# Town Warrant

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PENOBSCOT, SS

To William L. Sawyer, Constable of the Town of Newport, in the County of Penobscot:

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Newport aforesaid, qualified by law to vote in the town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, so-called, in said town, on Monday, the 2nd day of March, 1936, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following articles, to wit:

Art 1 To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Art 2 To choose a Town Clerk for the ensuing year, and fix compensation of same.

Art 3 To hear all reports made at said meeting and act upon same.

Art 4 To see if the town will vote to fix a compensation of its Board of Selectmen and Assessors, allowing such sums as seems commensurate with the duties of the office.

Art 5 To choose three or more Selectmen. YES

Art 6 To choose one or more Overseers of the Poor for such term of office as the inhabitants may vote to decide.

Art 7 To choose three or more Assessors.

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Art 8 To choose a Town Treasurer and fix compensation of same.

Art 9 To choose a member or members of the Superintending School Committee, and fix compensation of same. *SIDNEY*

Art 10 To choose three or more persons to enforce town ordinances. *LEFT WITH SELECTMEN.*

Art 11 To choose a Chief Engineer and Assistants of the Fire Department and fix compensation of same. *GENE RUSSELL 1500*

Art 12 To choose Sextons for the various cemeteries in town. *WHEN A FIRE RAGES EACH 25.00 3 MED. STEVE*

Art 13 To determine the number of Road Commissioners not exceeding three, and the term of office for same, also to fix compensation of such Road Commissioner or Commissioners, and choose the same by ballot, or instruct the Selectmen to appoint the same. *ONE W.E. STEVENS SAME AS LAST YEAR.*

Art 14 To choose a Night Watchman for the ensuing year and fix compensation for same. *Wm. Sawyer*

Art 15 To choose all remaining town officers required or permitted to be chosen at the annual town meeting, excepting a Collector of Taxes, and to determine how many, if any, of said officers shall be appointed by the Selectmen. *LEFT TO ELECTMEN.*

Art 16 To determine when the tax list for the year 1936 shall be committed for collection, also when taxes thus committed shall be paid, and what instructions, if any, the inhabitants will give in relation to same. Also to see what instructions and conditions the inhabitants will impose upon its Collector of Taxes to settlement with the inhabitants and to receive bids and proposals for the collecting of taxes for the ensuing year on such terms and conditions as may be determined. *SAME CONDITION*

Art 57 To see if the town will deed to the American Legion, the property acquired by the town from the American Legion, Inc., deed dated March 28, 1935, providing that the American Legion shall pay all bills contracted for material construction, and that said deed shall contain the provision that the wharf and swimming beach shall be for the use of the public and contain a right of way to said beach and wharf, or see what action the town will take.

Art 58 To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100. to be used for construction of sewer on Summer St., from David Bruce's residence to the residence of Eugene Hatch.

Art 59 To see if the town will allow the Newport Water Co., to place a pumper hydrant where water main crosses the main road between the residences of E. G. Rowe and Floyd Jenkins, for protection of property in that vicinity.

Art 60 To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell Gilman school house to the highest bidder, reserving the right to reject any or all bids. If sold, the proceeds to be turned over to the School Department.

The Selectmen will be in session at their office in the Town Hall for the purpose of revising the list of voters in said town at nine o'clock on day of said meeting.

The past year has been particularly difficult due to several reasons.

Our poor account was cut \$1,500; our road and bridge account, \$500; town hall repairs \$200, making \$2,200 less money in these departments to accomplish more work.

The special abatement of \$1,246 50 made to the mill was hard to make up, but was justifiable, due to the fact that Mr. Cummings has far exceeded his agreement of employment, which has been a great asset to the town.

We had no appropriation for purchasing snow plows, but accomplished this through an agreement to pay by the earnings of the town truck last year and this, which will make the town owner of three plows without appropriation. We were overdrawn only about \$1,000, due to this purchase. We occasionally have to employ a tractor for short periods but by having our own plows we can open up the roads much sooner after storms, so that the farmers are not held up on cream deliveries as heretofore. Cost of three plows \$975, remainder of \$550 changes the lease to ownership.

The estimated cost of installing a heating plant in town hall was \$1,700. By using the spare boiler at the school house and work of project labor, we have a very satisfactory heating system at a cost of \$800, \$500 of which has been paid, and arrangement for settlement for remainder from our wood account. This heating system eliminates two oil burners, one coal fire and three separate wood fires and supplies ample heat for the 16 radiators installed so that now our school bus and town truck storage rooms, fire room, library, office, hall, toilets and jail are kept at an even temperature. We have received about \$160 rent on hall since May, showing that the average yearly income would be about \$200. This should handle fuel and repairs without extra appropriation. The purchase of a curtain and piano were necessary to let the hall for entertainments.

We were successful in getting all of North Street and Elm accepted by the State, thereby getting about \$1,000 worth of tar on streets at a cost of \$400 to the town. We would recommend applying tar to those streets not treated last year and

another coat on those that were treated this year, saving the expense of resurfacing.

We have been up against it in carrying on our road project, as we are required to furnish power shovel and town truck on the project. We were supposed to furnish between three and four thousand dollars to cover material cost but by getting the State to furnish the bare shovel and allowing operator's wages and some material to come from the State Aid fund, we are getting by without an appropriation.

The Club House and swimming beach have been somewhat perplexing, due to the fact that the value had to be maintained that would secure a loan to cover material. What we have tried to do in this case is to establish a public swimming beach and landing wharf for boats without cost to the town.

This property is an asset to the town either way it is handled at Town Meeting.

A party in town has offered to buy this site and buildings, giving right of way to the public to the beach and wharf at the cost price of \$2,400; or loan the same amount to the American Legion with the same right of way; or loan the town this amount of \$2,400, with this property as security.

If the town decides to accept the loan and retain the property, the American Legion will lease the property, at \$20 per month.

Either way it is handled, the town must ratify the deed from the American Legion to protect its disposal rights.

We hope that a settlement will be gained that will be satisfactory to all.

The main objective we are trying to attain is the improvement of property by these projects and still make appreciative reduction in the town's debt. We feel that the townspeople, as a whole, have acted wonderfully in their cooperation, for which we are very appreciative.

## REPORT OF MUSIC SUPERVISOR

To the Superintendent of Schools and School Board I present my annual report -

With splendid cooperation of the teachers in the Grammar School this year the work in music is really making headway.



despite the many weak places and drawbacks which have handicapped the work. One of these instances this year is in the first grade. No supervisor or teacher can accomplish with a five year old child, what can be accomplished with a six year old child. The State of Maine law allows them to enter school at five. Where there are kindergartens or special provisions made for them it works out to good advantage - and they enter the first grade at six; but when they enter the first grade at five, they cannot do the work that a year later would make it possible for them to do.

Thru the first five grades we are doing individual work with the unison work. This seems a little slow at first but it works out to much greater advantage in the end. The teacher knows definitely what each pupil is doing and can do. Where-in if it is all unison work there are bound to be those who will merely follow along.

Our big work in Education is to give these children the power to do; and they can gain that power only by doing. When they begin to feel that power the work becomes a pleasure and an appreciation develops that would not otherwise have come.

An unfortunate circumstance has arisen in the sixth and seventh grade room. The sixth grade pupils have gone from a fifth grade book to a seventh grade. There were some very dilapidated sixth grade readers (Intermediate) but after the fire it was necessary to dispose of them. The children are very much in need of the sixth grade books. These music books are as carefully graded as the books in the other courses and correlate with the other work of the grade. For example - we do not teach the arithmetic of music until after they have had fractions in the fifth grade. Then they have an intelligent understanding of what it is. In the sixth grade certain things are taught - and the books contain material for the developing of these lessons. Board work is always used but if the teacher has to use it for all lesson developments it uses up too much of

her time in writing, it makes the next years book a burden and not a pleasure.

I wish to express my thanks to Mr. McLaughlin for his kindly interest and cooperation.

### Rural Schools

Both of the North Newport Schools have purchased instruments for their rhythm bands. These things are not a fad - they are constructive - they also tend to lead to an interest in some orchestral or band instrument - or if not that - they will have a keen appreciation of orchestral and band music.

I must speak of the decided change in music in the Hubbard School. It shows what can be done when there is a teacher who carries on the work enthusiastically between the visits of the supervisor.

It is the follow-up work by the teacher that counts. When this is done you will find good work from the pupils in whatever subject may have been taught. When it is not done, you will find the opposite.

I wish it were possible to have a rhythm band in the Primary school at East Newport. The children deserve it and it would add much to their school life. At present, the talking machine in that school is out of repair.

The book companies are now putting out music books especially compiled for rural schools - such a set of books for the East Newport Grammar school would help that teacher's splendid efforts more than much.

### High School

In the High School I find there should be some changes for the best interests of all.

I think that all Freshmen should be required to take chorus work unless there is some very good reason for not doing so; after that I feel that it should be elective in Newport, as in other schools.

There are a good number who cannot read who are now interested enuf to try to read part music. There are those who are interested and would like to do the things that require some effort. As it is: if things are easy enuf for all to stay in unison those who are really interested and wish to do more are getting but little from it. If things are a little hard the other group sits idle. While this change, at first, would mean a small singing group, you would find in the end a creditable piece of work and things very much worth while could be done.

The orchestra is doing very well and would do very much more if we had time to do what should be done. What, with making up work - detention - different association meetings, on Tuesday nights I seldom have the entire orchestra together for more than a half-hour. What there is of us, start working; as different ones come in we have to stop for each one to tune up. And yet, we are expected to play at different school functions or we should; but I feel that we should have more uninterrupted time for real work - if we are to play at these school affairs and especially if we are to hold a High School Festival, which should be held every year.

At present there are nine violins in the orchestra, one graduates this year. In '38 eight violins will leave with graduation. Next year there will be eight possible additions to the violin section. Below that grade there are hardly two studying.

To keep the orchestra up, new violin classes of five or six should be started every year, as well as other instruments.

The violin classes now in session have been a great success, and I feel that we should all give thanks to Mrs. Smart for her splendid work.

We have started a Girls Glee Club of sixteen from the freshman and sophomore classes. They are doing well and plan for you to hear them in the not too distant future

To Mr. Chaplin I express my sincere thanks for the help he constantly gives me.

## REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the Superintending School Committee and the Citizens of Newport:

I herewith submit my third annual report of your schools for the fiscal year 1935-36.

Within the past ten year period school finances have suffered losses in appropriations, tuition receipts, and State Aid. It will be noticed in the following figures that the school rate, indicating the proportion of the municipal rate used for school purposes not including repairs and superintendence, is smaller than formerly. Equalization funds, given to towns having high school and municipal rates, have been received only in emergencies. These specific losses have tended to handicap the efficiency of the schools.

The steadily increasing enrollment since 1913 with the corresponding increase in the number of teachers has been accompanied by another financial loss in the nature of a smaller number of tuition students. School expenditures of that year totaled \$10,768.53. In 1930 the dollar was worth approximately 63 cents when compared with the worth of 1914 dollar. In other words, a school service costing approximately \$1.59 in 1930 could have been purchased for a dollar in 1914. Therefore, in reckoning the difference in cost between the program of 1914 and that of 1930 the variation should not be attributed entirely to the increased cost in school services.

## HIGH SCHOOL ACCOUNT

With the re-opening of school in September the enrollment of the high school attained a total of 154, a gain of 43 pupils in two years. For the purchase of the necessary books required for this unexpected event, transfers from the tuition accounts were made.

The smallest number of tuition pupils for a long period of years was another surprise. There has been sentiment among a few citizens for some years as to whether out-of-town pupils should be admitted. This suggestion is not favored by the school authorities as strong financial support is derived from this source. As the enrollment continues to fall off, town appropriations must be increased. Further increase in State Aid is impossible.

A decrease in the teaching staff automatically would drop the school from the Class A list. Two subsidized courses average annual returns of about \$900, from the State. Were either of these to be dropped, some other course must be substituted. The Home Economics course has an average enrollment of sixty pupils.

The expenditure for this account include only the salaries of the High school teachers. No increase was made in the salary of any teacher this year. There are thirty-six weeks in the school year.

## INSURANCE AND RAPAIRS ACCOUNT

Previous to March, 1935, all insurance policies were on a three or five year term. This counted for a real economy. When the required budget of \$13,167.54 was cut to \$12,500., it was necessary to place expiring policies on one year terms. The policy on the Gilman school house was cut from \$1,000. to \$500. \$20,000. of insurance expires during the coming fiscal year.

Appropriation for repairs on Grammar School roof and filling the East Newport School yard was not provided for last March. Nothing has been done at either building. At North Newport the foundations of the Hubbard school and the interiors of both Coburn and Hubbard were painted by means of FERA labor and material donated by Mr. Sidney G. Merrill.

## BOOKS AND SUPPLIES ACCOUNT

Included in this account are charges for apparatus, equipment, textbooks, electric light and power, water, a large num-

ber of different school supplies and materials, library, laboratory and home economics.

The condition of the books in both high and elementary schools has been a matter of concern for several years. All departments have suffered because of the continued economic chaos. A fair example is the book list of the High School English Department totaling 28 different sets of absolutely essential texts and classics. Only ten have been re-newed since 1920. In the texts alone the copyright dates range from 1909 to 1923 with only one later- 1932.

Health books in the elementary schools are either entirely missing or worthless. Several other fundamental texts are in similar condition.

The high school history and commercial courses must be revised next September if the pupils are to have courses comparable to those in other Class A high schools.

Equipment like maps, globes, charts, and suitable reference works are lacking in most school rooms.

The School Committee recommends for this account an appropriation of \$2,000.

Besides the mentioned donation of material for the interior painting of the North Newport schools, an additional gift of twenty-five dollars to Miss Gertrude Thorne, for books in her department, by Mr. Sidney G. Merrill, is gratefully acknowledged.

A gift of ten dollars from the Newport Woman's Club to the Home Economics Department for the future purchase of an electric stove was another fine present.

Recorded with deep regret is the death at Christmas of Ariel B. Colby, school janitor for the past twelve years. In every room there are well-built devices testifying to his skill and kindly thoughtfulness. No greater tribute can be paid to

the memory of any man than when children feel that they have lost a fine friend.

The school budget presented in detail, has been unanimously recommended by the Superintending School Committee after long and careful study, recognizing that they are under moral obligations to keep within the appropriations. Charged with the educational welfare of five hundred children, it is impossible for them to vindicate properly this sacred trust unless the necessary funds are provided. No allowance has been made for unexpected expenditures similar to the conveyance liability insurance required by law beginning last September. Schools suffer in too numerous change of teachers; of the seventeen Newport teachers, only six were in their present positions two years ago.

More weight is added to our financial burdens in the shape of the deficits accumulated over a period of years. It was impossible to make much decrease this year because of the loss of tuition funds. The review of the deficits since the practice of carrying them forward began:

## REPORT OF HIGH SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Newport, Me., Jan. 28, 1936

To Phillip H. Woodworth, Superintendent of Schools:

It is my duty and pleasure, at this time, to present to you my annual report of the activities of Newport High School.

The outstanding scholastic achievement of the year was the record made by the school in the State-wide Scholarship Tests conducted last May, by the University of Maine, under the supervision of the State Department of Education. In this contest Newport High School placed as follows: First in the science test, competing against seventy-five other schools; third in English, among eighty-five schools competing; fifth in French, with seventy-eight schools taking part in that test. Competition in these contests was very keen, the schools taking part in them including practically all of the better high schools in Maine. It is only fairness to our school to point out that we were competing against schools where the pupil-teacher ratio is much lower, the school equipment much more adequate, and where considerably more money is available to retain successful and desirable teachers.

Our entering class of fifty-eight students has taxed our facilities to the limit. It was necessary to provide new desks for the French room and to utilize this for an additional home-room. New text books were needed and supplied. All possible steps have been taken to insure these students a good start. The work of the class up to mid-year, despite the handicap of excessively large recitation groups in some instances, has been equal to that of the average entering class.

During the past year we received the resignations of Mr. Edward Cooper and Miss Drusilla Roderick, who resigned to accept better paying positions elsewhere. We were fortunate in securing two well qualified teachers, Mr. Howard L. Norwood and Miss Ruth J. Todd to succeed them. Two more resignations, those of Mr. Norwood and Mrs. Madeline Hall have been received since the opening of the school year in September. Their successors, Mr. Frank N. Eaton, Jr., and Miss Julia S. Woods are continuing the excellent work which

they had started. In spite of these frequent changes in our teaching force, I believe that the work of the school is progressing satisfactorily.

The library of our school is growing slowly, but is still far below the standards set by the State Department of Education for a Class "A" High School. We have enjoyed the several excellent books and magazines which the School Board has provided this year and the fine daily newspaper donated by the Christian Science Society.

Creditable improvement has been made in text books during the past year. This investment should pay good dividends in more effective teaching and learning. However, the books used in some classes are badly worn and out of date. These will be changed as rapidly as funds are made available.

The science and home economics laboratories have received some additional equipment this year but there is still a real need in these departments if they are to meet their full obligations to the students of our school. Such laboratory equipment is expensive and consequently must be acquired gradually. However, no year should be allowed to pass without a real step being taken in this direction.

Our athletic program is about the same as last year. Basketball is being carried on at present with Mr. Eaton and Miss Todd coaching. Both teams should have successful seasons and reflect credit upon the school and town. Baseball will be the principal sport in the spring, but we plan to have a track team, also, if sufficient interest is shown to make this advisable.

The work of the music department is covered in a special report by the music supervisor, Miss Gertrude Thorne. It is my opinion that interest in the High School Orchestra might be increased if a time for practice could be reserved during the regular daily program. At present the teaching load is such that this change, however desirable, cannot be made.

A donation of \$10 from the Newport Woman's Club has been received this year for the music department and is greatly appreciated.

I wish to recommend for next year the instituting of a course in citizenship to be required of all Freshmen. A know-

ledge of the duties and responsibilities of good citizens should be acquired by all high school students in preparation for their participation in a democracy. Our present course in American History and Civics, offered in the Senior year, does not meet this need in full, since approximately 50% of our entering students fail to complete the Senior year.

I also believe that our social science curriculum should be changed as quickly as finances will permit to include: Freshman year, Citizenship; Sophomore year, World History; Junior, American Government; Senior, Problems of Democracy. This curriculum, when installed, would compare favorably with that of the most progressive schools of the State.

I wish to take advantage of this opportunity to commend the teachers and pupils of the school for their loyalty and cooperation. I wish to thank you and the Superintending School Committee for your advice and support during the past year.
