ALL TAXPAYERS SHOULD READ THE FOLLOWING REQUIREMENTS AND COMPLY WITH THEM

Section 70, Chapter 13, Revised Statutes of Maine, 1930:

“Before making an assessment, the Assessors shall give seasonable notice in writing to the inhabitants, by posting notifications in some public place in town, or shall notify them in such ways as the town at its annual meeting directs, to make and bring in to them true and perfect lists of their polls and all their estates, real and personal, not by law exempt from taxation, of which they were possessed on the first day of April of the same year. If any resident owner, after such notice, does not bring in such lists, he is thereby barred of his right to make application to the Assessors or County Commissioners for any abatement of his taxes, unless he offers such list with his application and satisfies them that he was unable to offer it at the time appointed.”

NEWPORT AT A GLANCE

Newport, a town of 2,052 inhabitants, census of 1940, is located on Federal State Highway No. 2 and the junction of state highways 7, 11 and 100, and is a trading center for a large area.

Industries include a wood-working mill, owned by the Banton Brothers, the Daniel E. Cummings Company, the H. P. Hood and Son Company, Portland Packing Company, Danforth Saw Mill. There are several garages, including the Friend and Friend establishment and the Paine Motor Company. Several fine grocery stores, drug stores, beauty parlors, clothing, hardware and candy stores. Two restaurants and barber shops.

Churches include the First Church of Christ, Scientist, the High Street Union Church, the People's Methodist Church, and the Jubilee Full Gospel Church.

There are many fine farms and potato growing is an important business for many farmers.

Milk routes are established and both raw and pasteurized milk are obtainable at all times.

Many of the residents are families coming here for summer vacations from other states to finally locate in Newport.

There are more than 200 cottages around Lake Sebasticook, which is well known for its scenic beauty, and tourists find the fishing excellent as the lake has been stocked with salmon, brown trout and white perch.

There are many overnight places and Christie's Camps and Weymouth's Cottages are known far and wide.

Jones Inn, the only hotel, is centrally located at the corner of High and Main Streets.

"Kingsbury's," on the south shore of Lake Sebasticook, is one of the finest vacation spots for miles around. It is owned and operated by Mr. and Mrs. Charles R. Kingsbury, residents of Newport for many years.

Newport is an old town, the first survey having been made about 1892. Its streets are tree-lined with beautiful elms which are older than the town itself. All in all, it is a nice place to live.

REPORT OF MUNICIPAL OFFICERS

Although many towns must increase their tax rate this year, a very cooperative budget committee has shown it possible to hold our present rate.

A substantial increase in excise taxes during the past year allowed us to make a few improvements which were impossible in previous years. It was necessary to purchase a new heating plant for the town hall building; also to paint and do a great deal of repairing; build a parking lot; purchase chairs for the town hall; rewire and purchase new fixtures for the entire building. We were compelled to do this rewiring by the insurance underwriters, therefore had to set up the cost as an amount to be raised this

year. A very fine job was accomplished with separate circuits for the power machinery in the garage and fire room.

Our last bond was paid this year so that no bonds are now out against the town.

The increased cost of labor and materials caused us to be compelled to use up our overlay. The budget as set up this year should take care of this so to allow the overlay each year to pay the remaining debt without appropriating directly for it.

We are pleased that our road commissioner, Fred A. Whittemore, could complete so much work; keep all the trucks in first class repair; and not overdraw the highway summer work appropriation.

The winter work is another proposition. Although \$7,000 was raised, the leased truck and plow had to be paid for from this appropriation, leaving \$2,900 for the six months of winter work and nearly all of this was used up last spring from Feb. 1 to April 1 out of snow removal and repairing badly damaged roads.

It will be noted that the budget is set up to pay for the leased pumper and not increase the tax rate. This was considered good economy, as by doing so the appropriation for interest can be lowered from \$1,100 to \$700. This pumper is more than paying for itself on account of out-of-town fires. During the past year \$1,530 has been realized from out-of-town fires.

A new system of parking must be set up this year and Articles 31, 32 and 33 in the town warrant should be thought over carefully before town meeting.

A fine job has been done by our tax collector, Robert R. Rich. Only about \$1,700 of a \$97,000 commitment remaining unpaid.

We recommend the appropriation of the \$5,000 for school building sinking fund and the enlightenment of every citizen with the different legislative proposals and State School Commissions' recommendations so that when a workable proposition is offered we will be in a position to take advantage of it. There is a committee of interested citizens ably taking care of this very neces-

sary program.

Our superintendent of schools, Clayton A. Storer, and our school committee, Frank F. Boylan, Ralph Gray, and Mrs. Alta Carter, have done a wonderful job during the past year, also our always reliable fire department.

The excellent work of Myrtle York as treasurer and bookkeeper and collector of excise taxes is appreciated by everyone.

Fine cooperation has been shown by the officials and inhabitants during the year.

The meeting of the Budget Committee was held Feb. 15, 1949, in the Agriculture Shop and the following recommendations were made:

TOWN WARRANT

To William L. Sawyer, a constable in the Town of Newport, in the County of Penobscot:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn all the Inhabitants of the Town of Newport, aforesaid, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall in said town on Monday, the seventh day of March, 1949, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following articles of the warrant.

- Art. 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art. 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year and fix compensation therefor.
- Art. 3 To hear all reports made for the fiscal year 1948-49 and act upon same.
- Art. 4 To choose three or more Selectmen, Assessors, and Overseers of Poor and fix compensation therefor.
- Art. 5 To choose a Town Treasurer and fix compensation therefor.
- Art. 6 To choose one or more members of the Superintending School Committee and fix compensation therefor.
- Art. 7 To choose a Night Watchman and fix compensation therefor.

- Art. 8** To choose a Chief Engineer and Assistants of the Fire Department and fix compensation.
- Art. 9** To choose a Road Commissioner and fix compensation therefor, or instruct Selectmen to appoint a Commissioner.
- Art. 10** To determine when the Tax List for the year 1949 shall be committed for collection, also when taxes shall be paid, and what instructions if any, the Inhabitants will give in relation to same.
- Art. 11** To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year and fix compensation therefor.
- Art. 12** To choose all remaining town officers required or permitted to be chosen at the annual Town Meeting, and to determine how many, if any, shall be appointed by the Selectmen.
- Art. 13** To see if the Inhabitants of the Town will vote to authorize its Treasurer to make temporary loans, said loans to be approved by the Selectmen, and not to exceed the total tax levy of the preceding municipal year in which they are made; said loans to be paid out of money raised by taxes during the current year in which loans are made, in accordance with provisions of Section 83, Chapter 5, of the Revised Statutes of Maine, and acts amendatory thereto, and for purposes therein permitted.
- Art. 14** To see if the Inhabitants of the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen on behalf of the Town, to sell and dispose of any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, on such terms as they may deem desirable and to execute quit-claim deeds for such property.

Art. 15 To see if the Inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to pay for:

Town Charge Account and to Contract Obligations

Fire Department

Fire Alarm System

Repairs of Highways and Bridges, Summer Work

Sidewalks

Sewers and Catch Basins

Snow Removal and Winter Work

Support of Poor and Veterans' Relief

Interest

Free Public Library

Abatements

Cemeteries

Memorial Day Observance

Art. 16 To see what sum of money the Inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate for all School Purposes.

Art. 17 To see if the Inhabitants of the Town will vote to accept and pay rental on two hydrants to be installed by the Newport Water Co., these hydrants to be 500 ft. apart according to the Fire Underwriter's Code. First hydrant to be at corner of Center and Shaw streets, second hydrant to be opposite Grammar School building on Shaw street. All costs of installation and maintenance of these hydrants to be borne by the Newport Water Company.

- Art. 18 To see if the Inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 to help sponsor a dental hygienist, from the Department of Health and Welfare, Augusta, said sum to be expended by the Newport Town Health Council for necessary dental work for grade school children.
- Art. 19 To see if the Inhabitants of the Town will authorize the construction of a sewer from present sewer on Spring street to the residence of Royce Brown.
- Art. 20 To see if the Inhabitants of the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$150 for public health nursing in Newport. Said sum to be expended by the Maine Department of Health and Welfare, Bureau of Health, for local service.
- Art. 21 To see whether or not the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$100 to be paid to the State of Maine Publicity Bureau to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 5, Section 82, of the Revised Statutes of Maine.
- Art. 22 To see what sum of money the Inhabitants of the Town will raise and appropriate for State Aid Road Construction (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Sections 25 and 29, Chapter 20, R. S. 1944, as amended.
- Art. 23 To see if the Inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$420 for the maintenance of improved sections of Third Class Roads, or to be used for construction of Third Class Roads, if not needed for actual maintenance purposes.

- Art. 24 To see if the Inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1995 for the maintenance of State Aid and State Highways.
- Art. 25 To see if the Inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be invested and added to the Sinking Fund established for future construction of a school building.
- Art. 26 To see if the Inhabitants of the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$429.57; the amount expended on repairs for Highland Ave. sewer; and the amount of \$448.29, the amount expended in the construction of Shaw street sewer, also the sum of \$2,358.12, the amount expended in rewiring the town hall building.
- Art. 27 To see if the Inhabitants of the Town will vote to accept the following sums of money, interest from same to be used for perpetual care of lots in Riverside and North Newport Cemeteries:
- B. W. Lenfest, Adm. \$100, care of Joseph L. Josslyn lot in Riverside Cemetery.
- Ora H. Franklin, \$200, care of Ethel R. Woodward lot in Riverside Cemetery.
- Est. Georgia S. Randlett, \$100, care of William Randlett lot in Riverside Cemetery.
- S. P. Ireland, \$100, care of John Ireland lot in North Newport Cemetery.
- Mrs. H. H. Patten, \$100, care of Patten-Prilay lot in North Newport Cemetery.
- Alton and Arthur Blaisdell, \$100, care of Albert R. and Cora E. H. Blaisdell lot in Riverside Cemetery.
- J. O. Gilman, \$100, care of John T. Gilman lot in Riverside Cemetery.

- Art. 28 To see if the Inhabitants of the town will vote to build the Middle Bridge under the Bridge Act if said bridge is accepted by the State Highway Commission under the Bridge Act and authorize the Selectmen to negotiate for its construction.
- Art. 29 To see if the Inhabitants of the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,215.55 to purchase the Fire Pumper which was leased in 1947.
- Art. 30 To see if the Inhabitants of the town will vote to have a fire alarm box installed at the corner of Park Ave. and Adams or Rowe St.
- Art. 31 To see if the Inhabitants of the town will enact an ordinance regulating the use of public streets in the town of Newport, prescribing, regulations relative to the parking of vehicles upon such streets: providing for purchase, leasing, acquiring, installation, operation, maintenance, supervision, regulation and control of the use of parking meters.
And providing for the payment thereof; defining and providing for the establishing of parking meter zones upon the public streets and for an enforcement thereof and providing penalties for the the violation thereof.
- Art. 32 To see if the Inhabitants of the town will enact an ordinance to allow one hour parking on Main and Water streets in the business section from 9 A. M. to 6 P. M.
- Art. 33 To see if the Inhabitants of the town will vote to hire a day watchman and fix compensation thereof.
- Art. 34 To transact any other business that may come before the town.

The selectmen will be in session in their office in the Town Hall for the purpose of revising the list of voters in said Town on said day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return to this warrant with your doings thereon, on or before the day and hour of said meeting.

NEWPORT FIRE DEPARTMENT

The Fire Department with Eugene H. Russell, chief, has an estimated amount of equipment to the value of approximately \$34,000. The equipment consists of three fire trucks, hose, boots, coats, etc. The new pumper has a 1,000-gallon tank and carries 1,000 feet of 1½-inch hose and 200 feet of booster line, besides other necessary equipment.

The three companies have 25 members: No. 1 company has 9 men; No. 2, 8 men; No. 3, 8 men.

There have been 53 fires in town and 10 out-of-town fires.

Newport has one of the finest equipped fire departments in this section of the state for a town of its size and during the 21 years that Mr. Russell has been chief the department has been built up to its present size.

Robert R. Rich is first assistant chief and Willis A. Getchell, second assistant chief. Fred J. Lowell, secretary, and David A. Russell, treasurer.

COMMENTS

Cash

The Treasurer's Cash Records were examined and all cash recorded as received was properly deposited in the Newport Trust Company bank.

All payments were supported by proper authorization and were made by check.

The cash balance \$6,880.94 was reconciled with the bank statement as of February 17, 1949, taking into consideration deposits and expenditures made after February 9, 1949.

Taxes

The 1948 Tax Commitment was compared with the Assessors' records and found to be in agreement. The current commitment of taxes was accounted for by cash and an unpaid list prepared from the records of the collector. 92.8% of the total commitment was collected during the year.

Trust Funds

The Trust Fund investments were checked at the bank and are shown in detail on Schedule 5.

Reserve Funds

The School Building Reserve Fund appropriated at the last two town meetings is invested in U. S. Government Bonds, a detail of which are shown on Schedule 6.

One overall debt reduction of \$36,000.00 has been made, which amount includes final payment of your bonded indebtedness.

General

The records of withholding taxes and teachers' retirement funds appear to be adequate for proper accounting of these amounts.

ANNUAL REPORT FOR NEWPORT PUBLIC HEALTH NURSING SERVICE

January 1 to December 31, 1948

Public health has been defined as the art and science of preventing disease, prolonging life, and promoting physical and mental efficiency through organized community effort. Today there is a rising concern for health in the family, the community, the state, the nation and throughout the world. Your active health council coordinates and promotes health work in your town.

Good health for the child must start before he is born. Adequate care and diet for the expectant mother, infant and preschool child, correction of defects and immunization against preventable diseases will eliminate many of the problems of the school age group. The health of the family of tomorrow depends upon the kind of health we build today.

Your public health nurse has made health supervision visits to expectant mothers, infants and preschool children. Visits have

been made to the schools to help the teachers with their health problems. School children have again received the vision screening tests through cooperation with the principal of the grammar school and your local specialist in this field.

The monthly child health conferences had an average attendance of 19. Immunizations included 81 smallpox vaccinations, 77 diphtheria, 155 whooping cough and one tetanus inoculations.

When necessary the services of the Crippled Children's, Pediatric, Hard of Hearing, Tumor and Mental Hygiene Clinics have been used by those who were referred to them by their family physician.

Effort has been made in tuberculosis control through home visits. In July the Department of Health and Welfare X-ray Clinic was made available to a number of townspeople. The facilities of the State Sanatorium have been used by those who have been referred there for diagnosis and care.

Your nurses wish to thank the school personnel, the Newport Health Council, and the general public for their splendid cooperation throughout the year.
