books as well as the attendance in the Reading Rooms. However these losses are probably compensated for in the greater good



to a greater number the library has been able to accomplish through the contribution to the Library War Fund which it was the means of raising. Very willingly the trustees undertook the task of collecting from the citizens of Waterville a sum of money for the building and equipping of libraries for the war camps and cantonments in this country, the request for this service coming, as to the libraries throughout the country, from the United States Government through the American Library Association. About \$450 was secured. This meant much time and labor on the part not only of the trustees but of many of the Waterville citizens who cheerfully acted as solicitors. The amount contributed speaks for itself as to the generosity of the public, and we feel that a closer fellowship between the library and its constituency must result from this common effort in behalf of our country in this time of its dire need.

The loss of two members from our Board of Trustees has to be recorded, that of Hon. Cyrus W. Davis, vice-president of the board, through his death, which occurred in November, and of Mr. Ralph J. Patterson, who has removed from Waterville and taken up his residence elsewhere.

The hall has been rented seven times, twice for Woman Suffrage meetings, once for a meeting of the Maine Branch of the Little Wanderers' Home, twice for musicals and twice by the Daughters of the American Revolution.

As last year we have received much gratuitous help in the work of the library from Miss Mary Tobey and Miss Beatrice Curtis. Miss Tobey left in the fall to take the Library Science course at Simmons College. Miss Curtis is still giving generously of her time to the work of the Library.

As heretofore the librarian and assistant have attended the two meetings of the Maine Library Association, one at Kittery in the spring and the other at Bangor in the fall.

The Library has this year joined the American Library Association as an institutional member. By so doing we come into closer touch with the library work throughout the country, as well as lend our aid and influence to the cause.

### REGISTRATION.

The number of registrations for the year is 633, a loss from last year of 196. Non-resident subscribers number 13.

In May, 1913, a new registration of those using the library was begun, and since that time the number to register has been 5344. Allowing for those who have left town and those who have died the proportion of patrons of the library to the number of residents of the city, while not of course wholly satisfactory, is, we should say, very good.



## ACCESSIONS.

The number of accessions during the year were 1084. This includes 434 volumes of the Bangs Library received by bequest of Mrs. Hadasah J. Bangs, referred to in the Trustees' Report of last year. Many more from this Library remain to be accessioned and catalogued the coming year. In addition to these 35 books have been presented, making the total number of gifts 469. In the Bangs collection are a number of French, German and Spanish books.

A large number of pamphlets as well as several books on different phases of the war have been received from Prof. W. M. Dixon of the University of Glasgow. The books and some of the pamphlets are catalogued, and all are placed where they are readily accessible to the public. Much valuable war material has been acquired in this way and is apparently appreciated by the public.

The usual magazines have been bound except the Outlook, which has enlarged its size and so the binding has been discontinued. We would suggest however that the numbers be bound as before, as it is a periodical much used in reference work and especially valuable just at this time, as no other of its kind, that is, of a political nature are we preserving in this way.

Fifty-four volumes have been bound during the year.

## CIRCULATION.

The circulation has increased this year over that of last year, the number of books loaned being 47,359, a gain of 484 over last year's record.

This shows the circulation of fiction to have been 33,490 volumes, of non-fiction 13,869 volumes. The largest daily circulation was 388, the smallest 57, the daily average 154.76.

About 575 over due notices have been sent out during the year.

### READING ROOM.

The attendance in the Reading Room has fallen off from last year to the extent of 434 readers. This is due in large measure we believe to war activities. The total number registered for the year was 10,196, a daily average of 33.32.

### REFERENCE ROOM.

It has been interesting to watch and help the young children who come here, sent by their teachers, to look up subjects, quotations from

Two thousand four hundred and twenty-two students have been recorded in this department. This of course leaves out of consideration the large amount of reference work pursued elsewhere than in this room among the reference books strictly so called.

A complete set of the "Nautilus," the periodical published by the High School, in bound volumes has been placed in this room by Harvey Doane Eaton, Jr., for the use of those interested. The set remains in his possession and is to be kept up to date and bound by him.

Also a set of eight volumes of books for the use of the Waterville Child Welfare Study Circle, given to them by Mrs. F. E. Boothby, has been placed in the Reference Room for their use.

#### REPORT OF THE BOOK COMMITTEE.

This year has seen the largest addition of books made in any year of the Library's history. The usual number has been purchased and the receipt of the Bangs Library makes a very substantial addition to nearly all of the working departments of the Library. In accord with the agreement with Mrs. Bangs, many books on military and Grand Army topics were placed in the library of the Waterville Historical Society and will there be available for reference and study. The balance, properly marked to show the source from which they came have been placed, in accord with their class, on the Library shelves. The Book Committee would record its satisfaction in this gift and its gratitude. In no year has the amount available for the purchase of books been sufficient to meet the demand. The committee has always endeavored to provide a large number of books of immediate and current interest, purchasing generally on the date of publication. Almost a library in itself on matters pertaining to the "Great War" has been purchased and this has been largely increased by gifts of societies interested in one side or the other. The great pile of pamphlets on the table next the Library office includes many of great value.

The year has been rich in new and important biographies, e.g. John Fiske, Edward Everett Hale, John Morly and others which are worthy of serious attention.

As usual, your committee has received many valuable books at special sales at prices much below the regular rate. The increase in the number of books makes more shelving a necessity.



The Book Committee again urgently represents that the money at its disposal should be largely increased in order to meet the varied needs of a constantly growing city, a city which makes more demands upon the Library every year, and shows its appreciation by a use of the books in every department far in advance of that shown in most cities of the same size.

## City Solicitor's Report.

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Waterville, Me., Feb. 7, 1918.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

At the beginning of the year there were two pauper suits pending against the city. One with the town of Monmouth which is now still on the docket, and one with the town of Skowhegan, which had brought suit for the support of a minor pauper. There was no question as regards the settlement of the pauper, the matter at issue being as to whether Waterville should pay a part or the whole. Examination of the decisions of the state disclosed that the question of law in this case had been settled and under the facts, this city was liable for the full amount of supplies obtained.

During the month of March another action for pauper supplies was brought by the town of Lisbon against the city. On investigation it appeared that the settlement of the pauper was in the town of Lisbon and not in the city of Waterville and it was decided to contest the case. The case was tried at the January term of Supreme Judicial Court in Androscoggin county and the jury rendered a verdict for the defendant, the city of Waterville. There are no other pauper cases pending against the city that have come to my attention, the town of Monmouth case being the only one undisposed of. Some cases where paupers have been supplied by this city have been investigated with the idea of bringing action unless they were settled by the town where their settlement appeared to be.

One claim against the city was pending for injury due to a defect in the street. The matter appeared to be a pure question of fact for the jury and as the claimant was willing to accept a very reasonable settlement it was disposed of out of court. Another of similar nature was taken care of in the same way. A few claims for injury due to ice and snow have been presented and investigated with the committee on claims, as they seemed to be of a nature that brought them within the provisions of the statute, that municipalities are not liable for injury due to ice and snow on the streets, the committee took no action and no suit to my knowledge has been brought.

This office has assisted that of the overseers of the poor in the placing of several minor paupers in good families where they will be taken care of without expense to the city.

## Street Commissioner's Report.

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To the Honorable Mayor and City Council:

In submitting to you my report for the fiscal year ending January 31, 1918, on streets, sewers, sidewalks, sprinkling, state aid highway, browntail moth work, trimming trees, and bridge work for your consideration, I wish to call your attention to the expenditures and receipts of the different departments. There have been many necessary improvements, also a number of permanent improvements. Some of the permanent improvements were 1594.2 ft. of Hayden Brook sewer, 935.6 ft. of new sewer, 1824 feet of new sidewalks, the Gerald watering trough on College Ave., was relocated and placed on a new foundation.

The increase in wages has been from 10% to 15% and the teams practically the same. The sprinkling Tarvia and oil cost nearly 50% more this year than in previous years. The repairs and maintenance of equipment cost more this year than previously. The scarcity of labor has increased the cost of improvements and repairs more than previous years.

The snow bills this year have been the heaviest for many years, owing to the excessive amount of snow and the extreme cold and windy weather accompanying same.

The strictest economy has been used consistent to good work. I have given my entire time and personal attention to this work, and also have endeavored to have the work done at as small a cost as possible, in a permanent manner.

I wish at this time to thank the different committees, also the city engineer.

The summaries of the work are shown in the following report:

### STREETS.

College Ave. was graded and graveled from Railroad Crossing to Highwood Street, using 1984 loads of gravel. Water Street was graded and graveled, used 1432 loads of gravel. Graveled Butler Ct., 46 loads of gravel used. Turnpiked Veteran Ct. Burleigh Street from West Winter Street to Western Ave., reshaped and rolled. Toward Street used 118 loads of gravel in the grading and graveled.



On Front Street graded and graveled using 285 loads of gravel. Used on Kelsey Street 31 loads of gravel. 81 loads of gravel was used on Oak Street. On Drummond Ave., graded, graveled and rolled, used 678 loads of gravel. Used on Hillside Ave., 123 loads of gravel in the surfacing. 12 loads of gravel were used on Redington Street. Temple Street was graded and rolled from Front Street to Foot Bridge. There was a total of 4790 loads of gravel used, besides a number of loads used in the minor repairs of the different streets.

Turnpiked North Street entire length, Western Ave., from 1st Rangeway to Oakland line, turnpiked Marston Ave., from Western Ave., to North Street, 1st Rangeway to Mitchell Road turnpiked, Webb Road from River Road to Oakland Line turnpiked. Turnpiked Eight Rod Road the entire length. River Road from Hallowell's to Line, turnpiked. Trafton Road from River Road to Eight Rod Road. Turnpiked Brook Street the entire length; turnpiked Edwards Street the entire length; Prospect Street from Main to King Street turnpiked. Turnpiked College Ave., from Highwood Street to line. Redington Street from Summer Street to Water Street turnpiked. Turnpiked Autumn Street from Redington Street to Sherwin Street. High Street from Drummond Ave. to Main Street turnpiked. Turnpiked Front Street from Bay View to Railroad Crossing. School Street from Elm Street to Pleasant turnpiked. Reshaped Ticonic Street from Chaplin Street to Alden also rolled. Repairs were made on Winter and Center Streets to the bituminous concrete surfacing. Rolled Appleton Street.

### SEWERS.

A total of 2,529.8 ft. of new sewer was built this year, including 1,594.2 ft. of Hayden Brook Sewer; on Russell Street 351 ft. of 8" sewer was built, 250 ft. of 8" sewer was built on Frances Street, and on Kimball St. (branch) 334.6 ft. of 12" sewer was built.

### CATCH BASINS AND MANHOLES.

On Drummond Ave., there were three catch basins and one manhole built, one catch basin on Nudd Street was built, on Frances Street one manhole was built, two catch basins were built on Ash Street; on Water Street at the foot of Lockwood Hill one catch basin was built; on Birch Street built over one catch basin, two catch basins were built on Kelsey Street, two catch basins were built on Edwards Street; two manholes were built on Kimball Street, two catch basins and one manhole were built on Oak Street, on the corner of High Street and College Ave., two catch basins were built, and one catch basin built on High Street.



## DRIVEWAYS.

There were two built on Union Street, three built on Main Street, two on Hazelwood Ave., two on College Ave., one on Morrill Ave., one at the Alms House, one on Boutelle Ave., five on Drummond Ave., two on High Street, and two on the 1st Rangeway.

## CULVERTS AND BRIDGES.

On Grove Street there was built a 12", 40 ft. long culvert, a new culvert on the Eight Rod Road, also one replanked. On the Trafton Road one culvert replanked. Culvert replanked on Edwards Street, rebuilt culvert on High Street. 60 loads of gravel were used to fill in the culverts across High Street and Drummond Ave. On account of big washouts the culvert on Webb Road had to have extensive repairs, also there were repairs made on most of the other culverts.

Three of the bridges were painted this year, Ticonic Bridge, Emerson Bridge, and Crommett Bridge, with minor repairs on the other bridges.

## SIDEWALKS AND CROSSWALKS.

There were 1,824 feet of new sidewalks built of tar and concrete. On Water Street 70½ ft. of tar sidewalk, 542 ft. of tar sidewalk on Silver Street, on Spring Street 467½ ft. of tar sidewalk, also 58 ft. of concrete sidewalk; 160 ft. of tar sidewalk on Park Street, on the West side of West Street new gravel sidewalk, and at the corner of Gilman and West Streets a new gravel sidewalk.

New cement crosswalks on Sumner Street, one on Redington Street at Water Street, one on Main Street at Railroad Crossing, one on Pleasant Street at Dalton Street, repairs on Abbott Street sidewalk and on Kelsey Street sidewalk with tar. There were 27 loads of gravel used on Prospect Street sidewalk, 9 loads of gravel used on Hazelwood Ave. sidewalk, and 12 loads of gravel used on Redington Street sidewalk.

## STATE AID HIGHWAY.

The State Aid Highway built this year was from station 69 plus 25 to station 92 plus 25, 2,300 ft. long and 21 ft. wide, a total of 2,114 loads of gravel being used. There were five culverts built of corrugated iron 26 ft. long and 12" dia.; one segment block culvert 26 ft. long and 60" in dia.

## SPRINKLING.

Tarvia was used on the following streets: Silver Street from Kimball Street to Spring Street, Spring Street the entire length; Apple-



ton Street from Front Street to Main Street, Union Street the entire length, Main Street from junction of College Ave. to North Street, North Street from Main Street to Pleasant Street, Main Street from Railroad Crossing to Kelsey Street, Chaplin Street from Main Street to Railroad Crossing, Ticonic Street from Chaplin Street to Oak Street, Alden Street the entire length, Maple Street the entire length; Ash Street from College Ave. to John Fardy's residence, Oak Street from College Ave. to T. F. Cowan's residence, College Ave. from Railroad Crossing to Highwood Street, Water Street from foot of Lockwood Hill to Grove Street. There were 26,496 gallons of Tarvia used.

On the following streets there were two coats of oil used: Water Street from the foot of Lockwood Hill to Main Street, Bridge Street the entire length, Lockwood Street the entire length, Main Street from Kelsey Street to Bartlett's residence, College Ave., from Main Street to Railroad Crossing, Elm Street from Main Street to Silver Street, Western Ave. from Silver Street to the north line of R. W. Hanson's, Pleasant Street the entire length; 24,153 gallons being used.

One coat of oil was used on Western Ave. from R. W. Hanson's to four corners, on the 1st Rangeway from Western Ave. to Fair Grounds, Oakland Street from 1st Rangeway to Cool Street, Cool Street from Oakland Street to Western Ave. This oil was used at Fair time to prevent excessive dust conditions, no assessment being made.
