Town Warrant

PENOBSCOT, SS

To William L. Sawyer, Constable of the Town of Newport, in the County of Penobscot:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Newport aforesaid, qualified by law to vote in the town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, so-called, in said town, on Monday the 4th of March, 1935, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

- Art 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.
- Art 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year, and fix compensation of same.
- Art 3 To hear all reports made at said meeting and act upon same.
- Art 4 To see if the town will vote to fix a compensation of its Board of Selectmen and Assessors, allowing such sums as seems commensurate with the duties of the office.
- Art 5 To choose three or more Selectmen.
- Art 6 To choose one or more Overseers of the Poor for such term of office as the inhabitants may vote to decide.
- Art 7 To choose three or more Assessors.

- Art 8 To choose a Town Treasurer, and fix compensation of same.
- Art 9 To choose a member or members of the Superintending School Committee, and fix compensation of same.
- Art 10 To choose three or more persons to enforce town ordinances.
- Art 11 To choose a Chief Engineer and Assistants of the Fire Department, and to fix compensation of same.
- Art 12 To choose Sextons for the various cemeteries in town.
- Art 13 To determine the number of Road Commissioners not exceeding three, and the term of office for same, also to fix the compensation of such Road Commissioner or Commissioners, and choose the same by ballot, or instruct the Selectmen to appoint the same.
- Art 14 To choose a Night Watchman for the ensuing year and fix compensation for same.
- Art 15 To choose all remaining town officers required or permitted to be chosen at the annual town meeting, excepting a Collector of Taxes, and to determine how many, if any, of said officers shall be appointed by the Selectmen.
- Art 16 To determine when the tax list for the year 1935 shall be committed for collection, also when taxes thus committed shall be paid, and what instructions, if any, the inhabitants will give in relation to the same. Also to see what instructions and conditions the inhabitants will impose upon its Collector of Taxes to settlement with the inhabitants and to receive bids and proposals for the collecting of taxes for the ensuing year on such terms and conditions as may be determined.

- Art 17 To choose a Collector of Taxes for the ensuing year.
- Art 18 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to pay town charges and contract obligations.
- Art 19 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the support of poor and Veterans' Relief.
- Art 20 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to pay interest on loans.
- Art 21 To see if the town will vote to raise \$2,000. to reduce the School House Loan.
- Art 22 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, to make, construct and repair highways, bridges, and crosswalks in said town, and to determine the per diem compensation of laborers and horses and trucks thus employed.
- Art 23 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to repair sidewalks.
- Art 24 To see if the town will vote "yes" or "no" on the question of appropriating and raising money necessary to entitle the town to State Aid, as provided in Section 20 of Chapter 28 of the Revised Statutes of 1930.
- Art 25 To see what sum the town will appropriate and raise for the improvement of the section of State Aid road as outlined in the report of the State Highway Commission, (in addition to the amounts regularly raised for the care of the ways, highways and bridges) under the provisions of Section 19, Chapter 28,

Revised Statutes of 1930, or under the provisions of Section 3, Chapter 175, Public Laws of 1933. On State Aid Highway No. 6, said highway beginning at State Highway "J" and ending at Corinna town line. Work to begin about 2 miles from State Highway "J" and to extend in a general northerly direction. It is a continuation of State Aid road built in the year 1934.

- Art 26 To see what sum, if any, the town would recommend to take from the joint State Aid account for the purpose of applying bituminous surface treatment to State Aid roads built within the past five years in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 271, P. L. 1931.

- Art 27 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$900. for the maintenance of State and State Aid highways during the ensuing year.

- Art 28 To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of \$578. for the maintenance of Third Class Highways during the ensuing year.

- Art 29 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for snow removal and how it shall be expended, whether by contract or otherwise, or what action the inhabitants will take in regard to this article.

- Art 30 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, for Town Hall repairs, if so, how much.

- Art 31 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for the use and maintenance of the Newport Fire Department for the ensuing year, and whom it will authorize to expend the same.

- Art 32 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for the maintenance of the Fire Alarm System.
- Art 33 To see what sum of money the town will appropriate and raise for Common Schools.
- Art 34 To see if the town will vote to raise money, if so, how much, for the maintenance of a Free High School.
- Art 35 To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money, if so, how much, for the purchase of school supplies and apparatus.
- Art 36 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for the purchase of school text books.
- Art 37 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for school house repairs.
- Art 38 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate as a salary of the Superintendent of Schools.
- Art 39 To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for teaching music in the public schools.
- Art 40 To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purpose of school equipment.
- Art 41 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for insurance on school buildings.
- Art 42 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for the purchase of books and to pay the necessary expenses for the Free Public Library.

- Art 43 To choose a special Municipal Board of Mothers' Aid and Children's Guardians of not less than three members, at least one of whom shall be a woman, to serve in accordance with Chapter 222, Section 4 of the Public Laws of 1917, as amended by Chapter 171 of the Public Laws of 1919.

- Art 44 To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen and Town Treasurer to make a temporary loan to pay town charges and other obligations should it become necessary to do so at any time during the year.

- Art 45 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, to care for sewers and catch basins.

- Art 46 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money to pay abatements on taxes, and if so, how much.

- Art 47 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money, if so, how much, for aid of G. A. R. Post and other Patriotic Societies in observance of Memorial Day 1935.

- Art 48 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of \$50. to be expended by the North Newport Cemetery Association for the upkeep and care of the Cemetery located in North Newport.

- Art 49 To see if the town will vote to raise \$100. for the care of the various cemeteries in town.

- Art 50 To see if the town will vote to accept the sum of \$300. the interest from same to be used for the perpetual care of the Fred A. Fernald lot in Riverside Cemetery.

- Art 51 To see if the town will vote to abate the taxes of Flora A. Goodwin,

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- Art 52 To see if the town will vote to abate the taxes of
Emma Day.
- Art 53 To see if the town will authorize the Fire Chief to
protect the members of the Fire Department with
liability insurance.
- Art 54 To see if the town will vote to unite with other towns
as authorized in Chapter 1, Section 91, Public Laws
of 1933, for the purpose of securing a full time
trained health service; and to raise a sum of money
necessary for such union purposes and for other
public health work.
- Art 55 To see if the town will vote to reduce the amount
assessed against Banton Brothers' property at
49 High St., sixty per cent for a period of five years,
using the 1934 valuations as a basis.
- Art 56 To see if the town will vote to accept from the Albert
Butterfield Estate, the sum of \$100., the interest
from same to be used for the perpetual care of the
Albert Butterfield Lot in Riverside Cemetery in
Newport.
- Art 57 To see if the town will vote to accept from the Isa J.
Rackliffe Estate, the sum of \$200., the interest from
same to be used for the perpetual care of the Wallace
and Isa Rackliffe Lot in Riverside Cemetery in
Newport.
- Art 58 To see if the town will vote to raise a sum of money,
if so, how much, to fix the sidewalk in front of the
store on Water St., owned by Mrs. Ethel Graves.
- Art 59 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum
of \$500., to resurface and repair Grove St., beginning
at Hill Ave., and extending to the town line.

- Art 60 To see if the town will appropriate and raise the sum of \$150., to be expended on the piece of road beginning at Wedgewood Corner and extending to the Palmyra town line.
- Art 61 To see if the town will vote to appropriate and raise the sum of \$225., for reimbursement on purchase of the land for the new athletic field.
- Art 62 To see what sum of money, if any, the town will vote to appropriate and raise for the purchase of a road grader.
- Art 63 To see what sum of money, if any, the town will appropriate and raise for applying tar or asphalt surface to Water and Elm Streets.
- Art 64 To see what sum of money, if any, the town will appropriate and raise for applying calcium chloride to the streets.
- Art 65 To see what sum of money, if any, the town will appropriate and raise for the purpose of extending a gravel sidewalk on Elm St., from the Withee bungalows to the residence of Andrew Evans.
- Art 66 To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell the Gilman school house to the highest bidder, not later than May 1, 1935, and credit the amount received to Common Schools Account.

The Selectmen will be in session at their office in the Town Hall for the purpose of revising the list of voters in said town, at nine o'clock on day of said meeting.

Hereof fail not to make due return of this warrant with your doings thereon, on or before day and hour of said meeting.

We have endeavored this year to establish a settlement date whereby the exact activities of the fiscal year may be shown. We trust that this may make it easier for the Budget Committee to agree upon the requirements in the several departments for the succeeding years, also give the inhabitants of the town the exact standing at the closing date of the report. It is quite easy to do this, if a record of bills contracted is checked frequently and notice given in time to have all bills presented for payment before the settlement date. This method is approved by the State Auditor and we hope that future selectmen will continue this practice.

This report is made to cover 365 days, from February 20, 1934 to February 20, 1935; any bills which were contracted previous to February 20, 1934 were charged to that year's work, under the caption of Bills Payable in the comparative balance sheet, and any bills presented after closing the books were charged to the year in which contracted, under same caption.

Although the only part of the F. E. R. A. activities supposed to enter our town reports are those in which town funds are involved, we think it quite in order to show a few statistics regarding the year's work.

From May 1, 1934, our starting date for F. E. R. A. work, to February 20, 1935, we received allocations amounting to about \$9,900. for labor projects, and during that period of nine months, we have sent completion papers for seven projects, and will have the town hall project completed in about two weeks.

The first project, the surfacing of North Street, was com-

pleted and accepted for tarring by the State. The material was furnished by the town.

The playground and athletic field, although rather difficult to construct, should give the town's boys and girls, as well as grown ups, ample space for all athletic events. We hope that much of the danger of accidents to children playing in the streets will thus be eliminated. By the hearty support of several of the town's people, especially Mr. Murray, who donated all the lumber for the Grandstand, the town's debt for material was very little.

About \$500. was spent in painting inside the village and the East Newport school buildings, although some of the work had to be done over again on account of the fire.

We thought it advisable to rebuild the Middle Bridge, not only for its usefulness as a highway, but as a great asset in case of fire, as was proven by the school house fire. A new abutment had to be built and all woodwork constructed from new material; steel girders from the old bridge were used. The material cost, although paid from town funds, was cut to a minimum by cutting, hauling and sawing the lumber with project labor.

A section of sidewalk was constructed on Main Street: material furnished by town.

About 1,000 feet of permanent road was built on the Rutland road in North Newport, on the west end, which was considered the most impassable in the spring.

We succeeded in getting the County and State to furnish about \$1,100. worth of steel to construct Durham Bridge; about 15,000 feet of logs were necessary to saw out the floor of the bridge as the State required. Cost of bridge, \$2,200.; cost to town about \$185. Estimated to last, when covered with asphalt, from twenty to thirty years without replanking.

The addition of 20 feet to the town hall and reconstruction of dressing rooms, was perhaps the most difficult, due to the fact that about \$150. of the \$300. had been used in resilling and placing steel foundation under the building. The estimated cost of this project was from \$8,000. to \$9,000. by working all possible material into labor and use of money from sale of wood, we have reduced the actual overdraft on the town hall to about \$300., and all bills on all projects to date are paid.

We were advised in the spring, before starting our projects, by F. E. R. A. officials at Augusta, that it would be necessary to call upon the town to raise about \$4,000. for costs of materials, but owing to the already high taxes this year, we have endeavored to carry on these projects without this extra appropriation; and except for an overdraft, caused mostly by heavy snow removal bills, we have completed the work without asking for further appropriations.

In the cutting of wood we hoped to accomplish four benefits; first—to give employment to men; second—to furnish wood to the relief families as low as possible; third—to allow a chance for the town truck to earn enough to complete payment for its purchase; fourth—to furnish some money for material costs on hall. We did not do this to injure the business of wood salesmen and hope that our intent will not be misunderstood.

It has been suggested by several citizens that entertainments in the hall for purchasing a curtain for the stage and other fixtures, and games on the athletic field for upkeep and repairs be given during the summer. We hope that this may be done and receive the support of the town's people.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Newport:

I hereby submit to you my second annual report.

It is a satisfaction to state that continued advancement is being made in the Newport schools. Attendance has improved; classroom work has gone well. Several interesting new personalities have been added to the teaching force. Mr. Richard O. Starkey, a teacher of long experience, became principal of the grammar school after the resignation of Harold E. Fenlason, who accepted a fine commercial position; Mrs. Madeline W. Murray was transferred to the village from East Newport to replace Marion Barbour, who left to take a position in Mt. Vernon; Miss Jessie A. Morrison supplanted the beloved Mrs. Geneva W. Merrill who, to the regret of the parents and school committee, reached the retirement age the past June. John F. Harriman is the teacher of the grammar grades at East Newport. The Misses Elise Jones and Mildred Thayer resigned to take schools in Exeter and Plymouth, respectively and were succeeded by Miss Mary Tapley at the Coburn and Miss Mary Tuck at the Hubbard. All elementary teachers are normal school graduates.

In the High and Grammar Schools the enrollment will soon be in excess of the capacity of the buildings. Some thought should be given to a building program in the near future. Modern educational theory and practice favors the six year high school. In such a case nothing further should be considered regarding an addition to the grammar school; a new up-to-date building on a separate lot would provide for the six upper grades and leave adequate playground for the one elementary building.

Legal requirements for more suitable conveyance as noted in the report of last March culminated in the purchase of a new school bus at an initial cost to the town of \$807.12; to complete

the remainder of the original cost, the State provided \$350.00. Had this not been done, two private contractors would be obliged to equip similar vehicles at a cost prohibitive to the town. Housing facilities will be provided at the Town Hall; temporary storage is secured for five dollars a month. A driver receives ten dollars weekly. Our budget for the consolidation of the two routes is the lowest ever made. High school students living on the routes are now conveyed. They formerly were carried at the parent's expense or took the ever-dangerous choice of walking. The latter plan, it will be recalled, has resulted in the deaths of two school children within the past few years. Further, the problem of transporting our various athletic and musical teams to the out-of-town events has been solved. Dependence upon a number of different cars was never satisfactory.

Brief but grateful mention is made of the following courtesies and gifts: The interest from the fund which provides the annual music prize of five dollars awarded each year to a high school senior decreased to the extent of eating into the principal. Restoration of the latter amount has been made by Mr. and Mrs. Dana Emery, who originally created the fund in memory of their beloved daughter, Mary Emery. In order to safeguard the principal the prize must be the interest derived. The donation of fifty dollars from the Newport Woman's Club for the purpose of lighting fixtures for the grammar and high schools; these were secured at wholesale cost from Judkins & Gilman for \$76.00, the balance was paid from student funds by the grammar and high schools. Flags for every school room in the Town of Newport were presented by the H. G. Libby Post, Women's Relief Corps. The gift to the school of a piano and Ditto machine by the teachers and pupils of the grammar schools. Valuable time was saved when the Trustees of the High Street and Methodist Churches extended the use of their buildings following the grammar school fire.

Other activities worthy of mention include the various athletic events of the schools. Dramatic and musical contributions, the grammar school operetta, the benefits to be derived

from the Witham Field and the increased space at the Town Hall. Approximately \$375. is saved by the school children each year under the supervision of Mrs. Emily Merrill of the Newport Trust Company.

Adult classes in home-making are held under the auspices of the F E R A at the Home Economics room five evenings a week with Mrs. Mabel K. Folsom as teacher. This provides valuable instruction for a large number of ladies.

REPAIRS

In August F E R A funds provided about \$700.00 for labor in painting the interior of the Grammar, East Newport and High Schools. Steel ceilings were hung in the lower hall and one classroom of the grammar and the lower hall of the high school. The basement laboratory received a matched board ceiling and new paint. Repair appropriation paid for the material. Copper flashings were laid around three sides of the grammar school and a new roof placed on the addition by contract. These expenditures, together with a payment of \$95.60 for C W A gravel, exhausted the repair fund. Early Monday morning, October 15th, fire of unknown origin damaged four classrooms of the grammar school. As high school classes are held in the basement of the building, village schools were suspended for two weeks, reopening in the churches and undamaged rooms. Insurance adjustment on the building was \$2,050. and on the furniture and equipment \$367.07. All repairs except the roof were made at once; steel ceilings and walls are now on all classrooms, steel ceilings on the lower and upper halls, and fire room. This puts the interior of the building in first class repair.

The enrollment of the elementary schools totals 360 pupils: grammar school 279; Hubbard 14; Coburn 27; East Newport 40.

Effective September, 1934, salaries of elementary teachers including music total \$5,976, an increase over last year of \$578. High school salaries total \$6,140, an increase of \$1,572, the

main item being the addition of one new member to the staff. The cost of conveyance in the North and East Newport schools increased \$170.

In the high and common schools accounts, larger appropriations are needed to off-set the following items: (1) loss of revenue in accounts receivable; (2) State aid in agriculture and home economics; (3) increases as noted:

Eight insurance policies expire the coming fiscal year. It seems best to reduce the term from the five year plan to less. The present insurance has the 80% clause and totals: High School \$15,600; Grammar \$17,700; Coburn, Hubbard and Gilman \$1,000 each; East Newport \$2,000. If the sale of the Gilman schoolhouse is affected, one policy can be dropped.

Repair items include grammar school roof, East Newport school yard and the foundations of the Hubbard school. As most of this expenditure will be for labor, allotment of F E R A money is expected.

Approval of a school appropriation of \$12,500.00 has been made by the Budget Committee. This, after a thorough study and discussion, warrants the support of the voters. Every effort has been made to maintain good schools; whether we can retain our best teaching talent at the same salaries another year is problematical.

Proposed legislation to relieve the antiquated property tax would benefit the Newport schools by an additional \$2,715, payable beginning 1936.

Subject to re-apportionment by the school committee the appropriations are itemized:

REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

To Philip H. Woodworth, Supt. of Schools:-

As Principal of Newport High School, I present to you my annual report.

Our school opened on Sept. 4 with an enrollment of 135 pupils, an increase of about twenty-five over the previous year. This greater registration was due largely to a change in the grades which resulted in the promotion of an increased number to high school. This large entering class of fifty-five pupils is doing very creditable work and the indications are that it will be a distinct asset to the school.

The three new teachers on our faculty, Miss Verna E. Diggles, Miss Drusilla Roderick and Mr. Edward P. Cooper, are well trained, capable teachers, who are doing very good work in their respective departments. They are co-operating

in every respect with the other faculty members so that a fine spirit of helpfulness and industry prevails.

There were some slight increases in salaries this year, which were greatly appreciated by the teachers, but their salaries are still about 35% below the pre-depression level in this school and approximately 29% below the average level for all high school teachers in the State at the present time. This is a condition which should be remedied as rapidly as possible if the most capable teachers are to be retained.

The appearance of the interior of the building was improved considerably during the summer vacation, the most noticable change being in the corridors which were painted and consequently made much lighter and more pleasant. The lighting fixtures in the main room were changed to the modern semi-indirect type which causes much less strain on the eyes of the pupils. Two more lights were added, greatly improving the efficiency of the lighting system. These changes in lighting were made possible partly through a generous donation from the Newport Woman's Club. The balance was raised by the student body. The H. G. Libby Post, Woman's Relief Corps, presented each room in the building with a new flag and staff which were greatly appreciated. In general the interior of the building presents the best appearance, at present, that it has at any time during the past eight years. This work is the result of a real desire on the part of your school officials to make the school surroundings for the young people as attractive as the limitations of an inadequate building and restricted funds will permit.

Some new textbooks have been purchased this year but, due to the decreased expenditures of recent years, we are not adequately supplied with enough modern text-books, in proper condition for use. Some of our books have been in active use for over twelve years and are not only antiquated, but are actually out of their bindings and with sections of pages missing entirely. This is a distinct handicap to both teachers and pupils.

A new class in "Elementary Economics" is being taught in the school this year under the direction of Mr. Cooper. This subject is very practical and is well liked by the students who are enrolled.

The Agricultural Dep't has cleaned out the basement room in the high school building, which was formerly the laboratory, and have put in two benches to be used for a shop. Wood-working projects, soldering, milk testing, rope work etc., are examples of the work to be carried on here. This is a very important part of a course in vocational agriculture and is very well liked by the students who, to date, have furnished their own tools and materials.

A magazine rack and some additional book shelves have been put in the school library which should take care of the normal increase of books for several years. The State Department of Education now requires that \$75. be spent on the library each year if the school is to retain its Class "A" standing.

More equipment and supplies are needed for the science laboratory, particularly for the study of biology which is taught every year to a large group of pupils.

During the past year comprehensive examinations were given throughout the State to all graduating classes. The purpose of these tests was to compare the finished product of our high schools in respect to the general education they had acquired. The examinations covered practically all of the fields of subject matter taught in the secondary schools. Some of the statistics, as sent to us from the State Department of Education, in Augusta, which, I think will be of interest to you and to the citizens of Newport in general, are included in the following table.

I wish to call your attention to the fact that Newport High School Seniors earned an average score considerably above the average of all schools, regardless of size, in every department or course of study. The results of these tests are the best impartial evidence that I can present to you of the quality of work being done in our school.

Our athletic program for the year has been slightly increased over 1933-34. Our baseball team last spring was the best we have had for several years and enjoyed a very successful season. In the fall there was considerable interest in football but it was decided not to organize a team as we did not have the money available to properly equip a squad. About \$200. would be needed in order to purchase the equipment necessary to give the players the proper protection against injuries which are common enough in well outfitted teams. In previous years, when football was sponsored by the school, the boys bought most of their equipment individually, but at the present time it is impossible for them to do that. If some way could be found for financing it, football would make a very desirable addition to our sports program and I should be very glad to cooperate with any group of interested citizens to raise the necessary funds.

Cross-country was revived this year and through the efforts of Mr. Cooper, a very creditable team was organized. This sport will doubtless be continued next year, and with only one runner graduating, we look forward to an even better team to represent us.

Basketball is being carried on at the present time for both boys and girls. The work in the Town Hall has interfered somewhat with the development of these teams but it has given us a greatly improved hall in which to play and practice in the future. These improvements are much appreciated by us and we sincerely hope that the young people of the community will take better care of the interior of the building than they have during the past years.

We are looking forward to the use of Witham Field for baseball this spring. With this inducement, baseball should arouse more interest in the school and in the community. This field also offers an excellent opportunity for development as a summer playground for the youth of the town.

In closing, I wish to thank you and the Superintending School Committee for the assistance which you have given us during the past year.

REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

My second report I submit to the School Officials.

Last year I stated that with the loss of a strong violin at graduation the string section of the orchestra would be greatly weakened, with only one young player coming in at opening of fall to fill the place.

Miss Lewis' loss has been greatly felt this year.

The students have worked hard for the music has not been easy. Each piece has been bought with a purpose in mind; to build up for them a foundation that will be of lasting benefit. We are not playing simple easy things which require no work. If the music is worth anything to them it must be of the same standard as your English or History which requires study.

Since this next graduation would deplete the string section of the orchestra as to nearly ruin it—I organized three groups for violin class work with Mrs. Smart of Dexter as teacher. A few, as is to be expected, dropped out—but those who have continued have passed even our expectations.

Six are High School students who will be added to the orchestra in the spring. Three more will enter from the eighth grade, making nine new violins for next year, and the year following will bring six more from your Newport village schools.

I have watched these violin classes for years, and the results I have seen have entirely convinced me of their worth.

The course is not over two years. Those who have talent and have become interested are bound to keep on studying. It is here the private teacher reaps his or her reward by many more pupils than he or she would otherwise have.

We shall have a public demonstration of the class work ere the year closes, that the people may see what has been done under Mrs. Smart's direction.

In the Grades—I am trying to build up a love for good music, a foundation by which they can understand the good things—as we now have the radio with which to deal—and a foundation for all vocal and instrumental work, so that, when the time comes for those to study, who will study, the parents will not have to pay a teacher to teach the things they would have had in school.

Those who do not study will have a better appreciation and understanding of the things they hear.

Also the supervisor is trying to stress tone production and tone quality.

All these things are not done in a moment. It takes time and hard work; but I believe if the music is worth doing, it is worth giving as much careful thought as is given to other subjects.

RECOMMENDATIONS OF BUDGET COMMITTEE

After studying carefully the requirements of the several departments, the Committee present the following recommendations.

The Town Charge Account, which is almost a fixed account remains the same as last year at \$5,000.

With the cooperation of the Selectmen, the Poor account was reduced from \$6,000. to \$4,500. and the Highways and Bridges account was reduced \$500., as there will be no bridge plank to buy and all bridges have been replanked or rebuilt and about 2,000 feet of plank left over.

The Fire Department was cut \$150. and Town Hall Repairs \$200.

An increase of \$500. on School accounts was the only increase; the other appropriations remaining the same as last year.

If the voters are conservative in their special appropriations, this reduction would a little more than off-set any possible loss of valuation by abatement and should lower the tax rate a mill or two.
