TOWN WARRANT

PENOBSCOT, SS

To William L. Sawyer, Constable of the Town of Newport in the Country of Penobscot.

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Newport aforesaid, qualified by law to vote in town affairs, to meet at Odd Fellows Hall, so called, in said town, on Monday the 7th day of March 1932, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles to wit:

- Art 1 To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year, and fix compensation of same.
- Art 3 To hear all reports made at said meeting and act upon the same.
- Art 4 To see if the town will vote to fix a compensation of its Board of Selectmen and Assessors, allowing such sum as seems commensurate with the duties of the office.
- Art 5 To choose three or more Selectmen.
- Art 6 To choose one or more Overseers of the Poor for such term of office as the town may by vote decide.
- Art 7 To choose three or more Assessors.

- Art 8 To choose a Town Treasurer.
- Art 9 To choose a member, or members of the Superintending School Committee.
- Art 10 To choose three or more persons to enforce town ordinances.
- Art 11 To choose a Chief Engineer and Assistants of the Fire Department.
- Art 12 To choose Sextons for the various cemeteries in town.
- Art 13 To determine the number of Road Commissioners not exceeding three, and the term of office for same, also fix the compensation of such Road Commissioner or Commissioners, and choose the same by ballot, or instruct the Selectmen to appoint the same.
- Art 14 To choose a Night Watchman for the ensuing year.
- Art 15 To choose all remaining town officers required or permitted to be chosen at the annual town meeting, excepting a Collector of Taxes; and to determine how many, if any of the said officers shall be appointed by the Selectmen.
- Art 16 To determine when the tax list for the year 1932 shall be committed for collection, also when taxes thus committed shall be paid, and what instructions, if any, the town will give in relation to the same. Also to see what instructions and conditions the town will impose upon its Collector of Taxes to settlement with the town and to receive bids and proposals for the collecting of taxes for the ensuing year on such terms and conditions as may thus be determined, and to the lowest bidder.

- Art 17 To choose a collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art 18 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to pay town charges and contract obligations.
- Art 19 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the support of the poor.
- Art 20 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to make, construct and repair highways, bridges, ways, crosswalks and sidewalks, in said town and determine the per diem compensation of laborers and horses and trucks thus employed.
- Art 21 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- Art 22 To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint state aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to state aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, P. L. 1931.
- Art 23 To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of the ways, highways and bridges, under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 22, Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930.

- Art 24 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise under the Three Town Act to build on Road beginning at the Dexter Road so called, in Ripley village and continuing south to the St. Albans town line, thence west to Harris Corner, so called, thence south to Dow's Corner, thence east to Johnson's Corner, thence south and east to Corinna town line, south to Newport town line and east to Corinna village, continuing east to Sanborn's Corner, thence northeast to Elm St., thence east to Hasty's Corner, so called, and south to Plymouth town line.
- Art 25 To see if the town will vote to raise money and what sum for the maintenance of State Highways during the ensuing year within the limits of the town, under the provisions of Section 9, Chapter 28, and Section 18 Chapter 28, of the Revised Statutes of 1930 and acts additional and amendatory thereto.
- Art 26 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$473.00 for the maintenance of Third Class Highways during the ensuing year within the limits of the town.
- Art 27 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200. to finish resurfacing Grove Street, beginning at Joslyn Street and extending to the town line.
- Art 28 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$200. to be expended on Joslyn St., beginning at Grove St., and extending to the residence of Perley Soule.
- Art 29 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for snow removal and how it shall be expended, whether by contract or otherwise, or what action the town will take in regard to this article.

- Art 30 To see if the town will vote to install a street light opposite the residence of Mrs. Ed. A. Clark on Water Street.
- Art 31 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to build a sidewalk, beginning at Fred Hoyt's and extending up Highland Ave. to Fred Stuart's.
- Art 32 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money if so, how much, for Veterans' Relief.
- Art 33 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for Town Hall repairs, if so, how much.
- Art 34 To see if the town will vote to pay the Chief of Fire Dept. \$150.00 per year for his services.
- Art 35 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the use and maintenance of the Newport Fire Dept. for the ensuing year, and whom it will authorize to expend the same.
- Art 36 To see if the town will vote to raise \$2,400.00 as last payment on the pumper, purchased for the Newport Fire Department.
- Art 37 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, is so, how much, for the maintenance of the Fire Alarm System.
- Art 38 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for the services of the county nurse.
- Art 39 To see what action, if any, the town will take in regard to the Grove Street Sewer Abutters.

- Art 40 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for Common Schools.
- Art 41 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for maintenance of a Free High School.
- Art 42 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of school supplies and apparatus.
- Art 43 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of school text books.
- Art 44 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for school house repairs.
- Art 45 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate as a salary of the Superintendent of Schools.
- Art 46 To see what sum of money the town will vote to pay for the services of the Superintending School Committee.
- Art 47 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for teaching music in the public schools.
- Art 48 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500. as a salary for the Agricultural Instructor in the High School.
- Art 49 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$75.00 for a School Library in the High School Building.
- Art 50 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$250. for the purchase of School Equipment.

- Art 51 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$350.
for insurance on school buildings.

- Art 52 To see if the town will vote to raise money and if so,
how much, for tarring and calcium chloride for the
streets of Newport and what streets.

- Art 53 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$300.
to resurface the road from the railroad crossing in
East Newport to the Plymouth town line.

- Art 54 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$500.
for a piece of permanent road in North Newport,
beginning at John Coburn's and extending towards
Durham Bridge.

- Art 55 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a
sum of money, if so, how much, to repair or build
sidewalks, whether concrete or cement, or both, and
whom they will authorize to expend the same or what
action they will take in regard to the subject matter
of this article.

- Art 56 To see if the town will raise and appropriate money,
if so, how much, to hire a night watchman for
Newport Village for the ensuing year, said watchman
to care for fires in fire room, and to perform the duties
as heretofore required or as may be prescribed and
required.

- Art 57 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how
much, for the purchase of books and to pay necessary
expenses for the Free Library.

- Art 58 To choose a special Municipal Board of Mother's Aid and Children's Guardians of not less than three members, at least one of whom shall be a woman, to serve in accordance with Chapter 222, Section 4 of the Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chapter 171 of the public laws of 1919.

- Art 59 To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to make a temporary loan to pay town charges and other obligations should it become necessary at any time during the year to do so.

- Art 60 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise, if any, to be expended and used for advertising the natural resources, and advantages and attractions of the State of Maine.

- Art 61 To see if the town will vote to pay a discount on taxes if paid by July 1st and charge interest on amounts remaining unpaid, or what action, if any, it will take in regard to this article.

- Art 62 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to care for sewer and catch basins.

- Art 63 To see if the town will vote to raise money to pay abatements on taxes, and if so, how much.

- Art 64 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for aid of G. A. R. Post and other Patriotic societies, in observance of Memorial Day 1932.

- Art 65 To see if the town will vote to reimburse A. L. Gray for burial of Ed. Caverly.

- Art 66 To see if the town will vote to use the Australian ballot at annual town meetings.
- Art 67 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$50.00 to be expended by the North Newport Cemetery Ass'n for the up-keep and care of the cemetery located at North Newport.
- Art 68 To see if the town will vote to accept from Mrs. Jennie S. Wyman the sum of \$100. the interest of same to be used for the perpetual care of the Charles A. Wyman lot in Riverside Cemetery.
- Art 69 To see if the town will vote to accept from C. W. Prilay, the sum of \$100. the interest from same to be used for the perpetual care of the Henry Prilay lot in North Newport Cemetery.
- Art 70 To see if the town will vote to accept from T. J. Brooks the sum of \$100. the interest from same to be used for the perpetual care of the Harry Brooks lot in North Newport Cemetery.
- Art 71 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to either buy or build voting booths.
- Art 72 To see if the town will reimburse J. O. Bowden for money paid by him for a tax deed, said tax deed having never been received.
- Art 73 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to tar Elm Street.

Art 74 To see if the town will vote to accept from the Newport Monument Association the Memorial Monument placed on the bridge.

Art 75 To see if the town will vote to accept the parcel of land purchased by citizens, and deeded to the town of Newport by the American Woolen Co., to be used for a public parking space only, or act on anything relating thereto.

The Selectmen will be in session at their office in the Town Hall for the purpose of revising the list of voters in said town, at nine o'clock on the day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon, on or before day and hour of said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of the Town of Newport:

I herein submit my report of your schools for the year ending February 1, 1932.

The last census found 251 boys and 251 girls of school age in town, of whom 331 are enrolled in the elementary schools, 70 in the high school, and 20 odd in higher institutions of learning.

Eleven elementary schools have been maintained during the year with good results.

The following table gives the names of the teachers, grades or schools taught, the weekly wages, and the number of pupils in each grade at the beginning of school year.

The teachers remain the same as last year in the village schools, excepting that Miss Hutchinson has been transferred to the room which was occupied by Miss Dorothea Barbour, resigned, and Miss Pennell has taken Miss Hutchinson's place.

The year opened with new teachers in all the rural schools, and the teacher service has been very satisfactory in all of the schools, with the exception of one criticism which is more or less justified. In some instances the teachers have been quite averse to appearing on the school grounds during school intermissions, to organize and direct the play and conduct of the children. That teachers do this is generally considered an important requisite to a well organized school and a well ordered school system.

It may be seen by an inspection of the tabulation above that nearly all of our teachers are carrying quite a heavy load besides the extra activities that are being required of them.

Our health work is carried on as heretofore by the teachers. It consists of physical exercises, health chores, health studies, health talks, instruction in the care of the teeth, etc.

"Safety First" work is being aided by posters and lesson papers supplied by the American Automobile Association, and sent to us by the Maine Automobile Association, every month, and distributed to the schools by the Superintendent of Schools.

The school conveyance question is the hardest to handle even with a small degree of possible satisfaction. People demand so much! We have two teams on, that we think, in fairness to all concerned, under the existing conditions, the people should not ask for. While objecting to paying taxes they demand these privileges which they could do without, without injury or distress to their children.

Mrs. Perkins' department seems not to lose any of its popularity, there being 41 girls taking the course.

Mrs. Merrill is still very much interested in the school saving department, and although the period of "hard times" has been with us several years, the school savings account has increased \$816.04 since my last report, making the total to the

children's account \$4,813.67. We consider this fostering of the thrift habit one of the most important of our extra-curricula activities.

The music director has been able to reach every school practically every week during the year. Please see her report for further particulars.

Although the number of students taking the agricultural course is not large, we believe it to be of so much importance that it should be continued. In fact we think it is a drawing feature for tuition students.

The high school is doing its usual good work. Each teacher being in reality, an expert in his department.

The school committee's report and the reports from some of the school departments give more definite particulars regarding certain phases of the work of the different departments.

The janitor work in charge of Mr. Colby plays a very important part in the efficiency of the village schools. The health and comfort of all depend largely upon the sanitary conditions which in turn depends upon the temperature, ventilation, and the cleanliness of the rooms, corridors, basement, etc.

Five members of the state department of education have visited us during the past year, two of them visiting practically every school in the union. Also, Miss Buck representing the Maine State Health Association has visited us in the interest of health in our schools; and Mr. Hill from the University of Maine has visited us in the interest of our agricultural course.

At a joint meeting of the committees of the four towns held in the early winter it was decided that a general survey of the schools of the union should be made with respect to their physical condition and the efficiency of the supervision and the teacher work. Thereupon the State Department of Education was asked to do the work, which they did in the early part of January. A report of their findings has not been received at this writing. We shall probably receive it sometime within the next few weeks.

Because our taxes are considered high we are doing what we can to reduce them and still maintain the standing and efficiency of our schools. We "cut" \$2000.00 from our school

budget two years ago, and now we are offering a "cut" of \$1510.00 from that. We are asking for what we think we should have. If we can save any of it we shall do it. But we do think that we should be privileged "to cut" where we think best. The managers of every business should have that privilege.

The school business is a big business; one of the biggest businesses in our country; and it is probably run as economically and more efficiently than any other business of its size.

Whatever we do, let us not hamper or in any way cripple the forces which are working for the benefit of our children.

In closing I wish to tell you that I value, very much, the kindness and helpfulness of all with whom I have come in contact in the discharge of my duties.

I submit to you, herewith, my annual report as Principal of Newport High School.

Our school year opened Sept. 8th with an enrollment of 103 pupils, of which 41 were tuition pupils.

The teaching force is the same as last year. It is a very efficient and loyal group of teachers with each one well qualified from the points of view of education and of teaching experience to do the work allotted to her in a very thorough and satisfactory manner.

Our school work is progressing unusually well this year and our mid-year ranks show that the present student body is maintaining a scholarship average higher than any other in the past five years, at least. However, we still have some pupils

with unsatisfactory records. No two of these cases are exactly alike but at least four out of five of our failures result, very definitely, from a lack of home study. There is no way that the parents can do more to improve the education of their children than by insisting that they study at home at least an hour and a half of each day. This is a responsibility which cannot be delegated to the teachers, and if shirked by the parents to avoid unpleasantness in the home, is sure to hinder the normal development of the pupil.

We are offering the same courses of study as in 1930-1931, and do not anticipate any radical changes in the near future. We are now offering a variety of subjects which will meet the needs of nearly every pupil. Manual Training would be a very valuable addition if funds were available.

During the past four years there have been many changes in our school which have resulted, I believe, in an organization far better equipped to meet the needs of its students and of the community. During this period forty graduates of the school have entered other institutions for advanced training and have pursued a variety of courses with excellent success. This is the most concrete evidence that I can offer that we are preparing our students well.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation for the co-operation and assistance that you and the school board have given us.

I herewith submit to you my third annual report of the musical status in Newport.

Out of the 21 weeks of the school session, the High School, Grammar School and Gilman School have received 20 lessons.

The Coburn and Hubbard Schools in North Newport have been visited 17 and 14 weeks respectively, and the Billings Hill School in East Newport 15 weeks.

The conditions of the roads and also the holidays and conventions in the fall term, diminished the number of visits to the last four schools mentioned.

The same technicalities are taught in all the graded schools to keep up the musical standard and this is maintained through the commendable work of each teacher.

In the High School a Glee Club was organized. The members are attending rehearsals diligently. On some future date they will prove to you their ability to sing four-part compositions with the correct technique.

The Orchestra boasts only ten dependable and competent players. This small number is due to the fact that seven members graduated and only one new member was admitted.

There is one great drawback in an orchestra situation, and that is the instruments assembled do not form a balanced orchestra or in other words do not bring about the desired effect which should be obtained.

I earnestly urge all parents who can possibly do so to manage an instrumental music education for their children. Beside consulting the child, also inquire of a music director as to which instrument should be studied, bearing in mind the future High School Orchestra.

In closing, I will remind the many organizations in Newport that the orchestra will be pleased to play at any opportunity provided.

It is with pleasure that I submit my third annual report of the Home Economics Department of the Newport Schools.

The enrollment for this year is as follows, 6 students from the 8th grade, 14 from the 9th grade and 21 high school pupils. The members enrolled at the beginning of the year was a slight increase over the two previous years.

In a previous report I outlined the courses as taught. The grammar school work remains the same. The High School Juniors and Seniors have studied Home Nursing and First Aid, Advanced Foods and Dietitics, and are now looking forward to this new course, Home Selections and Furnishing. This course will be especially attractive to the girls since it includes the complete decorating and furnishing of a small house donated by the Woman's Club. The Freshmen and Sophomore courses for this year are; Clothing, Foods and Nutrition and Hygiene and Sanitation.

Our noon lunch project has struggled under difficulties this year but we have succeeded with the help of several donations in having a sufficient number of customers to enable us to still serve a hot dish. It is without question that these lunches are popular with the students and I hope that soon there will be some means of financing these lunches; so that every child who takes his lunch box to school may have the benefit of them.

During the course of the year we always plan to have several special visitors' days, but we wish everyone to remember that any day is visitors' day in the Home Economics Room.

As coach of the girls' basketball team I would like to suggest that the parents of girls in high school urge their daughters to join the basketball squad. It is a normal outlet of energy to every healthy young girl; it being the only sport offered to the girls, I feel we should have a more representative group. It would not only benefit the girls physically but also make for a splendid girls team from year to year.

I wish to thank the members of the school board and citizens for their co-operation in this work.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

In making recommendations for the budget this year, your committee has constantly had in mind the severe tax burden upon our people and have tried to cut out all special appropriations and make the regular appropriations as low as possible.

Town Charges and Road and Bridges Accounts have not been reduced as much as might be, but have been kept at a figure so that these accounts will take care of special and emergency cases, thus avoiding special appropriations.

It will be noticed that we have to raise money for Town Charges Account and Support of the Poor this year where no money was raised last year.

Following are the appropriations for 1931 and recommendations for 1932. If amounts raised can be held to recommendations, the tax rate would not be over 43 mills based on last year's valuation:
