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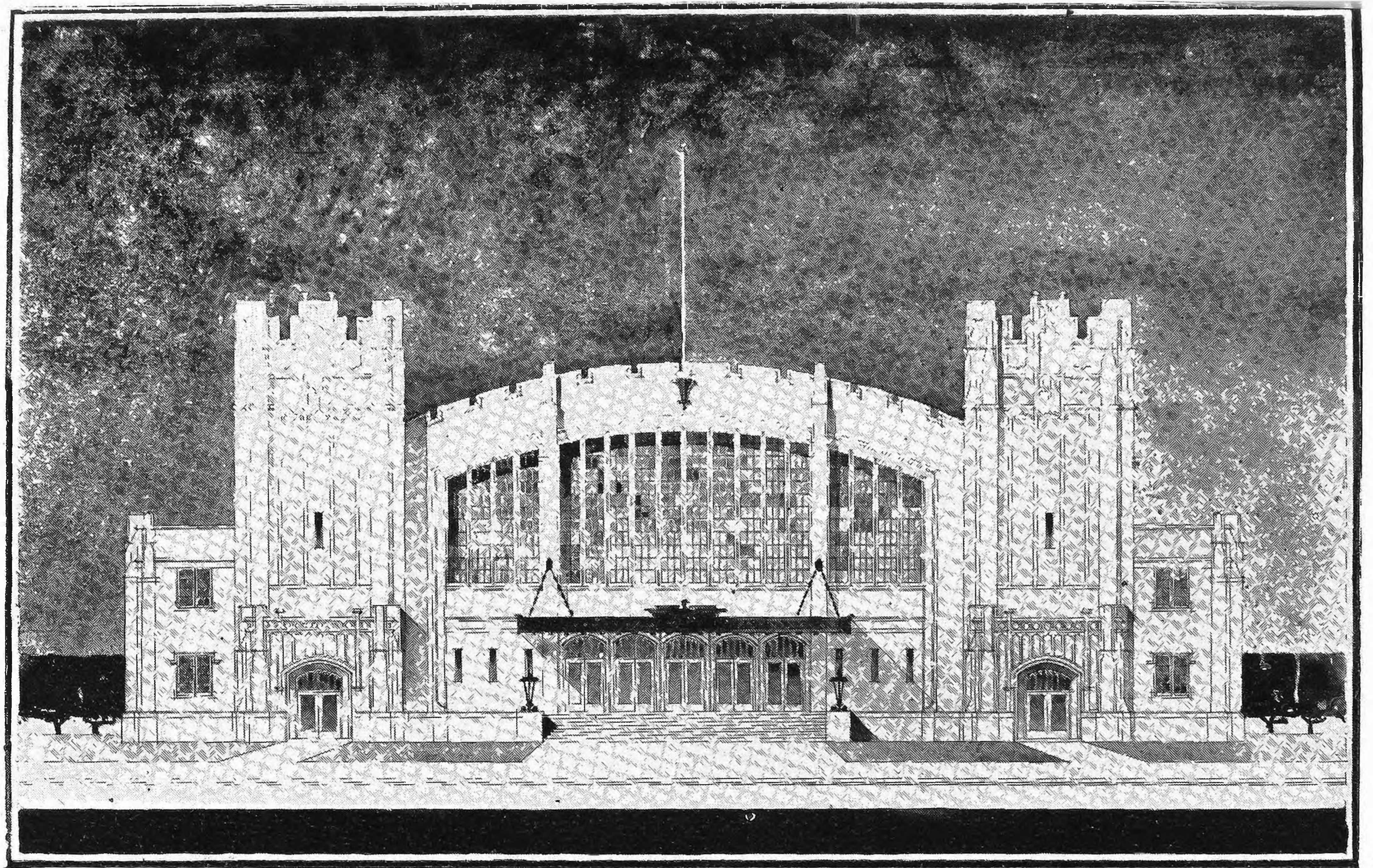

The Armory on Central Avenue, Lewiston, which will be completed this summer will be the best armory in the State of Maine. It is built, of course, primarily for the National Guard, but it offers, in the spacious drill hall, one of the finest auditoriums for public meetings anywhere in Maine. The floor and the gallery will seat about 4,000 people and under the laws of Maine, this building is available for public gathering.

The Armory was built by a committee from the city at large, representing the municipal officers, consisting of Major James L. Moriarty, chairman; E. P. Webster, William P. Gray, Dr. R. J. Wiseman and the mayor ex-officio. Capt. D. S. Dexter of the Guard represented that body on the committee.

MAYOR'S ADDRESS

Members of the City Council, Lewiston's Chief Executive:

We assemble here this morning as municipal officers to assume for the year to come, the management and administration of the affairs of the City of Lewiston, oath of official responsibility.

It is not a new experience for some of us, for five members of the Board of Aldermen this year sat in the deliberations of that body last year and thus the government of the past year is substantially continued into that of the new term.

It is my belief that you who served with me last year rendered whole hearted and efficient service to the city; that the record of the year is worthy of commendation but I hesitate to more than refer to it for our problem is not of the past but of the future.

I mention it in passing only that I find hope in the thought that the people of Lewiston can expect again this year the same type of high-minded service and devotion to the best interests of the city which characterized the administration just ended and which it must be, found expression in the unanimous action of the people in returning you to office.

I called attention in my inaugural address last year to the peculiar responsibility resting upon the administration. My exact words were:

"Let me briefly point out to you the responsibility you assume by your oaths here today. It is not peculiar to you, for I bear it as well,—this responsibility to "make good" at all costs. Your burden is greater than that ordinarily placed upon a City Council, for upon you, in my judgment, rests the decision as to whether the present form of Municipal government shall obtain in Lewiston or whether the Legislature will materially alter the organic law of our city. Therefore, not only are you and I on trial in this year which we are beginning, but the form of the government is on trial as well."

Our present form of Municipal government here in Lewiston is not now, I believe seriously challenged.

Lewiston is now passing into a new stage of development. It is growing rapidly and with its growth, which is steady and healthful, come problems of reconstruction and readjustment to meet the ordinary needs of the people. Among these problems are the expansion of the school houses; increased facilities in the Municipal lighting plant and in the municipal pumping station; the purchase of additional and replacement equipment in many of the departments; progressive continuance of a comprehensive, permanent road and sidewalk contruction; extension of water and sewage services; and the completion of the armory.

FINANCIAL CONDITION

This naturally brings us to a considertion of the financial condition of the city.

The condition of the city on Feb. 28 of this year as given in the city treasurer's report just made is as follows:

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The foregoing annual report stating, as it does, financial status as of February 28, 1923, shows a transaction of major importance relative to increasing the City Debt. This is occasioned by the outstanding Armory loan of \$116,500. Otherwise the City Debt would have been decreased by \$67,468.67.

I believe we can truthfully state that the city is in the best financial condition in its history. With all outstanding accounts paid in full, we had in the Treasury on February 28th in actual cash, \$83,090.56. This permits us to defer the making of a temporary loan in anticipation of taxes to pay current expenses until April 15th, something that the City had never before been able to do so far as I am able to learn.

DEPARTMENTAL ESTIMATES

Last year I requested each department to file with the City Auditor an estimate of the amount of money required to carry on the work thru the year. Results were highly satisfactory and so far this year I again request that the same procedure be taken.

"I shall require the heads of the different departments to furnish immediately as accurate an estimate as possible as to the probable financial standing of the department at the end of each month during the year. This method will enable the government to decide whether the departments are keeping within their estimates and their appropriations or not.

It is required that their estimates be presented in writing and that they be filed for our reference in checking the expenditures of the department from time to time. In the Public works department and in the Water department, it will be necessary for the City Council to indicate the amount to be as required. I recommend a joint conference of boards having charge of the construction work and the City Council to determine character, location and estimated cost of work."

THE SCHOOLS

At the request of last year's City Council, a representative committee of the citizens, of which five were not in any way connected with the government, made an exhaustive study of

the physical school plant and reported in December last to the council. Their report in conjunction with one made by the Superintending School Committee, was helpful and comprehensive.

The major work of this year's council will be to undertake the expansion of our school plants and this will necessitate the construction of modern, sanitary and fireproof buildings. We will embark upon this problem at once.

I suggest that from the surplus in the City Treasury, coming from last year, there be segregated \$50,000, deposited to the account of the City in the various savings institutions to be used as needed. An enabling act is now before the Legislature to authorize the City to issue bonds for schoolhouse construction.

THE ARMORY

I report excellent progress on the construction of the Armory. A committee made up of four citizens of Lewiston outside of the Council on which I represented the City, has worked untiringly to be sure that the building was constructed at the least cost compatible with the requirements. The success this committee has met gives me courage and indicates that citizens will give their time and judgment, if invited, to the material aid of the city.

The building will be completed in early summer and provides not only proper training accommodations for our National Guard citizen soldiers, but a vast community center for our public meetings. Its possibilities for social and civic advancement are limitless.

The street lighting system when built was believed to be sufficient for our needs for all time. It is now carrying a burden actually beyond its capacity. Our street lighting system cannot be expanded until the capacity of the plant is increased. This must be done. We should by survey and investigation decide upon what are the necessary steps to be taken in this department.

SABATTUS HIGHWAY

I would recommend an appropriation to construct a highway to Sabattus under the Three Town Act, in co-operation with Litchfield, Wales and Webster, which towns have already made appropriations for this work. It would open up a new improved avenue into Lewiston of great business value to the city. If Lewiston appropriates the minimum of \$1,924, the State provides dollar for dollar or \$4,924, making a joint fund of \$9,848. If Lewiston appropriates the maximum of \$24,620, the State provides \$44,316, or nearly two dollars for each dollar put in by the city or a total of \$68,936.

FIRE DEPARTMENT

I recommend the passage of an order permitting the Fire Commissioner to purchase a pumper. This piece of apparatus will greatly increase the efficiency of the department.

CITY CENSUS

I submit to your consideration the advisability of taking a census or count of the people of Lewiston. Believing that the population has increased since the last Federal census and that reliable data showing growth and increase is valuable to a community and to its people, I recommend an immediate census.

TAXES

The burden of taxation is heavy. It must not be increased. Every effort of this administration should be directed to that end. The assessors of taxes must be instructed on this point.

By careful and sound valuation of property, the building of homes and industry is encouraged. This makes for confidence in the government and a greater regard for its established form.

Utmost pains must be taken, with the excessive demands, through necessary construction and permanent improvements, that the tax rate and the valuation be kept at where it now

is with the object of lowering it always before us, if it can be safely done. I do not favor an increase either in the valuations or the tax rate.

I want to impress on the assessors the necessity of so assessing and valuing property that the taxpayer is neither embarrassed nor perplexed.

The assessment should be just and fair in the first instance thus removing any cause for revaluation or abatement.

IN CONCLUSION

In conclusion I wish to thank the City Officials for their assistance and uniform courtesy during the past year. They have set high standards of faithfulness to their City.

The City of Lewiston is neither the toy of personal fancy nor the legitimate object of political advancement. It is a great business enterprise and, gentlemen of the City Council, it lies in your hands and mine to carry on with the affairs in a business manner with steadfast faith in our city; with determination that the interests of the city must be the first and sole consideration of every official act. With confidence in the future and the pride of our City ever before us, let us adjourn to the room below and there set our hands and minds to the conduct of the city's affairs.

All of the Catch Basins have been cleaned out during the year.

BRIDGES

For many years the bridge over the main canal on Main St., has been in very bad condition besides not being very ornamental and the past year a new structure has been con-

structed of reinforced concrete by the J. A. Greenleaf Sons Co., the contract price of which was \$27,000.00 of this amount the City assumed one half the A & K St. R R \$8,081.00 and the State balance added to the City's part was \$1,510.78 for plans and specifications \$1,938.25 for engineering services during construction making the total cost to the City of \$16,949.03. Of this amount there will no doubt be a rebate of some thousand or twelve hundred dollars.

Nearly all of the other bridges are in very good condition with the exception of the Chestnut St., bridge which should be replaced with a new one the coming season.

STATE AID ROAD

The department has done no State Aid Road work the past year with the exception of 850 feet of gravel road on College St., which was 3rd class work and the sum of \$1,596.28 was voted by the State.

It is the intention of the Board to extend this work the coming season.

The balance of the uncompleted road between the City and the Lisbon line let out to Fish Bros., last year is not finished but no doubt will be this year.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I would submit for your consideration the following recommendations:

Macadamizing Canal St., from Ash St., to Chestnut St.

Oxford St., from the G. T. R. R. tracks to Cross St.

Bates St., from Pine St., to Ash St.

Sabattus St., from Wood St., to St. Marie's Hospital.

Oak St., from Blake St., to Park St.

And it is the desire of Mayor Brann to macadamize Central Ave., from Sabattus St., to the Armory.

In closing this report I would extend thanks to Mayor Brann and members of the Highway Commission for assistance given during the year.

Fire Department

To the Members of the City Council;

I beg to submit herewith a report of the doings of the Fire Department for the municipal year just ended. As in last year's report I will refrain from including in this report a tabulation of the individual fires and losses and will repeat that if information is sought for in that respect it will be cheerfully furnished from the complete records on file.

FINANCES

An appropriation of \$67,700.00 was voted for the expenses of this department. By judicious expenditures I am happy to report that of this amount \$4,268.93 was returned to the treasury unexpended. The absence of fires of any great magnitude as well as the practice of economy contributed to this most satisfactory showing.

FIRES

During the year the department has responded to 392 alarms, classified as follows:

This is an increase of 30 alarms over those of last year. The number of chimney fires has increased appreciably due, no doubt, to the severity of the weather and the employment of substitutes for fuel owing to the coal shortage.

LOSSES

The losses occasioned by fire during the year show a most gratifying decrease from that of the preceding year. The total loss for the year 1921 was \$168,833.18. The property loss for the year just ended totals \$98,989.74, a

decrease of \$69,843.44. This indicates a reduction in losses of 41 per cent from that of the preceding year.

This comparatively small loss and large decrease in losses from the preceding year is a matter of which the department and the municipality may well feel proud. This most gratifying record may be accounted for in various ways. The promptness of the department in responding to alarms and the efficient work accomplished at fires is the most compelling reason. The removal of hazards as a result of inspections is another potent reason. The realization by the general public of the importance of fire prevention has also contributed to the result. The City of Indianapolis announces a 52 per cent reduction in losses the past year. Probably no other city in the country is as diligent in the practice of the doctrine of fire prevention. Not only are inspections by members of the fire departments constant, but to this is added educational features whereby both young and old are taught the importance of the elimination of the fire hazard. The remarkable results attained are sufficient justification for the methods employed.

In a smaller way we have attempted a similar program. Inspections of dwellings and business houses have been made from time to time by members of the department. As a rule requested correction of hazards found have been complied with. It is my judgment that these inspections coupled with a sympathetic co-operation of the general public in the elimination of fire hazards have contributed very materially to the good results of the year.

BUILDINGS AND APPARATUS

During the year extensive repairs have been made on the Central Fire Station and the Lincoln Street Station. Owing to the almost complete neglect of the buildings of the department for years, they are yet far from being in satisfactory condition. It is hoped, however, that the coming year may enable us to carry out a program of improvements which will make all stations presentable in appearance.

No new apparatus has been purchased and the old apparatus appears to be in good condition. An exchange of cars whereby a new Chief's car was obtained has been effected to the advantage of the department.

RECOMMENDATIONS

I beg to recommend again the purchase of a triple combination pumper.

I further recommend the erection of a sub station as a beginning on the proposed system of expansion of the department. Both of these recommendations have been made in the last year's report and reasons therefor given. I need not repeat that these needs in my judgment are imperative for the welfare of the city and for the maintenance of the high standard of the department.

CONCLUSION

In closing I beg to express my hearty appreciation of the work accomplished by the department. From Chief Samson down through to the ranks, regulars and call men alike, there has been displayed a spirit of harmony and cooperation most gratifying. With the continuation of this spirit coupled with a sympathetic attitude of a co-operating public, I trust that the report of the coming year's results may be as gratifying as these here recorded.

Report of Health Officer

To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the Board of Aldermen of the City of Lewiston:

GENTLEMEN:—

The Health Department respectfully presents the third annual report, covering its operation for the financial year ending February 28th, 1923, and other statistics for the calendar year, ending December 31st, 1922.

No changes were made in the personnel of the Health Department.

During the past year, the Health Department has been more and more called upon to participate in public health and related matters, and to furnish information on these topics.

Although the expenditures of the Department have not increased, the amount of work has not diminished. It is not the amount which a City expends in health activities that is of importance, but what it obtains for the expenditures. We are thankful to have with us, a Government with a spirit conducive to a rapid and wholesome growth in health activities.

In October, a co-operative campaign for the extermination of rats was inaugurated in the City of Lewiston. With this campaign, began a movement for improved sanitation. The result of the efforts of our citizens was quite satisfactory, since several thousands of vermine were exterminated, through Mr. Pitts of Buffalo, N. Y.

The general health of the city is influenced by many factors, and in order to accomplish the best results, the work of the Health Department must cover many lines. Each year sees an increase in the amount of work required of this department, not only in the prevention of contagious diseases, but in many other lines bearing upon the safeguarding of the public health.

As in the past, we have endeavored to bring down the infantile mortality rate, and hope that the coming year will prove our efforts to be more successful in the important part of the fight against infants' diseases. With the help of our

physicians, the parents' cares and the co-operation of the local organizations of child welfare, we sincerely hope to lower the present rate of deaths of infants.

The leading causes of deaths of children under one year old were: congenital debility, bronchopneumonia and diarrhoea. The total number of deaths of infants under one year was 146 during the year 1922 being a rate of 150 per 1000 births.

The total number of deaths from all causes, in Lewiston during the past year was 637—of which 95 were transients from local hospitals. The death rate per 1000 of population was 18.7

The mortality of old age was 137 which were 51 women and 86 men from 70 to 90 years of age and over. 17 of these were non-residents.

Deaths from cancer numbered 41 (12 non-residents)
Tuberculosis, all forms numbered 25 (4 non-residents)
444 cases of infectious diseases were reported in 1922.
971 births were recorded. (41 stillbirths)

5,131 cows were tested for bovine tuberculosis; 34 were condemned, being 0.66 per cent on the whole number.

The result is certainly gratifying. During the previous year, which was the first year that the law of testing cows supplying milk in Lewiston was enforced, 3.55 per cent of the cows tested were condemned. 4,862 cows had been tested, with 173 condemned. The aim in view in this branch of the health work, is to secure for the city, a tubercular free milk supply.

A. B. Andrews, the milk inspector tested 1109 samples of milk and cream; 53 samples were found to be below the required standard.

Three hundred permits to do plumbing work were granted by the plumbing inspector; 105 were for new plumbing installation and 195 for additions or repairs. Forty-four calls were made in regard to defective plumbing conditions. There are 103 plumbers' licences and 24 licences for plumbers' helpers, in Lewiston.

The fumigation officer, Felix Lagasse, fumigated 184 houses during the fiscal year 1922. These fumigations were for

diphtheria, scarlet fever, tuberculosis, and other infections. Ninety-five houses were quarantined. 370 nuisances were abated by the fumigator.

And we have taken upon ourselves the duty to solicit suggestions from the reading public respecting new publication and will ever appreciate very highly any information which will be of any assistance to the trustees in the selection of books.

At the beginning of the year we lost the services of Miss Marguerite Chamberlain who decided to go to another field but we were, and without delay, very fortunate in securing the services of Miss Annie L. Barr a very efficient, capable and experienced Librarian who in the short time she has been with us has proven herself to be "the right person in the right place."

Under her care with the encouragement she is entitled to from the trustees and the people in general, the library will not be neglected.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the Trustees of the Lewiston Public Library.

Gentlemen:—

I have the honor to present the twentieth annual report of the Lewiston Public Library.

It is a pleasure to record the work of the past year as the statistics show progress along the lines which are the especial business of the administration of a public library—the collection, preservation and distribution of books to the community.

Because of an error in the Report of the Librarian in 1917, when the figures for March 1, 1915 instead of March 1, 1916 were used as the basis for adding the new accessions, omitting the volumes acquired that year, the number of volumes in the library has been incorrectly reported since that date. That the library may be given credit for the true number of volumes, the correction is now made so the number in the library March 1, 1922 was 26,960 instead of 25,600 as given in the report last year. As 1,527 have been added during the past year and 1038 withdrawn, the number of volumes in the library March 1, 1923 is 27,449.

Our resources have been increased by the rental of a Traveling Library from the Maine State Library at Augusta. This consisted of fifty volumes for which we paid \$2.50 for

six months. As the books earned \$1.66 in fines, it was an inexpensive means of supplying the 635 books which is the record of circulation for this collection.

While it is necessary to spend money every year to satisfy the demand for adult fiction, which was 43.2 per cent of our circulation last year, we have a policy also to buy some volumes of especial value which will be permanent treasures for students of the future.

Many attractive books of travel and biography.

As about one quarter of the books lent are in the French language, 280 volumes in French have been added during the year.

That mothers and teachers may be sure of clean and attractive juvenile books, a Mothers' Library of books of fairy tales and standard juveniles is kept in the office to be lent under special conditions.

The periodical list which has been revised now consists of 104 magazines and 20 newspapers.

GIFTS

The number of books presented to the library as gifts is 175. Of these seventeen were from the United States government, fourteen from the Maine State Library and 144 from individuals. Included in this last number is a valuable gift of 58 volumes of French classics from Mr. Curtis A. Perry of Bridgton. These books in the French language are by standard authors, handsomely bound in half leather of foreign workmanship.

Another gift which is an important addition to the reference books in the library is a set, "The Messages and Papers of the Presidents," twenty volumes, presented by Mr. W. Scott Libbey. These are beautifully bound and have many fine illustrations. Mr. Libbey also gave ten volumes of books of current interest and a set of Balzac.

Pictures are an important part of library work with schools so we have begun collecting and mounting pictures which are classified and ready for use to illustrate school subjects. Many of these pictures have already been sent to the schools.

While the catalog work in this library has been excellent in the past, we hope to make it even better by the use of Library of Congress catalog cards. These insure neatness and accuracy, while they require less work than those typewritten in the library.

BUILDING

A great improvement was made in the interior of the building by painting and re-decorating all the rooms with the exception of the stack room. The work was done by John Duncan of Lewiston, to whom great credit is due for the pleasing effects of the well blended colors. The fire in the handsome open fire place in the delivery room has also given pleasure to patrons. Very attractive during the holiday season were the Christmas wreaths in the windows and the desk is frequently brightened by a potted plant.

While much attention has been given details which appeal to the eye, every sanitary precaution suitable in a public building has been taken. A vacuum cleaner was purchased

for cleaning the books in the stack, and liquid soap and paper towels installed in the Children's Room. An antiseptic spray, the base of which is formaldehyde, is used in an atomizer in all the rooms every morning.

CIRCULATION

The circulation record shows that 60,444 books have been lent for home use. This is a gain of 3000 over the record of 1922, although the library was closed for ten days in October during the painting. We are much gratified by the attendance in the reading and reference rooms where many read magazines and newspapers every day and consult the reference books. An effort has been made to count this attendance from the desk, but accuracy is impossible when the attendants are busy, so only an approximate estimate is reached, which is that the average is about one hundred people daily.

STAFF

In July, Miss Marguerite Chamberlain who had been librarian since 1920 tendered her resignation to accept a position as reference librarian in the Bridgeport Public Library Bridgeport, Conn. Miss Chamberlain left the library in a prosperous condition having completed much constructive work during her administration. Miss Anne L. Barr, librarian of the Rumford Public Library was appointed as her successor, beginning service August 6.

Miss Catherine Lawton who had efficiently assisted at the delivery desk, was unable to serve the library after September when she entered Bates College.

In January occurred the death of Mr. John Larocque who had been the faithful janitor since May 1914. By his death we lost a man devoted to the library and interested in the care of the property.

His successor is Dominique P. Gagnon who very efficiently performs the duties of his position being a skillful workman in the trades of plumber, painter, carpenter and electrician.

PUBLICITY

An effort has been made to bring the Library and its resources to the attention of the people of Lewiston. Weekly lists of books have appeared in the Lewiston Daily Sun under the caption of "Librarian's Corner" and frequent lists and notices have also been published in the Lewiston Evening Journal.

Children's Book Week was observed Nov. 12-18 by an especial exhibit of juvenile books loaned by B. Peck Co. Many lists of books suitable for children were distributed and attractive posters decorated the bulletin boards.

WORK WITH SCHOOLS

It is desirable that all pupils in the Jordan High School be taught to use the library and made to feel that the library is ready to help them in their work. To express this willingness for service the librarian has given four talks on the use of reference books before the four classes at the High School and hopes to receive classes at the library next year for practical instruction in answering research questions. The debating teams have worked many hours in the library and much special material has been obtained on their different subjects.

The teachers of the night school brought twenty-five girls of the English class to visit the library, when they were shown the books and periodicals and given instruction in the use of the library.

HOURS

The opening of the library until nine o'clock every night, adding six hours to the former schedule, is in compliance with the standard hours for library opening recommended in the state library laws. The new rule went into effect January first and the additional evening hours have been much appreciated by library patrons.

MAINE LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

The Lewiston Public Library entertained the Maine Library Association May 12-13 when members were welcomed

at the library and arrangements made for meetings which were held at the Pine St. Congregational Church. It was a privilege for the entire staff to be able to attend the meetings of the association.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation of the hearty support which has been given me by the Trustees and to to thank them for co-operation in all my plans for the library.

I thank my assistants Mrs. G. A. Duston and Miss Irma Belleau for efficient service and our desk assistants, Adeline Leger and Rose Verrault for courteous attention to the wishes of patrons and for willing assistance in the work of the library.

Statistics of the year are appended to this report.

REPORT OF THE POLICE DEPARTMENT

Fiscal year ending February 28th, 1923.

To the Police Commissioners:—

Gentlemen:—

It is my privilege, again to submit a report of the operations of the Police Department together with recommendations for the coming year.

In accordance with your policy of administration the Police Department has been conducted with the most rigid economy consistent with efficiency and adequate service. During the past year a police garage has been erected at a cost of \$1,752.02. This, as per agreement with the City Government has been paid for from receipts of the Municipal Court. Exclusive of the above item the total costs of the department has been \$62,094.98, of which \$55,580.23 was paid for salaries. On the basis of the 1920 census, our per capita costs for the year 1922 is \$1.94. This is materially below other New England cities. Also, in connection with this statement, I wish to add that I have statistics to show that on a basis of our population (1920 census) in order to compare favorably with average police strength of thirty New England cities, our department should consist of forty-nine members instead of thirty-three.

We are happy to state that a large number of our citizens have freely expressed their appreciation of the clean and able work of the police department. We have been further encouraged by frequent favorable comments, both oral and written, testifying to the efficiency and courtesy extended to the public by the members of our force.

fyng to the efficiency and courtesy extended to the public by the members of our force,

We believe, that the police, first, last and all the time, are the forces of law and order, and the protectors of every law-abiding person within their jurisdiction. All reputable citizens, all normal individuals are on the side of the honest police officer. They must be, if only for selfish reasons, if only to protect themselves and their property. Every pander to vice, gambler, parasite and criminal, looks upon the reputable citizen, normal and clean living person, as his prey. He abominates the very name of the police, seeks every opportunity and makes every effort to discredit them and to prejudice the community against them. He appreciates that it is much to the advantage of the law breaker to create misunderstanding between the public and the police.

While our department has endeavored to steadily and consistently enforce all laws, the general public interest in the enforcement of the prohibitory law and the large amount of time given to this enforcement by our department leads me to give special consideration of this matter in this report. For the calendar year 1922 the tabulated facts concerning liquor sellers only are as follows,

This is the record of convictions in the Lewiston Municipal Court, showing that fifty-two (52) liquor sellers were convicted the first six months and seventy-nine (79) the second six months, a total of one hundred and thirty-one (131) for the year, an average of 2.54 convictions each week during the year, two hundred and six (206) seizures were made during the year, which is an average of 3.96 seizures each week. Approximately five hundred (500) liquor search warrants were issued to officers by the Clerk of Courts during the year. An average of 9.62 each week.

We believe the above facts are grounds for encouragement. A review of the work of the department along this line for the past ten years, gives the following tabulation showing a comparison of the number of arrests for intoxicating with the number of prosecutions for the violation of the liquor law, (liquor sellers) the arrests being convictions of record.

To the interested person, these facts, which are a matter of record, prove that this department has been successful in the enforcement of the liquor laws.

RECOMMENDATIONS

An increase of three permanent officers and two traffic officers during the automobile season.

A police signal box to be installed at the corner of Birch and Blake Streets.

Addition to motor equipment of the department in the form of Chief's car.

Two audible signals to be installed at the corner of Main and Lincoln Streets and at the corner of Lisbon and Cedar Streets.

Twelve silent police traffic stands.

One Y and E Police camera to be used in taking criminal photos, together with the necessary screens, chair, stand and flashlight apparatus.

Twenty-five (25) night sticks.

Twenty-five (25) pair Peerless handcuffs to replace present cuffs which are heavy, bulky and obsolete.

Twenty-five (25) cap covers to replace present helmets which are obsolete.

Three (3) white rubber coats for the use of traffic officers in wet weather.

Two Dome Safety traffic lights, to be installed at the intersection of Pine street and Ash street on Lisbon.

Two Flashing Beacon lights to be installed at Hospital Square and at the corner of College and Sabattus Streets.

Five (5) Rand Traco cabinets for criminal files.

In conclusion, it is a pleasure to acknowledge the co-operation and assistance given me during the year, by the Police Commission, the Honorable Mayor and City Council and many interested citizens. I respectfully urge and request a continuation of this interest and support in the administration of our police affairs.

Gentlemen:—

I have the honor to submit my fourth annual report as Police Matron and Police Woman for the year ending Feb. 28, 1923.

I have been in my office daily, mornings, afternoons, evenings and Sundays. Have cared for all girls and women in the custody of the police and attended them in the Municipal Court room. Have accompanied two young girls to the House of the Good Shepherd in Boston at no expense to the city, three to the Hallowell State School for girls, five to the Skowhegan Reformatory for women and several women to the Augusta State Hospital. The young girls taken to the Boston convent and Hallowell State School were unruly and could not be controlled by their parents. The women sentenced to the Reformatory by our Municipal Court, were a grave menace to themselves and to our city as regards health and morals.

After repeated warnings, I have reported four families to the State Board of Charities and Corrections, whose children have been given to the custody of the State for reasons that in three of the families, both father and mother became frequently intoxicated, the fourth family had immoral home surroundings. In addition to these four families, is the case of an apparently abandoned three year old boy, who also was given into the custody of the state.

During the year I have made hundreds of calls at homes,

boarding and rooming places, dance halls, depots, cafes with curtained booths, cabarets and places frequented by girls and women.

My office is frequented by men, women and girls for help in securing work, for advice as their many problems, unkind parents, untrue husbands and wives. unruly children, etc.

As my work is almost entirely on protective lines it is not made public unless the girl or woman continues to be idle and wayward. Our department tries to impress on children and their parents, that boys and girls under 16 years of age must not attend public places, walk or loiter on our streets after 8 P. M. unattended. Nearly all parents co-operate with us in this matter.

A big step toward necessary supervision of public dance halls was made at the Beacon Hall last fall and winter by the employment of a matron, for with a woman attendant, no man or woman of known loose character, with their suggestive dancing will be welcomed. Some argue that the real harm to our young people occurs after leaving the hall, if this is true, then part of the responsibility, at least, should be assumed by the parents or those directly interested in their welfare, that they know if their young people return home directly from the dance and by whom accompanied.

Much credit is due our city community service for recreation work among our boys and girls.

In closing, I wish to thank our Chief, Captains Picard and O'Connell and Police officers, also all other city officials and employees for their courtesy and readiness in assisting me in this work.
