# MAYOR'S ADDRESS

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*Members of the Board of Aldermen, Ladies and Gentlemen:—*

We meet here this morning to take upon ourselves the official duties of the government of the City of Lewiston, as the elected representatives of its people. What our appreciation of the vast responsibility conferred upon us by the citizens of the city is better expressed in actions than in words and so I do not propose to take up valuable time in an academic discussion of the duties of public officers.

Always bearing in mind that we must so administer to the affairs of the city that the tax rate shall be maintained at no higher level than it is today, we should consider the making of permanent improvements at the municipal lighting plant and an extension of the school system.

## LIGHTING PLANT

The lighting plant is now taxed to its capacity. I submit to you the problem of whether this is the year to make the needed repairs. There is no question of the necessity of installing a unit of greater capacity or an additional unit.

## THE SCHOOLS

The congestion of the grade schools will be greatly relieved in the fall. The opening of the West Rose Hill school and the great expansion of the parochial system, will, I believe, with the addition of a grade school to accommodate the upper Main and upper College streets and the immediate and interlying territory, amply provide for grade school needs. I advise the building of such a school this year.



I believe that the next problem in the school program is to construct a modern high school, but I do not believe that this year is the year to undertake its construction.

### THE ARMORY

The citizens have decided by a referendum vote that the title to the Armory shall remain in the city. After the report of the Building Committee is accepted by the City Council, it will be the duty of the city to care for and maintain this building. We are all proud of the building and I know that you will co-operate with me in giving careful attention to its care and to the selection of proper custodians.

While the city cannot claim from the State any part of the \$50,000 pledged toward construction, I believe that the special appropriation of \$15,000 for furnishings is legally due the City of Lewiston and I shall immediately take this up with the State authorities.

I shall also immediately take up, if you support me in this endeavor, the matter of a fair rental from the State for Armory purposes.

The \$50,000 pledged by the State must now be paid by the city. I invite your attention to the question of the method of raising this amount and shall confer with you as to whether it should be raised this year by direct taxation or by some plan of deferred payments.

### WATER WORKS DEPARTMENT

Within 60 days a six million gallon electrically driven centrifugal pump with motor attached will be installed in our pumping station. This will guard against any possibility of a water famine and will permit the repair of the present water driven pumps and the water wheels.

A condition in regard to the purity of the water supply developed last fall. I understand this condition no longer



exists. It arose from the pollution of Lake Auburn. I recommend that during the coming season, the city employ a competent "full-time" officer to patrol Lake Auburn shores and its tributaries and I recommend that we request the Sheriff of the County to deputize the person selected so that he can act with authority.

We should also instruct the city solicitor to institute prosecutions against offenders found polluting the waters of Lake Auburn. We should make it our great concern to keep the source of our drinking water pure and healthful. Lewiston and Auburn, if need be, should join in this work, and correct the nuisances and causes of pollution, cause protective legislation to be enacted and condemn and take shore rights if that be necessary.

### FINANCIAL CONDITION

The financial condition of the city is satisfactory. I am very happy to inform you that on account of its excellent financial condition, it will be unnecessary for you to pass at this time, an order authorizing a temporary loan in anticipation of taxes and that it can be deferred until April 15th, saving the city a considerable sum in interest charges.

I will not take your time to read the report of the city treasurer which is on file and which will be published in the city report.

It shows the city to be in a very healthy financial condition. The cash balance is \$39,021.49. The increase in the city debt is due entirely to the issuance of the Armory and school bonds. I invite your attention to a very careful inspection of the report of the treasurer and the monthly reports of the city auditor as issued throughout the year. I wish the citizens would interest themselves in this vital business.

I wish in closing to express my gratitude to the city officials who with uniform courtesy and with deep regard for their

obligations have performed their tasks with credit to themselves and the city.

In conclusion, let us so administer the affairs of Lewiston that the tax burden remain at its present level, and let us work harmoniously to that end. The confidence of the people is not to be lightly regarded and we hope, to have so carried out their trust, that when the year has finished and the balance is struck that we shall merit their respect and have proven their verdict.

# Fire Department

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Lewiston, Maine, March 1, 1924.

To the City Council:

I beg to submit herewith my report of the Fire Department for the municipal year just ended.

During the year the department has been called to answer to four hundred and seven alarms tabulated as follows:

Of this number one hundred and sixty eight were so-called chimney fires, and forty-four dump fires. Chimney fires are unnecessary. They are the result of property holders carelessness. Frequently they are the cause of serious property damage. To avoid the unnecessary loss entailed, owners of property should exercise more care and endeavor to clean their chimneys at least once a year.

The Highway Commission, so I have been informed, are to burn combustible refuse, before depositing the same on the various dumps. If this be so, it will be a very welcome innovation as altogether too much time of the department has been expended on entirely needless dump fires.

This represents a per capita loss of less than three dollars. Considering the type of property which prevails in this City, this record is a very favorable one, although slightly more than that of last year.

## APPARATUS

The apparatus of the department is in good condition. During the year a new triple combination pumper has been added to the equipment. This will be of special value in the low pressure districts. The purchase of this piece of apparatus necessitated the employment of two more regular men.

## STATIONS

Extensive repairs have been made on the Hook and Ladder House and the Central Fire Station, so that the various stations may well be called in good condition.

## CASUALTIES

The death of Superintendent of Fire Alarms, Fred E. Page and Chief Engineer, Wilfrid J. Samson occurred during the

year. Both of these men were valued members of the department, faithful and efficient in their service to the City, and in their deaths the department suffered distinct losses.

Kenneth Kirk has been appointed to fill the vacancy created by the death of Superintendent Page.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

The Commissioner begs to repeat his recommendations heretofore made in connection with the expansion of the department to cover unprotected outside areas; a further gradual motorization of the department with the object of better service; and the enactment of a building code to prevent the erection of new fire hazards.

### CONCLUSION

The thanks of the Commissioner are extended to the members of the department for their hearty and harmonious co-operation. In thus extending my appreciation may I also congratulate the department on the excellent results accomplished during the year. Due appreciation of the efficient work of the members of the Police Department in their co-operative efforts is hereby marked.

# Report of Health Officer

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To the Honorable Mayor and Members of the Board of Aldermen of Lewiston, Maine.

Gentlemen:

The Health Department respectfully submits the fourth annual report of the work accomplished and the cost of its maintenance during the year 1923.

No changes were made in the personnel of the Health Department, except that Miss Huard, School Nurse, resigned March 24, 1923.

After receiving several reports from the State Department of Health Laboratory, a survey of the Lake Auburn water-shed was made, with representatives from the State Department of Health, the Public Utilities Commission, and the Lewiston and Auburn Water Boards. Certain conditions were found very unsatisfactory, and orders were given to remedy the matter. A special meeting of the Water Board was called, at which time a chlorinator was recommended, and was installed.

We appreciate the action of the Water Board in safeguarding the water supply of our City.

Owing to the increase in the infant mortality rate, through the courtesy of the State Department of Health, Miss Nellie B. Wright, State Nurse, was assigned to make a survey in our City, covering the years 1922 and 1923.



This survey is to determine the cause of the high infant mortality rate. Miss Wright calls on the mothers, where the history of the mother and baby is secured in each instance if possible.

Points covered in this study, will reveal the conditions surrounding the mother and baby before and after birth. Such information will give us a basis for future work regarding pre-natal welfare.

There was a decrease in the deaths of infants under one year, the total being 130 in 1923, compared with 146 in 1922.

The total number of births was 1139 in 1923, and 971 in 1922. The infant mortality rate was 114 per 1000 births in 1923, and 150 per 1000 births in 1922.

We sincerely hope that the result of the survey actually being made, where mothers are receiving advice, will help to decrease the infant mortality rate in the future.

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## COMMUNICABLE DISEASES

*Typhoid Fever*—In 1922, 9 cases had been reported; in 1923 there were 12 cases. This high number of cases of typhoid fever is due to non-residents coming to Lewiston to be treated. The average number of cases from Lewiston proper is 2 annually. Attempts to trace the source of infection are not generally successful.

*Smallpox*—In 1922 there were 3 cases; in 1923, 4 cases. None of these patients had been successfully vaccinated, previous to the development of the disease.

*Measles*—In 1922, there were 28 cases. We notice quite an increase in 1923, being 256 cases. We realize the difficulty in controlling the spread of this disease; which is due to the fact that children are at large, mingling with others, in the most infectious stage. The disease will be under control when the parents are educated to it, and acquire a knowledge of measles. Measles was heavily prevalent in May and June.

*Scarlet Fever*—In 1922, 99 cases were reported; in 1923, there were 145 cases. Scarlet Fever was particularly prevalent in April and May. The increase is due to a slight outbreak at Bates College, which was checked immediately.

*Whooping Cough*—In 1922, there were 38 cases; in 1923, 282 cases were reported. We had an epidemic of whooping cough in January, when 148 cases were reported. One death occurred from whooping cough.

*Diphtheria*—In 1922, 37 cases were reported; in 1923, there were 51 cases. There were 2 deaths from diphtheria. The increase is due to a slight outbreak at Bates College.

*Tuberculosis, all forms*—In 1922, there were 45 cases; in 1923 63 cases were reported.

This year there was quite an increase in communicable diseases being 444 cases in 1922, with 943 in 1923.

We believe that these communicable diseases would be controlled in a better manner, if the City acquired an isolation hospital, so that the first cases would be isolated immediately, in a satisfactory manner.



## VITAL STATISTICS

The attention of local physicians has previously been called to the tardiness and incompleteness has previously been called to notification of reportable diseases.

Birth returns are unnecessarily delayed, and in many instances, there are infants whose birth is not recorded. This condition of affairs is most unsatisfactory and annoying, since it renders it impossible for one to keep in close and immediate touch with the actual gains and losses from births and deaths.

## BIRTHS

During the year of 1923, there were 1139 living births, 574 females and 565 males, or 31 births for every 1,000 population, besides 38 stillbirths. Of the infants born living, 44 died the first day of birth, 130 died under one year.

## DEATHS

There were 655 deaths from all causes, an annual rate of 17.8 per 1,000 of population.

Old Age—163 died from 70 to 90 years or over.

The most frequent causes of death are:

Bright's Disease	35
Tuberculosis, all forms	25

There were 100 deaths of persons who were not residents of Lewiston; if these were excluded, there would be a material reduction in the death rate.



## MILK SUPPLY

The Health Department is striving to improve the character of its milk supply and the result of its efforts seems to meet with varying success.

In 1923 the number of samples of milk found to be below standard was smaller than that of 1922, but the figures show that the lowest sample analyzed in 1923 was still lower in butter fats than the lowest in 1922,—being 2.60 in 1922, and 2.40 in 1923. The highest sample of milk tested in 1922 was 9.20 butter fats, and 9.96 in 1923.

All efforts are made in order to provide a reasonably safe milk supply.

In 1921 was the first time that the tuberculin test on cows was made compulsory. 4870 cows were then tested in the Lewiston area, 173 cows condemned, being a percentage of 3.55.

In 1922, 5131 cows were tested and 34 condemned, the percentage being 0.66.

In 1923, 3782 cows were tested, and 7 condemned, the percentage being less than 2 per 1000 cows.

## RESTAURANTS

Although the conditions are fairly good in the local restaurants, there are chances for improvements in cleanliness.

It would be quite an advantage if applications for licenses were referred to the Health Officer for his approval, before being granted by the Committee on licenses, as he is in a position to know whether or not the license should be granted.

Proprietors of soda fountains where ice cream and soft drinks are served, are being repeatedly advised as to the importance of sterilizing utensils and using paper cups.

## RECOMMENDATIONS

1. A sewer on Riverside Street, in order to do away with the community cesspool actually existing, which is a menace to health, being a fly and mosquito breeding place.

2. An isolation hospital, where it would be possible to remove patients affected with contagious diseases from lodging houses,—tubercular cases that are on the waiting list to enter the Sanitorium, who in the meantime are liable to transmit the disease to the family or to citizens,—and also persons affected with venereal diseases that are unable to work and are liable to infect others.

The advantages of an isolation hospital are: (a) The financial saving to the City, who is paying for board and room and care of those patients. (b) The prevention of spreading those diseases, by being under strict quarantine. In large families, the patient would be removed and thus allow other children to attend school.

3. The need of a municipal nurse to work in conjunction with the Health Officer, in the local schools and also to help in controlling the spread of diseases, for child welfare work and for numerous other matters concerning the Health Department.

4. I again call to the attention of the municipal officers, the necessity of providing comfort stations. There are several locations in the City where crowds gather, and remain for hours of evenings and late at night that have not access to toilets. These people suffer and finally resort to alleys and dark nooks about buildings, thus creating nuisances.

The most urgent need of a comfort station is at the corner of Main and Lisbon Streets, where many men assemble.

I have the honor to present the twenty-first annual report of the Lewiston Public Library.

It is a pleasure to submit the statistics of the year as there has been a remarkable increase in figures representing the activities of the various branches of the work. That the Library is serving a larger reading public is shown by the number of books lent which was 15,000 more than in 1922-23 when the circulation was 60,444, being an increase of 25 per cent. The growth of the collection of books has been satisfactory as 1628 volumes have been added to the library, the second largest number acquired in any single year since its establishment in 1903. In the reading room, the attendance has been constant, many readers enjoying the newspapers and magazines and much reference work has been done with pupils of the High School and students of Bates College. In general the year closes with a gratifying record.

### ACCESSIONS

The total number of volumes in the library March 1, 1923 was 27,449. As 1628 have been added during the year and 210 discarded the number now in the Library is 28,867.

Every effort has been made that the selection of books may be wise and the money expended to the best possible advantage. In the list of special titles which follows will be found many books which are valuable additions to the library as a source of reference work. The fiction purchased during the year has been carefully selected and many favorite old titles long discarded have been renewed. To satisfy the call for books in the French language 146 volumes have been purchased, some ordered in Paris, paid for in francs bought at a favorable rate of exchange. The most important additions to the French library is an Encyclopædia in 31 volumes, "La Grande Encyclopedie" published by Larousse.

As the library should be the repository of documents and records concerning local history, it has been decided to have the two Lewiston daily newspapers bound beginning with January 1923. Bound volumes have been added to the file of Annual Reports of the City of Lewiston, dating from the first report which is for the year 1864. There are lacking only reports for the years 1904 and 1906 which it is hoped can be supplied. A valuable pamphlet "History of Lewiston" (1882) written by J. G. Elder has been presented to the Library by Mrs. Charles Gilman. That the interesting articles on local and Maine history which appear weekly in the Saturday magazine supplement to the Lewiston Journal may be found easily, an index to the magazines for 1923 was made in the Library by Miss Irma Belleau which was printed by the Journal as part of the issue for Feb. 9, 1924.

The resources of the Library have been increased by the rental of Traveling Libraries from the Bureau of Library Extension at Augusta and by loans from the libraries of Auburn, Belfast, Portland, Rumford and the Maine State Library.

In October a rental library of recent fiction was established by the purchase of seven of the most popular books. This has been so well patronized that the collection now consists of 27 books, 20 of which, have been bought from the rental money. It is the plan that all titles in this rental library shall be duplicates of books in the free collection and that they shall eventually become part of the general library as newer titles replace them.

### GIFTS

Through the kindness of friends of the Library the book fund has been saved by gifts of popular fiction and juveniles. The total number of books presented was 210.

Among the books given by Mrs. Samuel Sawyer was a two volume set "Commerce of the Prairies" by Josiah Gregg, date 1850, which was listed recently in a bookseller's catalog as a valuable item of Americana.

In response to a request made in the Lewiston paper for the National Geographic Magazine for 1923 to bind Mr. Edward H. Delano furnished the library with the necessary magazines.

### CIRCULATION

The circulation 75,496 was the largest in the history of the library. New and attractive books and the publicity afforded by the local papers in making them known to the people brought this important increase in the business of the Library.

### BRANCH LIBRARIES

An effort has been made to establish home libraries in parts of Lewiston far from the city. Mrs. Frank E. Moore at Thosne's Corner took charge of a Traveling Library which was placed in her home in March and kept during the summer. In the Fall another Traveling Library was delivered to Mrs. Grace Hatch, Gould's Corner who reported a good circulation. Mrs. Hatch now has a collection of books belonging to the library which she lends to neighbors. It is hoped that the Library can do useful work by means of these Home Libraries.



## WORK WITH SCHOOLS

No opportunity has been neglected to be of service to the public schools. Special loans have been made to teachers and books purchased especially for the school work. In September and October classes in reference work came to the library 4 days a week when they were given instruction in the use of reference books followed by practice questions.

The Principal of the High School at Sabattus with forty pupils visited the Library in October when a talk was given by the librarian and the guests shown the building and its resources explained.

Two evenings recently Mr. Conley brought an English class from the night school who were given questions for study of reference books and instructed in the use of the library.

## PUBLICITY

The best library in the world would be wasted if its treasures were not made known to people who could appreciate them. Realizing this fact, publicity for the library has been a part of the administration to which much thought and time has been devoted. Every month lists of new books have been published in the local papers and frequent items of general interest concerning the library have appeared. Advantage was taken of the occasion afforded by Children's Book Week to attract people to the Library by an exhibition of juvenile books lent by the B. Peck Co. Posters also inviting patronage for the library have been placed in the mills and on public bulletin boards.

## WORK WITH CHILDREN

The one department of the library in which almost no progress has been made is our work with children. We have a splendid room and we buy the best of juvenile books but

we need a Children's Librarian, some one who can continue the work of the teacher outside the school room, some one who can tell stories to the children, direct their taste in books and be an inspiration to those whose mothers are perhaps working outside the home and too busy to give them attention. On four Saturdays in March and April Miss Alice Cottle of Lewiston told stories to the children when the interest indicated the value of a Children's Librarian to the Library.

In July a Vacation Reading Club was organized to which many children belonged. The Massachusetts State Reading lists were used and prizes of colored pictures given to children who read the required number of books.

### GARDEN

A gift to the library which cannot fail to make this corner of the city more attractive is a garden given by members of the Stanton Bird Club through the efforts of Mrs. C. E. Norton and Mrs. W. H. Hartshorn. It is a border 65 x 6 feet around the eastern end of the library lot. The ladies have also frequently brought flowers for the desk which were much enjoyed by all who visited the library.

### LIBRARY ASSOCIATION

In May the Bureau of Library Extension of Augusta conducted a school of library instruction in the Auburn Public Library which was attended by Mrs. Duston and Miss Belleau who completed all the required work of the course.

Miss Barr represented the Lewiston Public Library at the meeting of the Maine Library Association in Bangor June 7-9 when she read a paper on Library Publicity. She also attended the meeting of the Massachusetts Library Association held at North Scituate Mass. June 21-24.

In response to an appeal from the Maine Library Association, the Trustees and Staff sent a contribution of \$4.75, the quota asked for the Louvain Library Fund.



## STAFF

There have been no changes in the staff during the year. All assistance have served at the desk efficiently and made many friends. Special recognition should be given the servicess of Dominique P. Gagnon, our skillful and obliging janitor, who through his unusual mechanical ability has provided many conveniences in articles of furniture and has effected many economies in items of necessary expense.

In closing I thank the Trustees for their generous encouragement of my plans and I wish to express my appreciation of the willing service given the Library by my assistants.

### TRAFFIC

Owing to the ever increasing use of Automobiles, the demands on the Police Department for additional traffic work is increasing each year, requiring additional traffic officers and additional regulations from time to time. I have requested the City Solicitor to draw an ordinance, to be presented to the City Government, giving the Police Commissioners power to make Traffic Regulations whenever necessary. Such an ordinance, if properly planned will enable the Police to regulate one traffic section and then after watching results caused by that particular regulation, other regulations may be made in adjoining sections. This plan, I believe would eliminate confusion which might be caused by the adoption of a large number of traffic regulations at one time.

## LIQUOR

The record of arrests for drunkenness for the past five years follows. This table also includes persons who have been arrested operating a motor vehicle while under the influence of intoxicating liquor.

This is the record of conviction in the Lewiston Municipal Court showing that 88 liquor sellers were convicted the first six months and 63 the second six months, a total of 151 convictions for the year, an anverage of 2.9 convictions each week. 205 seizures were made for the year, an average of 3.95 seizures each week. 707 liquor search warrants were issued by the Clerk of Courts to officers of this department during the year, an average of 13.59 each week.

### RECOMMENDATIONS

The addition of five permanent officers and three special officers to work during the summer tourist season. During the past seven years no additions have been made to the force, altho two permanent traffic officers and two part time traffic officers have been used during the past three years. This has been accomplished by assignment of officers from the Day and Night Platoons to traffic duty, this change required the withdrawal of the English Hill officer and the enlargement of other beats.

This department should have an addition of 19 officers if it were to be brought to the same strength of 30 other New England cities having a population of from 25 to 75 thousand people. The city of Bangor with approximately 26,000 people has 38 police officers, we have 33 in Lewiston and our population is approximately 36,000.

The appointment of a full time clerk for the department.

The purchase of,

2 Police Signal boxes to be installed at the Fairgrounds and and at the corner of Birch and Blake Streets.

2 Audible signals to be installed at the corner of Main and Lincoln Streets and at the corner of Lisbon and Cedar Streets.

12 Silent police traffic stands.

1 Y and E camera to be used in taking criminal photos, together with the necessary screens, chair, stand and flashlight apparatus.

6 Safety Zone markers.

2 Dome Safety traffic lights.

2 Flashing Beacon lights to be installed at the intersection



of Main and Sabattus streets and on Park street at the head of Chestnut Street. The Beacon Light which was installed at the corner of College and Sabattus streets last year has proven a success, the signal flashes day and night and after erection costs from 25 to 30 dollars a year to maintain.

3 Rand Traco cabinets for criminal files.

A new Patrol and Ambulance. The present Cadillac patrol has been in service 9 years and has become an expensive piece of apparatus to maintain, the car must be thoroughly repaired or replaced by a new car this year.

That spotlights be installed at all corners where traffic officers are on duty.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation for the co-operation and assistance given the department by the Police Commission, the Honorable Mayor and City Council, the various Court Officials, and many interested citizens who have shown a willingness to do their part in promoting the proper enforcement of Law in this City. Public sentiment is an important factor in the enforcement of law and all citizens who help in this work are entitled to the highest commendation.

# Police Matron

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To the Police Commissioners of the City of Lewiston.

Gentlemen: —

I have the honor to submit my fifth annual report for the year ending Feb. 29, 1924.

I have been in my office daily both mornings and afternoons and many evenings. I have cared for all women in the custody of the Police.

I accompanied one young girl to the House of the Good Shepherd in Boston, one to the Hallowell State School for girls, an infant to the Holy Innocent's Home in Portland, several women to the State Hospital in Augusta and several runaway girls to their homes. I have not accompanied any woman to the Skowhegan Reformatory for Women as all such offenders from our local court were bound over to the Superior Court and our county probation officer has charge of all Superior Court cases of this nature.

I have made hundreds of calls at homes, rooming places, depots, dance halls, cafes, cabarets, ice cream parlors, etc., in the interests of young women. Many local and out of town people have visited my office and home, seeking assistance and counsel.

The scarcity of work has proven a serious problem, but I have been able to find employment for some of our local girls thru the generosity of local manufacturers. Business depression throughout the county has been responsible for

bringing many out-of-town girls to our city looking for work, not finding work they soon become penniless and a menace to our streets, our department has found means to return many of them to their homes without expense to the city.

Another problem is the runaway girl of which we have had an unusual number this year but we have been able to locate many out of town and local runaways thru aid given by other departments, newspapers and citizens.

My work as a protective officer is principally with girls and women who are ignorantly or waywardly drifting into vicious habits. The safety of the community demands efforts being made to reach the girl who has committed herself to an immoral life by having her placed under State Supervision or on probation.

In closing I wish to thank the Police Department, City Officials, and citizens for their courtesy, interest and aid given me in this work.
