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# Town Warrant

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*State of Maine,*

*County of Waldo, ss.*

To *Ernest L. Sprague*, Constable of Islesboro:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the town of Islesboro, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall in said town on the seventh day of March, A. D., 1921 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following articles to wit:

Art. 1. To choose a moderator to preside over said meeting.

Art. 2. To choose a town clerk for the ensuing year.

Art. 3. To receive the reports of the several town officers and act upon the same.

Art. 4. To choose selectmen, assessors, one overseer of the poor and all other necessary town officers for the ensuing year.

Art. 5. To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of raising and appropriating money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid as provided in Section 19, Chapter 25 of the revised statutes of 1916.

Art. 6. To see what sum the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the improvement of section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amount regularly raised for the care of highways and bridges.



Art. 7. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as are necessary for:

- (1) Maintenance and support of common schools
- (2) Support of poor
- (3) Repairing roads and bridges
- (4) Repairing school houses
- (5) Sidewalks
- (6) Purchase of text-books
- (7) Music in schools
- (8) Maintenance of Free Public Library
- (9) Paying interest on and liquidating the town debt and defraying all other necessary town charges for the ensuing year.

Art. 8. To see if the town will support a Free High School for the ensuing year.

Art. 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the maintenance of a Free High School for the ensuing year.

Art. 10. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for sprinkling streets for the ensuing year.

Art. 11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the lighting of streets for the ensuing year.

Art. 12. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to repair the D. C. Warren road, so called.

Art. 13. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sufficient sum of money to pay the overdraws of the different accounts as per selectmen's report.

Art. 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500 to abate the Islesboro Inn Co.'s tax for the year of 1921.

Art. 15. To see what wages the town will vote to pay men and horses for labor on the highway for the ensuing year.

Art. 16. To see what per cent the town will vote to pay its tax collector for collecting the taxes for the ensuing year and the length of time from date of commitment taxes shall be paid to the treasurer.

Art. 17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the town treasurer to make temporary loans not exceeding \$6,000.

Art. 18. To see if the town will vote to support a school at the Mill Creek District for the ensuing year.

Art. 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000 for salary of Dr. B. E. Larrabee to March 1st, 1922.

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The selectmen give notice that they will be in session at Town Hall at nine o'clock in the forenoon on day of said meeting for the purpose of revising the list of voters of Islesboro.

*To the Superintending School Committee:*

I herewith submit to you, and through you to the citizens of the Town of Islesboro, my third annual report as Superintendent of schools.

The condition and progress of the common schools has been very satisfactory during the past year. None but competent teachers have been included on the force, and some of these have combined training, experience, interest in their work and personal qualities which make for high efficiency. Attendance has been very good in general, in some schools better than in the past three years. The course of study, the same as followed in the other three towns comprising the union, has not been changed except by slight additions and changes of text-books used, and by the addition of health instruction and physical exercises as now compelled by the new law. The latter is not yet perfected in all schools, but will be in so far as possible as soon as complete instructions are sent out by the State. All schools are however, now doing considerable work in this line.



At the close of the past school year in June the resignations of Miss Norma Stanley and Mrs. Arlene Pendleton were received with regret. Miss Elsie M. Chatto was transferred to another school in this union. These three vacancies were filled successfully by the appointments of Miss Ethel Lee to the Parker school, Mrs. Bernice T. Monroe to the Pendleton primary room, and Mrs. Adelmarr G. Hatch to the Dark Harbor school. Miss Lee is a graduate of the local high school and of Maine Central Institute, where she took the Teachers' Training Course. Mrs. Monroe is a Normal School graduate, also a graduate of the State's Special Training Course for "Helping Teachers." She has also had varied experience, last year being a special teacher in Pittsfield, and has also been engaged as a speaker at various educational meetings. Mrs. Hatch is a graduate of Castine Normal School and has previously taught successfully in this and other towns.

Soon after the opening of the Fall term it was found that the increase in number of pupils in the Dark Harbor School had so increased the number of classes that one teacher could no longer accomplish first-class with all of them. Consequently the school committee authorized arrangements to re-open the vacant room for the primary pupils, leaving the grammar grades only in charge of the original teacher. Mrs. Shirley Pendleton, a former student at Castine Normal, was engaged to take over the charge of the primary room. This change had been regarded as a possible necessity as early as the previous Spring term, but not early enough to make financial provision for it. However the certainty of doing so much better work with the children seemed to fully justify the additional expenditure. It was realized, however, that this arrangement would result in an overdraw of the common school fund at the end of the fiscal year. This overdraw, however, has not been large.

## HIGH SCHOOL

A good spirit of co-operation and work has prevailed in this part of our school system during the whole of the past year. Classes have been making excellent progress, and satisfaction and harmony have been the usual thing. We were fortunate in again having



Mr. Monroe in charge, and both Miss Olive Coombs and Miss Dorothy Sylvester have proved to be eminently suited to the position of assistant and instructor in English, Latin, French and History. Every opportunity had been offered to enable every student to receive an excellent high school course.

The number of students during the Fall has been 24, with seven in the first year class, none in the second year class, thirteen juniors and four seniors. While this number is not large as compared with many high schools, yet I feel a strong conviction that the expenditure of even more money would be amply justified if necessary, in order that this number of our young people may secure a high school education without breaking home ties or leaving town. If the town were to pay the tuition of the same number of students, sending them away to other schools, the cost would be practically the same. In addition to this would be an enormously increased expense for board, travel, etc., to be met by the parents.

A notable addition to the equipment of the high school has been made in the Science laboratory room, at a cost of only about eighty dollars to the town. The members of the former Parent-Teachers Association have sold the unused Manual Training benches, and have given the proceeds to be used to pay for a fine new work table for Chemistry and Physics. This new bench is a very substantial piece of equipment, designed to accommodate twelve to fourteen students at one time. This is about the number now making use of it, as a good sized class is taking text-book and laboratory experiment work in Chemistry this year. This subject has not been given for several years. The chemicals, glass ware and rubber goods etc., for this work were paid for by the above mentioned eighty dollars.

The school again took part in the Knox-Waldo High School Music Festival, held at Belfast last May. The school was to have been well represented at the Music Festival at Bangor last October had not circumstances prevented at the last moment. The musical talent of the school has for several years been a noteworthy feature, and it is to be hoped that interest in it will continue undiminished.

The formation of a successful girls' basketball team this Winter was a good sign and showed school spirit and school activity. The



elusive thing called "school spirit" is as necessary to a good high school as teachers and text-books. The teachers who can fan this into flame and keep it burning are always worth more than their salaries, whatever they may be.

The work of the town officers in restoring the building to such excellent condition, with the addition of fine and modern sanitary arrangements, has been and will be, of untold benefit to the school. The accomplishment of such improvements, which are in keeping with the times, is a great encouragement to all parents and school workers. None of the town's money was better spent than this.

### TEXT-BOOKS AND SUPPLIES

The cost of text-books and all school supplies has been extremely high during the past year, and still continue so. We have practised economy where possible to do so without injury to the schools. The money in this fund has been expended by the Superintendent in such a manner as count for as much as possible, and these items supplied on call of the teachers with as much promptness as possible. Not all of the calls for new books and materials have been filled, it is true, but these have been carefully considered in all cases. Several kinds of new supplementary readers have been supplied, also a new and up-to-date American History series to be used in replacing the old ones now fast wearing out. A full supply of Glenn W. Starkey's History and Government of Maine has been supplied for use as a study and also as a reader. For the high school a new set of Algebras, First Year Latin, and some other new and improved sets have been put in use. Also a new set of Chemistry books. More "busy work" and other material is needed still for primary grades. New sets of music books are now needed both in the high school and grade schools, if we are to carry on this work to good advantage.

### BUILDINGS AND REPAIRS

New and clean sanitary accommodations have been built by the school committee for the Parker and Ryder schools, as well as new foundation for the Parker building. New storm windows have



been supplied for the high school main room, and the two rooms in the Dark Harbor building. These will help to do away with the complaint of cold and drafty rooms in these places, as well as help to economize fuel.

The double set of doors leading into the high school rooms were not authorized to be repaired last Fall, but should be this year, in order to be in keeping with the rest of the building. New inside paint and wall paper are badly needed in the Parker school room. The new foundation of the Parker school still needs to be closed in with boarding, or in some manner made tight, as complaint is made this winter that the floors are cold and wind draws up through them. Some work on repairing seats and furniture needs to be done in some school rooms, as this would be a saving to the town and prevent an early necessity of buying new. If small troubles can be repaired the total destruction of a costly piece of furniture is thereby prevented.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

The school committee and superintendent have carefully considered the probable costs of the various schools for the next year. It must also be remembered that all overdraws as well as unexpended balances are now being carried forward on each account. Salaries of teachers, the state and country over certainly will not be less during the next year. Expense of fuel, janitors and school supplies of all kinds will probably vary but little. Consequently recommendations have had to be figured chiefly by costs met with in the past twelve months. It seems probable that Dark Harbor will continue next year to need to run its two rooms in order to do justice by the children.

In voting money for the repair fund it is hoped that the needed items of work mentioned above will be kept in mind. The amount of money voted for common schools will determine the number of weeks of school to be held. We have endeavored in the past to maintain the standard school year of 36 weeks, which is enough, but none too many. The least number of weeks allowed by law is 30. It is hoped not to cut the length of our school year.

## REPORT OF LIBRARY COMMITTEE

*To the Selectmen of Islesboro:*

Since November, 1902, when we first opened our doors to the public in the upper room of the school house, Dist. No. 4, to our first move to the little house under the hill and then our second move in 1919 into the new building, we feel that our work has been constructive, progressive and we hope largely satisfactory.

Our accessive books show about 3500 volumes on our shelves now. Sometimes you ask, "Who selects these books?" And we answer, "In large part, you do."

For, so far as our funds will allow, any book you ask for is bought providing it is a book that will be of interest to others also. We wish that we might obtain for you more current fiction but a book that we used to get for \$1 now costs \$1.80; almost twice as much. We pay our librarian more, fuel is higher and we have a janitor, so we do not have so much money to spend for books. We had several gifts this year, as you will notice from librarian's report.

One of the big things presented to us of which we know, you are all proud, is the flag-pole and flag raised to the breeze last September.

We would express our thanks again to Capt. John Davis, who presented the fine pole, finished it and equipped it with halyards top, etc. and then set it up.

To Mr. W. S. Pendleton of New York, through his daughter, Miss Harriett Pendleton, we give grateful appreciation for the beautiful flag.

There were some other expenses with preparing the ground. Of this \$20 was paid by Alice L. Pendleton and \$12 was paid from the library appropriations.
