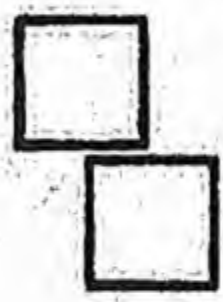
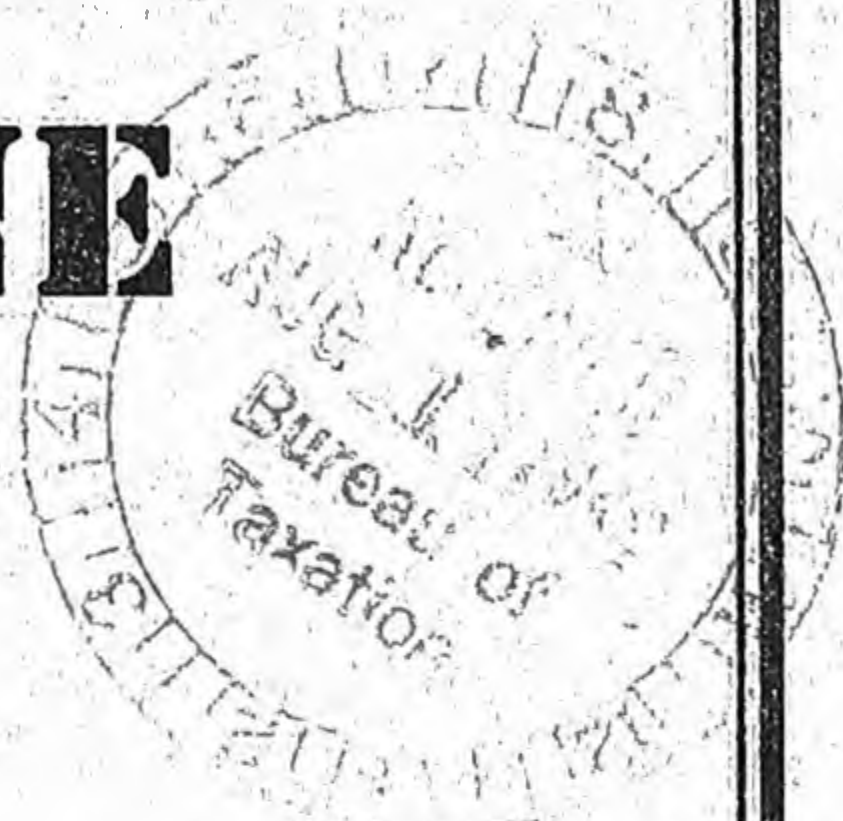

Town meeting, Monday, March 21, 1949, at 8:45 in the forenoon. A moderator will first be elected. The polls will be open from nine o'clock in the forenoon until one o'clock in the afternoon for the election by ballot of three selectmen, three assessors, three overseers of the poor, treasurer, collector, school committee, fire chief, road commissioner, town clerk and any other officers that can legally be elected on this ballot.

It is customary to close the polls at one o'clock in the afternoon and allow sufficient time until one-thirty for inspection and counting of ballots.

If you have purchased or sold any property, real or personal since April, 1948, the statutes require that you report to the Assessors on or before April 1, 1949. Should your property be listed wrongly or name of owner mis-spelled, please notify the assessors at once.

Your attention is called to the fact that the State requires all dog taxes to be paid to the Town Clerk **BEFORE APRIL FIRST.**

Town books close each year on February 20. Taxes are assessed on April 1, and are due when bill is presented. Six per cent interest is collected on all taxes after August 1.

REPORT OF TRUSTEES

The trustess of the Witherle Memorial Library submit herewith their anual report which includes the report of the Librarian, Mrs. Alice C. Bradley.

The number of books in circulation was 11,418, a gain over the preceeding year of 1089. Included in these figures is a circulation of 3743 of juvenile books.

Books were presented to the Library by: Mrs. Jane Dickson, Mrs. Kaden, Miss Trumbull, Mrs. Thomas Wallace, 3rd., Mrs. Tucker, Mrs. Lumis, Miss Bean, Mrs. Young, Mrs. Doudiet, Mrs. Leonard Sawyer, Mr. Lake, Mr. Frederick Chauncey, Mr. Duncan Chauncey, Miriam Young, Mary Danforth, Mrs. Thomas, Wendell Perkins, Jay Pratt, Donald Small, Bernice Gray, Paul Gray, Gailen Bowden, Butterly Brothers, The Elizabeth Hooke Reading Club, Castine Golf Club, Mrs. Charles W. Richardson, Jr., Andover (Mass.) Memorial Library, and the Maine Maritime Academy.

Gifts of magazines were given by Miss Gertrude Lewis, James B. Lake, Mrs. Gause, Mary Duer, Albert Myers, Castine Grange and The Major Minor Music Club.

Gifts of money were given by the Castine Woman's Club, Mrs. Wallace, Mrs. Rargere, Mrs. Clausing, Mrs. Linn, Mrs. Sheldon, Ira J. Williams and Dr. Panofsky, a total of \$33.00.

The back numbers of the magazines were given to the Maine Maritime Academy for use on the training cruise. The children's magazines were given to the grade schools.

The pupils of the grade schools, with their teachers have continued to make splendid use of the library, having what they call, a "Library Period." The stu-

dents of the high school are reading well under the supervision of Mrs. Eleanor Fairley.

A very considerable service was rendered the library by the work of Miss Frances Dunbar and Miss Frances Walker, who have cross-filed all of the fictions and the biography.

A bookcase was given the library by Miss Anna C. Witherle, another case was purchased and a third larger one was built. These cases have been placed in the basement to take care of the overflow of books.

The Librarian was sent as a delegate to the Library Round Table held in Bucksport, to the State Library Conference in Bangor and for a visit to the Ellsworth Public Library.

The Trustees ask for an appropriation for library maintenance of \$900.00 and for fifty cents per taxable poll for library increase for the purchase of books.

The library building was erected in 1912. Over a period of years it has deteriorated both within and without. We realize the citizens desire it kept up in an efficient and suitable manner, therefore this year, it is advisable that certain necessary repairs be made outside and inside. So the trustees are asking for an appropriation of \$800.00 for this purpose.

SCHOOL DEPARTMENT

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

It was necessary to secure a new teacher for the primary room during the early part of the school year when Miss Helen Hackett left. In spite of the teacher shortage Castine was fortunate to have a person like Mrs. Webb, who was willing to fill this vacancy immediately and efficiently.

Because of a large number of sub-primary and first grade pupils attending school from within the village, it seemed advisable to change the customary schedule in such a way that these children would be in attendance during the entire morning session, instead of the two brief periods one in the morning and one in the afternoon, as had been the custom. Bus children of these grades remained at quiet free play within the room under teacher supervision.

There has been a total enrollment of thirty different pupils during the current year in the primary room. Many of these were of a transitory nature, and at present the total membership is 21. Sub-primary 10; Grade 1, 6; Grade 2, 5.

Mrs. Marguerite Fairweather returned to Castine as teacher for grades 3 and 4.

At the beginning of the school year the total enrollment for these grades was 25. Grade 3, 12; Grade 4, 13. At the present time the total enrollment for this room is 24 pupils.

Mr. Sewall Butler from Groton, Conn. was added to the faculty at the Adams School this year. Br. Butler teaches grades 5 and 6, with an enrollment of 20 pupils.

At the beginning of the year teachers of all grades formulated, together, a program of audio-visual aids. This program included films advantageous to all stu-

dents concerned, and have been shown on an average of once a week. In addition to the films, the pupils of this school have enjoyed the combination victrola and rado, which was a gift to the Adams School from Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Wallace.

A very satisfactory hot lunch program has been carried on at Emerson Hall under the able supervision of Mrs. Geneva Sawyer. The prgoram will be offered for ten weeks as in the past. Mrs. Sawyer receives \$15.00 each week for planning and preparing all the meals. The town appropriated an additional \$150.00 to defray the cost of the food. The children each bring 10 cents per day which average about \$3.00 every day. With these funds and some government donations of foods we have been able to offer a very nourishing hot lunch at a very reasonable cost to the youngster. Next year we hope to offer the program for an additional five weeks making fifteen in all. This is the reason for requesting an additional \$150.00 for the program.

With the installation of an electric hot water boiler our facilities will be quite adequate. It is inconvenient to have to heat water on the stove each day for for dish washing and general cleaning.

Teacher supervision of the noon hour was planned through a cooperative rotating schedule of all concerned.

The children are still enjoying music with Mrs. Nina Macomber in charge.

The teachers, particularly those of the upper grades will take advantage of the sights of historic and scientific interest within town for field trips, when the season changes. From such excursions children gain knowledge which otherwise would have to be obtained vicariously through reading. First-hand experiences are always more impressive and longer lived.

Thank you all for your splendid cooperation which is so important in making our educational program successful.

HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Following the established custom, I herewith submit the 1948-49 report for Castine High School.

With the opening of school last fall a much needed change in the physical and academic arrangement of grades 7 to 12 was inaugerated. This new six-year program has moved forward smoothly and rapidly, especially providing numerous advantages for those students in the first two years under the new plan. Longer class recitation periods, use of laboratory equipment, access to a reference library, and expanded recreational and musical offerings are but a few of the advantages under the new arrangement.

Our policy is to provide, as far as practical, the latest materials, texts, and laboratory equipment. Our small enrollment makes such a program possible without undue expense in any subject field. In developing the six-year program we are endeavoring to shorten the academic gap which existed between the eighth and ninth years under the other system. The total enrollment is now as follows: Seniors, 0; Juniors, 1; Sophomores, 8; Freshman, 7; Grade 8, 7; Grade 7, 10. Total 33 students.

With the purchase of a movie projector and through support of the Parent Teachers Association we have been able to make a beginning in the establishment of a good audio-visual program as a supplementary aid to progressive teaching. This equipment is being used in both buildings and offers academic experience not obtainable from the printed page.

Our guidance program directed by Mrs. Fairley has been expanded to include grades 7 and 8 with some special testing and conferences being held in behalf of teachers of the lower grades.

The recreational and athletic programs have been expanded this past year and now include boy's and girls' basketball, social dancing, music, and glee club. Mrs. Nina Macomber and Mrs. Fairley have worked together on the music program; Mrs. Minnie Bowden, our third faculty member, has, with the aid of Mrs. Eleanor Little, conducted the dancing classes which are held in Emerson Hall one afternoon each week.

The past year has been one of true progress. We cannot rest or be satisfied with what has thus far been accomplished. We must aim for more practical courses, especially for the boys and girls who do not plan to continue their education on the college level. There is also need of closer home and school relationships, if our young peoples' problems are to be intelligently solved. Lastly, the generous patronage of school activities received this past year must be continued, if a school is to be maintained of which the citizens can feel justly proud.

The splendid support received from the Superintendent, School Committee, parents, and friends, coupled with the harmony existing within the faculty have made the progress of the past year possible. May we continue to move forward with the task of educating our youth.

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SCHOOL NURSE REPORT

To the Citizens of the Town of Castine :

I hereby submit a brief report of the service rendered the town of Castine by the Hancock County Tuberculosis and Health Association for the period January 1, 1948, to December 31, 1948.

During the past year 13 visits have been made to the town at which times the schools were visited for the purpose of giving classroom inspections, to check up on the seven point pupils, and to give individual inspection to those who were absent when the annual inspection was given.

The school nursing and health education program continues much as before with matters primarily out of public educational health and nursing service problems. Entering children and those in the third, sixth, and ninth grades should receive routine physical examination by a physician. The nurse can only give the inspections and follow up of the remedial defects and corrections when needed. We hope in the future to have each child given medical examination at least every two years in the schools.

The town of Castine with the assistance of the parents and public sponsored a toxoid clinic at Emerson Hall, March 22, for the public and school pupils. Somewhere around 100 received vaccinations and immunization against diphtheria, whooping cough, and tetnus. Dr. Babcock and his assistants were present.

The State Division of Tuberculosis Control sponsored two more Diagnostic Chest X-ray Clinics for the Hancock County patients during April and October at the Ellsworth City Hall, but there were no patients from Castine to attend this year.

The annual physical inspection was given the Castine Primary pupils September 15, the Intermediate

grades, September 28, and the high school, February 28, and consisted of the routine weighing and measuring, the Snellen's test for visions, the whisper test for hearing, inspection of the teeth, throat, scalp, and postural defects, the skin for rashes and sores, and personal cleanliness as well as for symptoms of infectious diseases. The results are as follows:

Number pupils who have defective vision	4
Number pupils who have defective hearing	0
Number pupils who have decayed teeth	24
Number pupils who have temporary teeth decayed	18
Number pupils who are 10% or more underweight	3
Number pupils who are 20% or more overweight	1
Number pupils having defective speech	2

15 pupils in the past few years have had tonsils and adenoids removed by operation. 27 have had dental corrections during the past year. 1 has had the lenses changed. Of the 65 pupils inspected 37 were found to have remedial defects, and 28 eligible to qualify for the seven point.

The service rendered the many towns of Hancock is financed through the sale of Christmas Seals and by the town appropriation for which we wish to express our thanks and appreciation to all who have assisted in this service, for without which we could not carry on.

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING ANNUAL REPORT

1948

It is evident that there is a growing concern for health, not only among families, communities, and states, but throughout the world. In spite of real accomplishments we all recognize that much still remains to be done in the Public Health Field.

Public health nursing is concerned with the total health situation of the family. Because Castine has a nurse employed by the Maine Public Health Association to do the school, and tuberculosos work your Generalized Public Health nurses' part in the total health program has consisted of working with expectant mothers, infants, postpartum patients, and preschool children. Health supervision calls have been made. The value of early immunization, and periodic physical examinations has been stressed. In March, a community immunization clinic was held, and in May a Well Child Conference. Both activities were sponsored by your local Health Council. Immunizations offered were whooping cough, diptheria, tetanus and smallpox. Nutrition and other health problems have been discussed.

The success of any public health program depends upon sound relationships, and public understanding of its goals and accomplishments. Your local Health Council is doing much to promote the health program. They are promoting health projects, and have assumed duties that has enabled the nurse to give more service. I want to take this opportunity to thank the Health Council, Dr. Babcock, the hospital staff, and the public in general for their help in carrying on the health program.
