# Town Warrant

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PENOBSCOT, SS

To William L. Sawyer, Constable of the Town of Newport, in the County of Penobscot:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Newport aforesaid, qualified by law to vote in the town affairs, to meet at Odd Fellows Hall, so called, in said town, on Monday the 5th of March, 1934, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles to wit:

- Art 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year, and fix compensation of same.
- Art 3 To hear all reports made at said meeting and act upon same.
- Art 4 To see if the town will vote to fix a compensation of its Board of Selectmen and Assessors, allowing such sums as seems commensurate with the duties of the office.
- Art 5 To choose three or more Selectmen.
- Art 6 To choose one or more Overseers of the Poor for such term of office as the inhabitants may vote to decide.
- Art 7 To choose three or more Assessors.

- Art 8 To choose a Town Treasurer, and fix compensation of same.
- Art 9 To choose a member or members of the Superintending School Committee, and fix compensation of same.
- Art 10 To choose three or more persons to enforce town ordinances.
- Art 11 To choose a Chief Engineer and Assistants of the Fire Department, and to fix compensation of same.
- Art 12 To choose Sextons for the various cemeteries in town.
- Art 13 To determine the number of Road Commissioners not exceeding three, and the term of office for same, also to fix the compensation of such Road Commissioner or Commissioners, and choose the same by ballot, or instruct the Selectmen to appoint the same.
- Art 14 To choose a Night Watchman for the ensuing year and fix compensation of same.
- Art 15 To choose all remaining town officers required or permitted to be chosen at the annual town meeting, excepting a Collector of Taxes, and to determine how many, if any, of said officers shall be appointed by the Selectmen.
- Art 16 To determine when the tax list for the year 1934 shall be committed for collection, also when taxes thus committed shall be paid, and what instructions, if any, the inhabitants will give in relation to the same. Also to see what instructions and conditions the inhabitants will impose upon its Collector of Taxes to settlement with the inhabitants and to receive bids and proposals for the collecting of taxes for the ensuing year on such terms and conditions as may be thus determined.

- Art 17 To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art 18 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to pay town charges and contract obligations.
- Art 19 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the support of poor and Veteran's Relief.
- Art 20 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to pay interest on loans.
- Art 21 To see if the town will vote to raise \$2000.00 to reduce the School House Loan.
- Art 22 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to make, construct and repair highways, bridges, and crosswalks in said town, and to determine the per diem compensation of laborers and horses and trucks thus employed.
- Art 23 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to repair sidewalks.
- Art 24 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- Art 25 To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of the ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28, Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of

Sec. 3, Chap. 175, Public Laws of 1933. On State Aid Highway No. 6, beginning at State Highway "J" and ending at Corinna town line. Work to begin about 1½ miles from State Highway "J" and extend in a general northerly direction. It is a continuation of State Aid Road built in 1933.

- Art 26 To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, P. L. 1931.
- Art 27 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$900. for the maintenance of State and State Aid Highways during the ensuing year.
- Art 28 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$454. for the maintenance of Third Class Highways during the ensuing year.
- Art 29 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for snow removal and how it shall be expended, whether by contract or otherwise, or what action the inhabitants will take in regard to this article.
- Art 30 To see if town will vote to raise the sum of \$100. to be expended on Joslyn St., beginning at the residence of Fred Smith and extending to the residence of Perley Soule.
- Art 31 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money for Town Hall repairs, if so, how much.
- Art 32 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$1500. to be expended on the road at North Newport, beginning at the Church and extending in a northerly direction to the Corinna town line.



- Art 33 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the use and maintenance of the Newport Fire Dept. for the ensuing year, and whom it will authorize to expend the same.
  
- Art 34 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much for the maintenance of the Fire Alarm System.
  
- Art 35 To see if the town will vote to give permission to Clifford Wheeler, to remove the catch basin located in front of the Newport Bottling Works, without cost to the town, to a location farther up North St.
  
- Art 36 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for Common Schools.
  
- Art 37 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much for maintenance of a Free High School.
  
- Art 38 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, if so, how much, for the purchase of school supplies and apparatus.
  
- Art 39 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of school text books.
  
- Art 40 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for school house repairs.
  
- Art 41 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate as a salary of the Superintendent of Schools.
  
- Art 42 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for teaching music in the public schools.

- Art 43 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of School equipment.
  
- Art 44 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for insurance on school buildings.
  
- Art 45 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much for the purchase of books and to pay the necessary expenses for the Free Public Library.
  
- Art 46 To choose a special Municipal Board of Mother's Aid and Children's Guardians of not less than three members, at least one whom shall be a woman, to serve in accordance with Chapter 222, Section 4 of the Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chapter 171 of the Public Laws of 1919.
  
- Art 47 To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to make a temporary loan to pay town charges and other obligations should it become necessary to do so at any time during the year.
  
- Art 48 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to care for sewer and catch basins.
  
- Art 49 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to pay abatements on taxes, and if so how much.
  
- Art 50 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for aid of G. A. R. Post and other Patriotic societies, in observance of Memorial Day 1934.
  
- Art 51 To see if the town will vote to raise sum a of \$50. to be expended by the North Newport Cemetery Ass'n for the up-keep and care of the Cemetery located in North Newport.

- Art 52 To see if the town will vote to raise \$100. for the care of the various cemeteries in town.
- Art 53 To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$100 the interest from same to be used for the perpetual care of the B. P. McKenney lot in North Newport Cemetery.
- Art 54 To see if the town will vote to accept from Emma F. Merrifield, the sum of \$75., the interest from same to be used for the perpetual care of the John and Betsy Prilay lot in North Newport Cemetery.
- Art 55 To see if the town will authorize the Fire Chief to protect the members of the Fire Dep't. with liability insurance.
- Art 56 To see if the town will vote to adopt, "The Sunday Amateur Sports Law."
- Art 57 To see if the town will authorize the superintending school committee to re-open the Gilman School and thus eliminate the congested condition now existing in our village schools.
- Art 58 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to put bunks and bedding in the town lockup.
- Art 59 To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to make provisions for 1200 citizens of Newport to have the right to vote at our town meetings to conform to the Constitution of Maine.
- Art 60 To see if the town will vote to discontinue the road beginning at the corner of the Joe Luce place, so called, and continuing in a northerly direction to the Corinna town line.

- Art 61 To see if the town will accept the sum of \$100.00, the interest from same to be used for the perpetual care of the Nason-Farnum lot in Riverside Cemetery.
- Art 62 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to finish repairing the Camp Benson road, and whom it will authorize to expend the same.
- Art 63 To see if the town will vote to contract with the Newport Water Company, for one hydrant to be located on Main St. near the east end of Oakes Coffee House, so called.

The Selectmen will be in session at their office in the Town Hall for the purpose of revising the list of voters in said town, at nine o'clock on day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon, on or before day and hour of said meeting.

## REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Newport:

I have the honor to submit my first annual report.

It is probable that more social, economic and governmental changes have occurred in the last fifteen years than for the one hundred and fifty years previous. Every age is transitional. Today changes are going on with lightning speed. We cannot escape them; we must face these issues as citizens. Schools attempt to prepare children to meet and solve problems far more serious than those of the present day. No civic agency has a more commendable program; none is in greater need of continued support. In the words of our President: The main point is that we need to make indefinitely better the average education which the average child now receives. The crisis can be met, but not in a day or a year, and education is a vital factor in the meeting of it.

A total gain of thirty-three students was made this year. The enrollment of the village Grammar is now 268, and the

High School 111. Newport schools are constantly growing. In a twenty year period the elementary schools have sixty more students and the High school seventy-five. You will note that the schools, forced to carry an increased burden, are required to carry on with less funds.

Fine co-operation by all those connected with the schools marked the retention of every essential part of the school programs. Though the appropriations did not cover the cost, it seemed best that the study of music be retained and Miss Gertrude Thorne, formerly connected with the Newport Schools, was secured.

A donation of twenty-five dollars was received from Mr. Sidney G. Merrill and used to help pay for the set of encyclopedias for the grammar school. Funds were obtained from the Emergency Relief to provide hot lunches for needy school children. During the spring term teachers donated a part of their salaries to the town poor account. Grading the school grounds is a C. W. A. project.

Economic conditions forced the adoption of the policy of engaging teachers by the term. It is possible that one year contracts can be substituted another year. Reductions were made in all expenditures. The salaries of the teachers bore the brunt of the necessary economy. Four elementary teachers received twelve dollars weekly, two fourteen, three fifteen, on the basis of a thirty-four week school year. In most cases this represents the total income for fifty-two weeks. Professional improvement through summer school work is almost impossible financially.

High school salaries were reduced from twenty-five to forty percent. Three teachers receive eighteen, twenty, and fourteen dollars weekly on the basis of a thirty-six week school year. Two courses are subsidized by the State. For the support of the course in agriculture approximately \$700.00 is received, making the cost of the teaching principal eleven hundred dollars. Approximately seven hundred dollars subsidy in the home economics department makes it possible to retain this valuable study for slightly over two hundred dollars.

For the present year Newport High School is rated a "Class A" school conditionally. The State Department of Education is of the opinion that the teaching loads are now excessive and another teacher must be added when the school re-opens next September. The staff was reduced this year because of lack of funds. An unconditional certificate will be granted when another teacher is appointed.

## FINANCES

To aid in the flexibility and efficiency in handling accounts, consolidation of Library, Books, Supplies, Special and Equipment accounts into Books and Supplies was made. Music was transferred to the Elementary School Account. For some years a difference between the school accounts proper and the figures carried forward in the Comparative Balance Sheet of the Selectmen has been noted. This was caused in a large part by tuition credits not being posted to the same annual accounts. Adjustments have been made; the two accounts now agree. You will also note that the balances and deficits brought forward in this report are not the same as in the 1933 report. This was done upon the advice of Mr. H. E. Crawford, Auditor of Municipal Accounts, and the approval of the Selectmen. Two tuition accounts were found to be uncollectable and were cancelled. Legal steps will be taken at once to obtain payment on past due bills ignored by debtors. If payments in high school tuition are made in full, the deficit in that department will be entirely eliminated.

Losses in state funds for the present year amounted to about \$700.00. We find that we are starting the new fiscal year with approximately \$1,100.00 in smaller balances than the previous year; loss in high school tuition will amount to about \$300.00 because of the decreased charge. A loss of three hundred dollars is probable in the vocational courses. The Railroad tax of about \$85.00 was lost permanently to the school fund this year. From the beginning of the fiscal year last February to the close of school in June, only the salaries and current ex-

penses were placed on the payrolls; expenses contingent upon the re-opening of the schools caused the totals of the last half of the fiscal year to exceed those of the first.

Greater expenses the coming year will include: requirement to add another high school teacher; increase in the cost of supplies; immediate need of more suitable text books; provision for the continuance of the study of music; new legal requirements to provide for more adequate conveyance.

The increased deficit in the elementary school account was caused by the consumption of more fuel this winter and the expense of continuing music. The deficit in superintendence account is to be carried forward and the proposed budget adds that to the amount required.

Your school committee asks for two separate appropriations: for the support of common schools, music, high school, books, supplies, insurance and salary of the superintendent \$11,000.00. The distribution is approximately the same as last year:

For repairs an appropriation of \$1,000.00 is needed. This to include replacement of the paper roof on the grammar school annex; new sills for the Hubbard School; shingling roof of the East Newport school; improving the school yard of the same school; as the eyesight of boys and girls is injured by dirty walls with low light reflective values, a great deal should be done for the ceilings and walls of the grammar school. Most of this work must be done during the summer vacation. There is no definite proof that payment can be secured from other town or government agencies.

Despite a most severe winter attendance has been above average. Teachers have carried on their work in a most professional manner. There has been little absence; a substitute has been employed but three days. Citizens have co-operated willingly.

I take this opportunity to express my appreciation to my predecessor, Mr. Frederick M. Nickerson, to the members of the school committee, pupils, teachers and citizens for the countless courtesies that smooth a new and difficult path.

I respectfully submit to you my seventh annual report as Principal of Newport High School.

Our school opened September 11 with a slightly increased enrollment of 111 students. Our teaching force was reduced to five teachers due to the decreased appropriations at the last annual meeting and this of course resulted in an increased teaching load for some teachers. Because of this excessive load on our teachers, the State Department of Education has given us a conditional classification as a Class A High School with the definite understanding that we shall be dropped to a Class B school unless changes are made for the next year. This is not in any way a reflection on the quality of the work being done in the school but is a fair warning to the citizens of the community that it is possible to reduce expenditures for their schools beyond the point of true economy.

One new teacher, Miss Beatrice Folsom, has been added to our faculty this year. Miss Folsom graduated from the University of Maine in 1933 and teaches French, Latin and Ancient History.

Due to a lack of money, few changes have been made in textbooks but we did buy new Biology and First Year Algebra texts to replace books which could not be used any longer. Some equipment was also purchased for the Physics Laboratory but our science laboratories are still woefully deficient in proper scientific equipment. The inadequacy of our facilities in this department was commented upon by the State Supervisor of Secondary Schools, Mr. Harrison J. Lyseth, on a recent visit to the school.

Our athletic program has been carried on as in previous years. Our basketball teams have had a very successful season. The boys team having won seven games and lost only two, is hoping to be selected for the State Small School Tournament to be held at the Bangor Y. M. C. A. on March 1, 2, and 3. The financing of this very valuable phase of our work has been a difficult problem for the past few years but the outlook for the coming year seems brighter. The cooperation of interested friends of the school in this problem is greatly appreciated since no appropriations are ever made by the town for the purpose. To the Superintendent of Schools and School Board:  
I present this brief report:

Changes in any system are at first a drawback. It has taken the children some time to accustom themselves to my method of teaching; it has taken me some time to find out just what they are capable of doing.

Out of fairness to all I shall make no further comment. I would like to say this in regard to a future High School orchestra. In order to have a good orchestra in a high school, the beginning for such must be made well down in the grades as the outstanding choir in the orchestra is the string section. This must be attended to early as the children should be playing well before entering high school, if Newport is to play the same grade of music played by other high schools around us.

I can see no possible hope of a good orchestra in two more years, unless this is attended to at once.

I appreciate very keenly all that has happened to us in the past few years, but a way can be provided and at small expense to each family—namely through class violin, viola and cello work. Class work, by a teacher who understands how to teach it, is very successful. It stimulates interest among the pupils.

I only hope it will be possible to start such classes during the spring term of this year.

On Wednesday from two until three o'clock, I will be at the Mary Emery Music Room to explain this work, and talk it

over with all parents who are interested in having Newport represented by an orchestra not only in efficiency but in number.

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## RECOMMENDATION OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

Having made a study into the expenses of the departments of town affairs, your committee feel justified in making the following recommendations. These recommendations call for somewhat larger appropriations than were asked for the past year, due largely to an increased expense for support of poor and veteran's relief, and extra amounts in the town charge accounts. It was also deemed advisable to increase the summer and winter road accounts for the following reasons. The town has furnished supplies and material for C. W. A. work and it is estimated that about \$1000.00 will be used by Mar 1st, this is to be taken from the summer appropriation. The removal of snow, due to the extremely hard winter necessitates the increase recommended in this item.

We recommend that the excise and bank tax be applied in reducing the town debt, in lieu of asking for a special appropriation for this account.

We would especially commend our fire department for the efficient and economical operation of this department the past year. We recommend an additional amount this year for the purchase of a booster pump to take the place of the present chemical pump, thereby reducing the expense of operating this apparatus for small fires, also the purchase of sufficient hose to maintain the efficiency of the department. We believe the amount recommended will be sufficient for the operation of this department. We would also recommend a town ordinance directing the fire chief to cause chimneys (when the department is called for chimney fires) to be thoroughly cleaned and the owner of the premises be required to pay the expense thereof.

Last year we recommended a re-adjustment of our lighting system which would produce a material saving. This source of economy may still be accomplished without seriously effecting the efficiency of this department. A discontinuance of the stop lights at the intersection of Main, Mill and Water Streets from Nov. 1st to May 1st., would be about \$45.00. A discontinuance of the lights on the south side of the bridge and all but three on the north side would save \$112 00. We would recommend that some action be taken on this matter.

By keeping within the Budget Committee recommendations it will be possible to effect a tax rate of about 45 mills, which, although higher than last year is considered as very conservative.
