Hudson Museum Fall 2000 Lecture Series

The Hudson Museum seeks \$885 from the Cultural Affairs/Distinguished Lecture Series Committee to support two scholarly lectures, given by individuals who have ties to the local area. Both lectures are free and open to the public and will be held in the Bodwell Area, Maine Center for the Arts. Lectures at the Museum attract audiences of from 25 to 100 attendees.

On Thursday, September 28, 2000 at 7:00 p.m., the Museum will host a lecture by Patricia McAnany, Associate Professor in the Department of Archaeology at Boston University and Brian Norris, Vice President of Surveying and GPS at James Sewell Co. in Old Town. "Archaeological Survey and Excavation of Maya Caves and Settlements in the Sibún River Valley of Belize" will present McAnany and Norris' archaeological and mapping work in the rain forests of Belize. McAnany and Norris have worked to determine the spacial relationship between a network of caves and a series of pyramid mounds in the Sibún River Valley. Norris mapped a 15 mile square area around the ancient Maya site K'azob, which McAnany is excavating, focusing on the locations of caves cut into limestone cliffs. These chambers were used by Maya priests and were important ritual and religious centers. In their illustrated lecture, they will discuss the mapping techniques used in this remote area and their archaeological findings, which shed light on the genesis of ancestor veneration among the Maya.

This lecture is directly relevant to the Museum's William P. Palmer III Collection and the Museum's permanent exhibit, Realms of Blood and Jade, which features artifacts from the Maya heartland. This program will be offered in the evening to attract both the University community and general public, especially school teachers.

On Friday, October 27 at 3:30 p.m., Howard Wellman, Objects Conservator at Jefferson Patterson Park and Museum in Maryland will present "Turkey: Archaeology at the Crossroads of East and West." Wellman is originally from Bangor. In 1999, he served as a Field Conservator at the Kaman-Kalehöyük excavation in Turkey. He will discuss the major cultural movements which have shaped Turkey, focusing on the direct influences of the Anatolians, Greeks, Romans, Turks, and Central Asians and the external influences of the Egyptians and Mesopotamians. These interactions are manifested in the archaeology of the region, particularly the craft traditions, such as metalwork and ceramic production, as well as the architecture.

This lecture directly complements a special exhibit, *Ustamdan Ogrendim*, "I Learned from My Master": Traditional Turkish Occupations. *Ustamdan Ogrendim* features over 50 photographs taken by UMaine graduate Angela Waldron, who documented endangered Turkish craft tradition, such as metal working, hand weaving, shoe making, and musical instrument carving.

Publicity about these lectures will be coordinated by the University of Maine's Office of Public Affairs, which distributes Museum press releases and calendar listings to twenty-eight newspapers, and local television and radio stations. Information will also be sent to the *Maine Perspective* and will be posted on the Hudson Museum's website and on campus web-based bulletin boards. Information about the lectures is distributed to over 1,700 elementary and secondary school teachers state-wide through the Museum's school newsletter, *The Totem*. A postcard announcement will be sent to all UMaine employees and to a targeted Hudson Museum mailing list.

From the Cultural Affairs/Distinguished Lecture Series Committee, the Hudson Museum requests \$885 to support these two lectures. Matching funds will be provided by the offices of the Dean of Cultural Affairs and Libraries (\$500) and the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs (\$235) and by the inkind donation of lodging for the lecturers (\$150).
