# TOWN WARRANT

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PENOBSCOT, SS

To Eugene T. Hatch, Constable of the Town of Newport in the County of Penobscot.

In the name of the State of Maine you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Newport aforesaid, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at the Odd Fellows Hall, so-called, in said town, on Monday the 3rd day of March 1930, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year, and fix compensation of same.
- Art 3 To hear all reports made at said meeting and act upon the same.
- Art 4 To see if the town will vote to fix a compensation of its Board of Selectmen and Assessors, allowing such sum as may seem commensurate with the duties of the office.
- Art 5 To choose three or more Selectmen.
- Art 6 To choose one or more Overseers of the Poor for such term of office as the town may by vote decide.
- Art 7 To choose three or more Assessors.
- Art 8 To choose a Town Treasurer.

- Art 9 To choose a member, or members of the Superintending School Committee.
- Art 10 To choose three or more persons to enforce town ordinances.
- Art 11 To choose a Chief Engineer and assistants of the Fire Department.
- Art 12 To choose Sextons for the various cemeteries in town.
- Art 13 To determine the number of Road Commissioners not exceeding three, and the term of office for the same, also fix the compensation of such Road Commissioner or Commissioners, and choose the same by ballot, or instruct the Selectmen to appoint the same.
- Art 14 To choose a night watchman for the ensuing year.
- Art 15 To choose all remaining town officers required or permitted to be chosen at the annual town meeting, excepting a Collector of Taxes; and to determine how many, if any of the said officers shall be appointed by the Selectmen.
- Art 16 To determine when the tax list for the year 1930 shall be committed for collection, also when taxes thus committed shall be paid, and what instructions, if any, the town will give in relation to the same. Also to see what instruction and condition the town will impose upon its Collector of Taxes to settlement with the town and to receive bids and proposals for the collecting of taxes for the ensuing year on such terms and conditions as may thus be determined.
- Art 17 To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art 18 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to pay town charges and contract obligations.

- Art 19 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the support of the poor.
- Art 20 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to apply on debt and interest account, and for a sinking fund toward the retirement of the town bonds of 1910 issue and the temporary town orders issued on account of balance indebtedness of bond issue 1917; or what action the town will take relative to the subject matter of this article.
- Art 21 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to make, construct and repair highways, bridges, ways, crosswalks, and sidewalks, in said town and determine the per diem compensation of laborers and horses thus employed.
- Art 22 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriation and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid on its highways, as provided in Section 19, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916, and acts additional thereto and amendatory thereof.
- Art 23 To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of the ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 21, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916, or under provisions of Section 21, Chapter 25, R. S., amended by Chapter 258, P. L. 1917.
- Art 24 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$732. for the improvement of the sections of State Aid Work as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of ways, highways, and bridges, the above amount being the maximun which the

town is allowed to raise under the provisions of Section 18, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916 and acts additional thereto and amendatory thereof.

- Art 25 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for Town Hall repairs, if so, how much.
- Art 26 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500. to be expended on the road leading from Prilay's Corner to Durham Bridge Road, the same to be expended under the direction of the Selectmen and Road Commissioner.
- Art 27 To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State Highways during the ensuing year within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Section 8, Chapter 25, of the Revised Statutes of 1916 and acts additional and amendatory thereto.
- Art 28 To see if the town will vote to raise money and if so, how much, for the maintenance of Third Class and Special Resolve Highways during the ensuing year within the limits of the town.
- Art 29 To see if the town will vote to pay the Chief of the Fire Dept., \$150. per year for his services.
- Art 30 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the use and maintenance of Newport Fire Dept., for the ensuing year, and whom it will authorize to expend the same.
- Art 31 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$2,150. for the new fire alarm signal, and whom they will authorize to expend the same.
- Art 32 To see if the town will vote to raise \$2,000. as payment of pumper recently purchased for the Newport Fire Department.



- Art 33 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for the maintenance of the Fire Alarm System.
- Art 34 To see if the town will vote to employ counsel and raise a sum of money, and if so, how much, for the purpose of defraying the expenses of expert witnesses and other necessary charges, in the matter of increase water rates to the inhabitants of Newport, involved in re. Newport Water Co. vs. Public Utilities Commission, now pending, and whom it will authorize to employ said counsel and expend said money. •
- Art 35 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for Common Schools.
- Art 36 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for maintenance of a Free High School.
- Art 37 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the purpose of school supplies and apparatus.
- Art 38 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of school text books.
- Art 39 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for school house repairs.
- Art 40 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate as a salary of the Superintendent of Schools.
- Art 41 To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay for the services of Superintending School Committee.
- Art 42 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$250 to be used for the equipment for school rooms.
- Art 43 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500 as a salary for the Agricultural Instructor in the High School.

- Art 44 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$125, for a School Library in the High School Building.
- Art 45 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for teaching music in the public schools.
- Art 46 To see what instruction if any, the town will give its Superintending School Committee, Superintendent of Schools or Principal of High School in regard to soliciting tuition pupils for our High School.
- Art 47 To see if the town will vote to raise money and if so how much for tarring and calcium chloride for the streets of Newport.
- Art 48 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise under the Three Town Road act to build on road beginning at Townsend Corner in the Town of Newport extending northly over Stewart Hill to Marshes Corner in town of Palmyra, thence west to Hanson Corner, thence North to St. Albans north town line by way of St. Albans village and Lucus Hill.
- Art 49 To see if the town will vote to raise \$300 to be expended on road leading from Edward Rowe's to Palmyra Town line.
- Art 50 To see if the town will vote to raise \$50 to be expended by the North Newport Cemetery Ass'n for the upkeep and care of the cemetery located at North Newport.
- Art 51 To see if the town will vote to raise \$300 for the repairs on road leading from Camp Benson to the Railroad crossing via Nelson Place.
- Art 52 To see if the town will vote to raise \$50 to be expended on Elm Street Cemetery and whom they will authorize to expend the same.

- Art 53 To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to raise to gravel South Street from Railroad crossing to Burrill residence.
  
- Art 54 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for the purpose of building a new wood-shed for the East Newport school and whom they will authorize to expend the same or what action they will take in regard to the subject matter of this article.
  
- Art 55 To see if the town will give the Superintending School Committee any instructions regarding the hiring of two teachers for the school at East Newport and also the hiring of school conveyances during the whole year for said school in addition there-to.
  
- Art 56 To see if the town will vote to raise money if so, how much, for the purchase of books and to pay necessary expenses for the Free Library.
  
- Art 57 To see if the town will raise and appropriate money, if so, how much, to hire a night watchman for Newport village for the ensuing year, said watchman to care for fires in fire room, and to perform the duties as heretofore required or as may be prescribed and required.
  
- Art 58 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, if so, how much, to repair or build sidewalks whether concrete or cement, or both and whom they will authorize to expend the same or what action they will take in regard to the subject matter of this article.
  
- Art 59 To choose a special Municipal Board of Mother's Aid and Childrens Guardians of not less than three members, at least one of whom shall be a woman, to serve in accordance with Chapter 222, Section 4, of

the Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chapter 171 of the public laws of 1919.

- Art 60 To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to make a temporary loan to pay town charges and other obligations should it become necessary at any time during the year to do so.
- Art 61 To see what sum of money, the town will vote to grant and raise, if any, to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.
- Art 62 To see if the town will vote to charge interest at the rate of 6% per annum on all taxes that remain unpaid at a specified date.
- Art 63 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for aid of G. A. R. Post and other Patriotic societies, in observance of Memorial Day 1930.
- Art 64 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to care for the sewer and catch basins.
- Art 65 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$150 for beacon at the corner of Mill and Main Streets.
- Art 66 To see if the town will vote to raise money to pay abatements on taxes, and if so, how much.
- Art 67 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300 to spend on the Durham Bridge road in front of the home of Simon Whittaker.
- Art 68 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for tarring Elm Street, beginning at the watering tub and leading to the Upper Bridge.

- Art 69 To see if the town will vote to accept from the Kate E. Prilay estate, the sum of \$100 the interest from same to be used for the perpetual care of the Levi R. Burrell lot in North Newport cemetery.
- Art 70 To see what action the town will take in regard to the sewer outlet of Grove Street.
- Art 71 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to purchase a parcel of land to be used as a town dump, and whom they will authorize to expend the same.
- Art 72 To see if the town will raise money to provide for the services of a Public Health Nurse, or take any action thereon.

The Selectmen will be in session at their office in the Town Hall for the purpose of revising the list of voters in said town at nine o'clock on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon on or before day and hour of said meeting.

To the Superintending School Committee and citizens of  
Newport:

I herein submit my report of your schools, etc., for the year ending Feb. 1, 1929.

The last census found 260 boys and 269 girls of school age. Of these 393 are registered in the schools and have maintained a good average of attendance.

Ten elementary school teachers have been employed and have done excellent work.

The following table gives the name of the teachers, their weekly wages and the number of children in each grade at the beginning of the school year.

The same excellent work has been carried on by Mr. Smith and Miss Parsons with the "Boy Scouts" and the "Campfire Girls", Mrs. Barbour taking Miss Parsons place upon her leaving us.

The same splendid phase of work is being carried on by Mrs. Emily Merrill in the savings department.

We now have eight conveyance teams conveying approximately 43 pupils. These teams are paid an average of \$7.87 a week.

Miss Roos is doing excellent work in the music department and Miss Butler's rooms and work is very popular. We think the "Home Economics" department is a very valuable acquisition to our school system.

Health work is carried on by all the teachers in the form of light calisthenics, games and health chores.

For the report of the High School see Prin. Chaplin's report.

The "Agricultural Course" is being carried on in an abridged form, rather than a full course as last year. We expect to give the full course next year.

The Commercial department is doing good work, please see Miss Wingate's report of it for details.

The work of the High School has been very satisfactory. The principal and three of the same teachers as last year have remained with us.

Mrs. Chaplin has carried on the work of the Science Department and all of the teachers have had to take their part of the Physical education work.

All of these teachers are well fitted for the particular work each is doing.

We were hoping to be able to fit up a room with benches and tools for manual training work for the boys to be used next year, but because we have had to cut down our requisition we shall not be able to do it.

The School Committee's report will give detailed statement of repairs made and those required to be made.

The janitors work is a very important part of the School

system. Many little details have to be attended to as well as keeping the fires going and the rooms and corridors clean.

Mr. Colby has been very helpful about many jobs of carpenter work etc. about the buildings.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation of the fine co-operation of the teachers, school committee and all with whom I have come in contact with while administering my work.

To Frederick M. Nickerson, Superintendent of Schools:

The transference of the ninth grade from the High School with its overcrowded conditions to the Grammar School increased the number of pupils registered in the elementary building to a noticeable extent.

The change forced unfamiliar grades upon all but the first and second grade teachers. It meant additional preparation and self training but the embarrassment and unfamiliarity were soon overcome by earnest endeavor and unselfish cooperation.

The new teachers who came to us last fall were well qualified to the positions that they now hold. Miss Dorothea Barbour and Mrs. Geneva Merrill in the first and second grades are upholding the high standards of teaching that the preceeding teachers created.

At the beginning of the winter term we were sorry to lose Miss Alta Parsons, who for four years pleased parents and children alike with her achievements. Mrs. Charles Barbour, former substitute teacher is carrying out Miss Parsons' objectives successfully.

Miss Annabelle Guptill and Mrs. Harmon Smith are doing their very good work in a creditable way. Miss Guptill is

severely handicapped by having a registration of more than fifty pupils. Mrs. Arthur Hanson is now substituting for Mrs. Merrill who has been ill with pneumonia.

The girls and boys of the eighth and ninth grades are very interested in the industrial courses offered them this year. The Home Economic course has made a favorable impression upon the girls while the boys have enjoyed elementary training in a few of the major trades.

There is a movement on foot to form a Parent Teacher Association. The teachers and the parents ought to endorse this plan because the welfare of the children depends upon the close relationship of parents and teachers.

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To the Superintendent of Schools, School Board and Citizens:

I deem it a pleasure to submit my report to the citizens of Newport concerning the progress of Public School Music.

In establishing my doctrine of music in the schools I maintain to uphold four principles, which are, to inspire love of music, develop a musical voice, teach sight singing—syllables as a medium, and to induce musical interpretation.

Evidence seems to indicate music as one of the earliest arts influencing child life. Even as an infant, the tone of voice with which it is spoken to, will determine the child's reaction. So, in the primary grades we apply songs which inspire love of music, from both the musical and literary standpoint, thru rote songs which lay a foundation for the technicalities to be taught.

The children from grade 3 on, are not content to learn by imitation and suggestion, but have an increasing curiosity about concrete things and a desire to manipulate them, consequently, much technical work is undertaken. Their growing appreciation is augmented by knowledge. Therefore during

the following three grades sight singing or music reading is being perfected, as the result of the acquisition of the principles of time and tune which are arranged pedagogically. Thus we attempt to complete all technique in the sixth or seventh grades. Then three and four part singing is extensively practiced.

At this time I would like to make a plea for the introduction of a Music Appreciation course. This is possible only with proper equipment. It is necessary to have the arrangement of phonograph records, bringing to the child the first medium of musical expression, the voice, then introducing each instrument of the string, wood-wind, brass and percussion families which are known by their tone quality and finally all the instruments combined in the entire orchestra.

The technique of each composer is detected, the types of music recognized and music design is learned. Even if their acquired knowledge is not applied by attending symphonies or operas, the radio—the universal symphony, will give the students a splendid opportunity for the application of the Music Appreciation course and broaden their musical outlook.

The orchestra, composed of eighteen players, is doing splendid work and we anticipate the entry of more players next fall.

The majority of the Glee Club members are, at present working on an operetta which, in a short time, will manifest their singing and acting ability.

Now is the opportunity to show my appreciation of the co-operation of the Superintendent and teachers and efforts in attaining a high musical standard in the schools.

## HOME ECONOMICS

To Frederick M. Nickerson, Supt. of Schools

It is with pleasure that I submit my report of the New Home Economics Department in Newport High School.

The enrollment in this department is as follows, 16 students from the 8th and 9th grades and 24 students from the High School. The work was offered as an elective course to the high school girls and approximately one third of the girls attending High School are taking the work. I believe this to be a very good proportion.

Many times a limited interpretation is placed upon home economics education, it being thought of as only sewing and cooking. Thus a great deal of material is excluded which is needed to bring girls, women and boys to a fuller realization of their responsibility in creating better homes.

Home economics includes a study of foods in relation to health, their composition, their use in the body, selection and buying, their preparation, the planning and serving of meals, preservation and storage of foods, a study of clothing problems from every angle including the selection, purchase and care of ready made articles, construction of articles and garments, laundering, textile production, designing of garments; a study of problems that relate directly to the home and family such as care and management of the home, selection and buying of houses and furnishing for the home, care of children, care of the sick, social life and hospitality in the home and the relation of the home to the community.

The present and future needs of the pupils are the basis for organizing our courses of study. Our subject matter is carried out by the problem or project method. The theory and method is taught in the class room and is of such a nature that the pupil can apply it in her own home and should have an opportunity to do so.

Since September we have seen our room grow into an efficiently arranged laboratory of which we are proud. We hope it will continue to grow as time and finances permit.

One of the outstanding projects of our work is the preparing and serving of hot lunches to the commuting students. Where cold noon lunches must be depended upon five days of the week throughout the school year, the serving of even one hot dish transforms the lunch into a meal and adds zest to the work of the afternoon. Approximately 35 students in the Newport schools partake of the hot lunch.

We cordially invite the parents and townspeople to visit our laboratory.

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### COMMERCIAL COURSE

To the Superintendent of Schools:

It is with pleasure that I submit to you my report of the Commercial Department of Newport High School for the year 1929-1930.

In my report of last year I stated the aims and requirements of our department. But few changes have occurred.

In September the new Anniversary Edition manual of Gregg Shorthand was introduced in the beginning shorthand class and is proving very satisfactory. There are eleven registrations in this class. The aim of the first year is to cover the principles of the system thoroughly, giving the foundation for speed which is to be obtained the second year.

Special attention is being given to accuracy and speed in the typing classes. We have seven machines and the class enrollment is thirty-one.

The 20th Century system of bookkeeping is used in our department. The fundamental principles are thoroughly stressed and also neatness and accuracy in the keeping of books. This is a two year course, being given in the Junior and Senior years. At present we have thirty-four students enrolled in the two classes.

To Superintendent Frederick M. Nickerson:

I herewith submit to you my 3rd annual report as principal of Newport High School.

We started school this year on Sept. 9 with an enrollment of 106 pupils. This was a smaller number of pupils than we had the previous year due chiefly to the fact that the ninth grade was removed to the grade building in September.

Our school library has been started this year and at the present time contains about two hundred volumes. We hope to add to this each year until we have a library which will meet the needs of our students. In previous years, the lack of suitable reference material, has been a severe handicap to the progress of our work, and I assure you that the appropriation voted by the town last year for this purpose has been appreciated by the faculty and students.

A Home Economics course was started this year with Miss Pauline Butler, a graduate of Nasson Institute, as teacher. This course has been developed very well and is proving quite popular among the girls of our school. Miss Butler is coaching girls' basketball, this year and doing fine work. Her team is well coached and a credit to the school. I hope that the school authorities will continue to have a woman coach for the girls' team, thereby doing their best to safeguard the health and future happiness of the players.

Only one other change was made in our faculty of last year. Mrs. Elizabeth Chaplin was elected to the vacancy in the science and history department caused by the resignation of Mr. Robinson. Mrs. Chaplin is a graduate of Colby College and majored in science. She has had previous teaching experience in Houlton High School and Caribou High School. She is teaching four periods of science and two periods of history.

The other members of the faculty are continuing the same kind of work which has been so satisfactory to the patrons of the school in previous years. We are fortunate to retain teachers of such satisfactory experience in our school.

The direction of boys' athletics in the high school has fallen to me, since the resignation of Mr. Robinson. Our football

team played three games, winning only one of them. The boys were inexperienced and there was not much interest in the sport. Basketball has been very successful to date. We have won eleven games and lost one by a one point margin to Brewer High School at Brewer. There were only two regulars left from last year's team so we are very well satisfied with our record to date. I wish to extend my appreciation to the fans who have supported the team so well.

Debating has been revived as a school activity and our school is to participate later in the year in the Bates' Debating League. This team is being coached by Miss Pratt and should be a credit to the school.

It is my sincere belief that the past year at Newport High School has seen the most real progress of any year since I have been in Newport. We are doing our best to raise the standards of the school and feel sure that our graduates can compete on even terms with the graduates of other high schools. During the time that I have been connected with the school there has not been a single graduate who has attended a college or normal school and who has failed to make good. We are proud of this record and intend that it shall continue.

I wish to extend my thanks to the Superintendent and School Committee for their splendid support and cooperation, also to the faculty, student body, and citizens of Newport, for we, together, make the school what we wish it to be.

At the regular meeting of the School Union held just before the school closed last June, Mr. Frederick N. Nickerson

was re-elected Superintendent of Schools for another year. Mr. Nickerson has shown the same untiring energy and favorable attention to his duties as was shown his first year here and his work is certainly an inspiration to the school life of the town.

We take this opportunity to thank the teachers for their excellent cooperation for the past year and wish that the parents and citizens would visit the class rooms that they may learn more of the work carried on there and become better acquainted with the teachers.

Through the generous appropriations which the citizens gave us last year we were able to organize and equip a Home Economics and Domestic Science Room in the Grade Building. Miss Pauline Butler was secured as teacher of this department. Miss Butler is a graduate of the Nasson Institute and we call your attention to her report on another page.

One new steel ceiling has been placed on the English room in the High School Building and all rooms and corridors have been re-decorated. A partition has been placed in one of the small rooms making a chance for the Principal's office adjoining the main room, and the other room is used for our much needed School Library which the citizens made possible in the last town meeting.

New screens were placed on a number of the windows in the Grade Building this past year.

We are glad to report that the village school houses are in good repair at this time. Although there are some needed repairs to be attended to this year on our rural school houses, we are able to ask you for a much less appropriation this year than in former years.

You will find our recommendations for school appropriation in the report of your Budget Committee. These appropriations call for a slightly smaller sum than in previous years, and we believe are in accordance with the spirit of the times here in Newport.

However, with the assistance and cooperation of the citizens of the town we shall try to carry on the schools this next year without any reduction in their efficiency.

We close our report thanking the citizens for approving our undertakings and for their generous support in many ways.
